South Boston Transportation Action Plan: Focus Group Feedback Summary December, 2022

Six focus groups were held in December 2022 to collect resident feedback on transportation experiences and conditions in the study area. While the focus groups were open to all volunteers who filled out the SBTAP community survey, the following groups were formed based on populations who historically have not been heard from in planning processes and who represent diverse transportation needs and considerations:

Families with school-age children Transit-dependent households Individuals over 60 years old Below median-income households Individuals under 35 years old

Focus group discussions, held for 1 hour each, included topics ranging from pedestrian safety concerns, travel choices, transit experiences, and biking conditions in the study area. Specific points of feedback from several focus groups and specific groups and a selection of maps from the in-person and virtual focus group sessions are included blow.

Focus group-specific feedback:

Families with school-age children

- Speeding and cut thru traffic on high volume, wide streets like Broadway, Day Blvd, and L Street
- Need better public transit options for families with young children
- Safer streets are necessary for children to be able to safely walk, ride their scooters and bikes, etc.
- Double parking at L and Broadway
- More bike infrastructure across the neighborhood

Transit-dependent households

- Buses have poor reliability and capacity constraints, which particularly affects commuters at peak hours
- Streets need better lighting for pedestrian safety for visibility and personal safety
- Crosswalks need to be daylighted (i.e., parking removed right in front of the crosswalk) to make pedestrians more visible to cars
- Speeding is an issue on streets like L, East 1st, and Columbia
- Need more bike parking at popular destinations like the beaches and Broadway Station

Individuals over 60 years old

- Double parking near retail, bars, and restaurants
- Speeding and double threats on Dorchester Street
- New bike lanes must have a maintenance plan in place and not affect on-street parking
- Intersection design needs to be improved to minimize conflict between different modes of transportation (cars, pedestrians, and bikes)

Below median-income households

- Speeding on wide roads such as Dorchester Street and Summer/L Street make unsignalized pedestrian crossings very unsafe
- Visibility and speeding on East 1st Street is a hazard for both drivers and pedestrians
- Bus service connecting different parts South Boston and to downtown, Seaport, and other parts of the city needs to improve capacity and service levels

Individuals under 35-years old

- Need for neighborhood Bluebike access and micro-mobility options, especially east of Dorchester Street
- Overall street network needs to prioritize people over vehicular traffic, especially in areas that already experience high foot traffic
- Increase curbside flexibility to accommodate modern-day mode shares (i.e., bikes and Bluebikes, Uber and Lyft, etc.)










You can select a virtual sticky-note with a mouse click and start typing your comment. The font size will automatically resize, although you can manipulate the size of the sticky-note as well.
