

- IMP approved in 2013
- Amended twice
 - 2016: LightView student housing
 - 2017: Leasing additional space at Christian Science plaza & small addition at Squashbusters
- Preparing to file 3rd amendment in early 2019



 March




Pedestrian Crossing



Improved Access Over MBTA Tracks




ISEC Phase 2

- Continue research growth on campus
- Space for ~ 100 principal investigators
- Consistent with 2013 IMP
 - Up to 14 stories
- Will pursue Large Project Review (Article 80)





Student Housing



- 2 of the 4 planned projects are to further our student housing goals
 - 1. Ryder was in 2013 IMP
 - 2. Propose to add P18 to the IMP
- Studying ways to fulfill 1,000 bed commitment (175 more beds) and replacing old-style units as part of these new projects

21st Century Student Housing Product

- Students want single rooms, apartment style and amenities.
- Our older-style housing isn't as attractive
- LightView early leasing supports this
- City is encouraging private student housing development to expand supply by attracting capital









Hemenway Apartments

- 142- 148 Hemenway Apartments reconstruction underway
- Challenging, emergency project
- Impossible to do with the units occupied
- Completion target late spring 2019








450 Huntington Ave




<u>Undergraduate Opportunities for Boston</u> Students

- 130 Boston students receiving scholarships
- Northeastern awarded 14 Valedictorian scholarships (full tuition, room & board)
 - 11 students accepted more than any other university in Boston
- Partnered with BHA to offer on—campus Admissions info session
- Hosted BPS College and Scholarship boot camp in January 2018 for high school juniors

Foundation Year

- First year college program specifically for City of Boston students who receive extensive wrap- around supports. Supports include integrated tutors, personal and academic advising, and specific curricular programming
- 15 students from specific Boston zip codes enrolled in Foundation year in 2018 – 2019
- 14 students transferred to Northeastern for 2nd year of college



Post Graduate Opportunities

- Moakley Scholarships: City of Boston employees can pursue masters degree
- Learning Link: a opportunity to audit a class designed for individuals aged 55+ who live in neighborhoods surrounding Northeastern

Purpose of the Impact Lending Program: Supporting the Growth of Boston's Minority- and Women-Owned Businesses



Together with the City, LISC and Northeastern shared a desire to invest in the growth of minority- and womenowned businesses in Boston.

Largest community development organization in the US

- Mission-driven nonprofit lender and investor with S&P AA rating
- Investments in small business, affordable housing, economic and community development

Northeastern

World-class educational institution with deep local roots

- Participant in the Pacesetters
 Program, committed to using local, minority- and women-owned businesses

32% of Boston businesses are MBEs, 35% are WBEs

Impact Lending

Northeastern provided financial support to guaranty loans, provide credit enhancement, lower interest rates, and match funding for certain microloans.

LISC administered the loan program and worked with the target businesses.

Affordable Loans for Small Business Needs



Affordable loans could range from \$1,000 to \$1 million and serve a wide spectrum of small business needs to leverage growth or stabilize businesses in preparation for growth, including working capital, equipment purchase, expansion, marketing, or other strategic uses.

Kiva Loans

Up to \$10,000

- · No Interest
- No Loan Fees
- Character-based lending through local partners
- 50% crowd-funded, 50% funded from Northeastern Impact Lending commitment

Micro Loans

\$10,000 - \$500,000

- 2-5 year terms
- · Fixed, affordable interest rates.
- · Owner guaranty required
- Northeastern provided 80% loan guarantees


Contract Financing and Term Loans

\$50,000 - \$1,000,000

- Up to 10 year terms
- Partnered with MGCC to provide financing for vendor contracts
- Affordable interest rates, fixed or floating available
- · Northeastern 80% guaranties

Serving Targeted Businesses

35 small women- or minority owned businesses received financing. Typical business types included food service, distribution, construction and retail.




Challenges and Responses

Many businesses were not ready to grow, and most loans made were for small amounts.

Growth Readiness

Many businesses were very early stage businesses who needed technical assistance to be growth-ready. This might include developing business plans, manage finances, filing tax returns, marketing products and hiring or human resources support.



Technical Assistance

LISC funded community development corporations to provide technical assistance to entrepreneurs. LISC is also working with Mass Growth Capital Corporation and MACDC on a small business TA certification program

Poor or No Credit

Many businesses were unable to qualify for loans because they had no or poor credit.



Business Credit Coaching

LISC has partnered with Boston Ujima to provide a **financial and credit coach** for up to 100 local small minority- and women-owned businesses through **Boston Builds Credit,** a partnership of LISC, the City's office of Financial Empowerment and United Way.

Impacts

Three key themes characterize the success of the Impact Lending Program in driving job and wealth creation, financial and neighborhood stability.

The target businesses accessed affordable financing which did drive growth.

Investments in local businesses are investments in local district corridors.

Investing in early stage businesses builds the small business pipeline of the future.

Business Support Organizations

Micro loans, provided via the Kiva crowdfunding platform were the most popular loan product.

LISC partnered with local business support organizations to sponsor borrowers, who then received matching loan funds from Impact Lending.





















Fresh Food Generation

This local food truck with Latin American and Caribbean cuisine used their loan to purchase equipment and expand their marketing capacity. The company has expanded into catering and is on multiple marketing platforms, increasing sales and improving operations.

Honeycomb Cafe

The owners of this Savin Hill café used a \$37,500 micro loan for construction and purchase of commercial kitchen equipment. LISC partner Dorchester Bay Economic Development Corporation lend the owners an additional \$37,500 to meet their needs.

Carribean Appeal

Despite national recognition of its brand, this company could not access affordable capital. A \$17,500 Impact Loan helped to refinance high interest debt, resulting in saving over \$2,000 and enabling the business to invest further in its growth.

Tiffany's Transformations

This vegan, toxin- and cruelty-free beauty salon used a \$2,000 Kiva loan to purchase new professional salon equipment.



Elier Barbershop

This neighborhood barbershop, established by an immigrant in 2013, used a \$10,000 loan to update floors, purchase new equipment and expand marketing. Elier employs 5 local barbers.
