PROPERTY ADDRESS: Everett St Embankment (running north from Lincoln St.), Lower Allston


PROPERTY OWNER: City of Boston, via Public Improvement Commission

The City of Boston, through its Public Improvement Commission, agrees to permit Miriam Shenitzer, Artist, Light Time in Space (John Powell), and Pollinators Welcome (Tom Sullivan) to undertake the following work at the above location:

1. Develop design concepts to create a pollinator garden in the space.
2. Plant, water, and weed the pollinator garden (with the assistance of the neighboring community).
3. Remove such plants as are inimical to pollinator environments
4. Add metal "icons" and multilingual explanatory signage, as detailed in final design.
5. Fundraise for this initiative pursuant to the requirements for obtaining a Harvard Flex Fund Grant.

This consent form is valid from the date signed below through the completion of the anticipated design. Once completed, Miriam Shenitzer, artist, and Pollinators Welcome shall submit the results and final plans to the City of Boston through the Public Improvement Commission for final review and approval before proceeding.

To Whom it May Concern;
regarding the Everett Street Embankment Pollinator Corridor Project.

I write with most enthusiastic support of the pollinator corridor project being developed by Miriam Shenitzer and collaboration artist John Powell. Their current focus, the Everett Street Embankment garden, is an important step to both prototype plant types, and to share the importance of pollinator gardens with those passing by this active area.

We know our surrounding natural ecology is under stress by rapid urban development. The Everett Street site is large enough to demonstrate the ecological value of this remediation concept. The added educational component is particularly important at this time of large scale real estate development, and plans for bold highway relocation and public space creation.

A pollinator garden, because it relies on the blooms of plants to attract bees and other beneficial insects, brings rich natural beauty to urban areas. In addition the birds supported by the pollinator insects help balance the population of mosquitos and other harmful species.

My own work with the Boston Schoolyard Initiative with 26 nature play gardens throughout Boston has convinced me that ongoing maintenance is essential to such gardens. Knowing that this group is working closely with the adjacent community at each step of planning gives me confidence in the sustainability of the outcome.

The value of the Everett Street project is that it is conceived not simply as a stand alone effort, rather planned as a node in a larger web of ecologically connected green spaces throughout our city. Last year in the immediate local area a pollinator teaching garden was funded and installed at the Gardner School, and future planting plans for other nearby schools and the Collins Park project will include pollinator plants.

The additive sum of these public spaces becomes more than a set of isolated islands. We can imagine that with a network of public area pollinator gardens, and thoughtful in-between planting on private residential properties, we are on the path to rebuild an infrastructure of ecological connections.

In consideration of this the interpretive signage component of the Everett Street garden is essential. Signage that is artful and engaging will introduce, and reinforce, the significance of these gardens. It is future thinking and respectful to the health of our community to encourage informed advocacy of these essential ecological ideas. Support of natural system corridors within urban areas benefits us all, and without question deserves encouragement and funding.

I am writing in support of the proposed Allston Pollinator Pathways. I have known and worked with Miriam Shenitzer, one of the project's leaders, for over ten years. During that time, Miriam initiated the creation of the Hosmer School Garden, which led to the development of school gardens in all of Watertown. Watertown is a very diverse community—our families come from many different cultures, socio-economic brackets, and religions. The Hosmer school is a title 1 School; a sizeable number of our students are from low-income families. Our families speak over 30 languages and come from all over the globe.

Miriam worked extensively with parents, teachers, and community organizations to develop the gardens. She reached out to local businesses to donate materials and expertise.

From Miriam's initial effort, an ongoing parent/school district group was developed to provide continuous support and care for the garden, especially during the summers when school is out. Miriam continues to bring students to the garden throughout the year for hands-on learning.

The garden has been an outdoor learning classroom since its inception. Students learn outside throughout the year, planting, weeding, composting, and harvesting. Many of our students have no other opportunity to connect with nature and the sources of their food in this very real, hands on way. The garden's produce is harvested by the children and used by the food services in the cafeterias.

Miriam has excellent community development skills, as well as extensive gardening knowledge. She is creative, reliable and well-organized. Miriam can bring a project from conception to fulfillment.

I am writing this letter in support of Miriam Shenitzer and John Powell's Pollinator Garden project in Lower Allston. My organization, Palaver Strings had the pleasure of working with Miriam and John in February 2018 on a co-produced program, Seeking Sanctuary, at the Boston Center for the Arts. *Seeking Sanctuary*, showcased the experiences of Irish, Cape Verdean, and Chinese communities through new music compositions and spoken word personal narratives inspired by the stories of immigrants and their descendants in a series of three performances and several community workshops. This project helped to extend the conversation about how immigration, cultural identity, and art impact the social fabric in Boston. In conjunction with the performance, Miriam and John were commissioned to create a temporary, interactive, art installation that invited audience members to document and share their reflection on "home" and "sanctuary city."

Miriam was wonderful to work with from the very early stages of the project. She was very flexible and able to co-curate a participatory art piece that served Palaver's vision for the program while including her own creativity and expertise. Miriam led several segments of each of our workshops at different Boston immigrant community centers and was able to engage and communicate to participants regardless of language barriers. I was impressed by Miriam's ability to activate a room full of people and encourage them to share their narratives on the art piece and verbally as a group. Miriam was responsible and trustworthy, and was able to work with very diverse groups of stakeholders to get a complicated project done. Miriam introduced us to John who helped to create the projections and installed of the art piece at the Boston Center for the Arts Cyclorama.

I would highly recommend Miriam Shenitzer and John Powell as organizers and creators for any community art project as I trust in their ability to engage many people in an intentional and impactful way.
