Dear Mayor Walsh, City Councilors, Senator Rush, and members of the BPDA,

I support the Roxbury Prep high school project at 361 Belgrade Ave., approximately 500 yards from my home. I believe that the school at that location will be consistent with the existing character of the neighborhood on Belgrade Ave. and will be an improvement over the existing, somewhat dated used car dealership. I think the school has adequately addressed concerns about transit and traffic, and I think that my predominantly-white neighborhood will send a very good message about Boston if we welcome the predominantly non-white students at Roxbury Prep to the neighborhood.

I encourage you to press for two improvements to the project. First, additional trains on the Needham Line during rush hours in both directions would be good for the students and for commuters heading into the city. Second, the concerns my neighbors and I have about parking could be addressed by adding resident sticker parking signs on nearby streets (for example, on Beech Street or New Park Ave., my street).

I want to go on record as being completely in support of Roxbury Prep's plans to build a new high school on the site now occupied by the car dealership at 361 Belgrade Ave.

I live about half a mile from there, on the corner of Beech St. and Havana St., directly across from the Mozart elementary school. Although there is obvious traffic at the beginning and end of each school day, we have found that parents and teachers are very respectful of our space, not parking too close to our driveway on Havana.

The underground parking spaces incorporated into the design for Roxbury Prep should ensure minimal impact to abutters.

I attended the January 30 meeting and was appalled by the ugly racism exhibited by the tiny minority who are opposed to Roxbury Prep. Although they complained that their objections were based mostly on traffic, transportation and parking, all of which were more than adequately addressed by the well-prepared presenters, I suspect their real reasons are plain old-fashioned racism. They may not even be consciously aware of just how racist they sound. But they certainly howled when other neighbors called them on it.

I heard naysayers complain that Holy Name Circle and other nearby intersections are already extremely busy at all hours of the day and evening. As a close neighbor, I travel through these intersections many times per week, at various times of day, and recently was the only car waiting for a light right in front of the proposed school site at 5:00 PM on a weeknight!

For the past month or so, I have noticed some backup around Holy Name Circle and at the intersection of West Roxbury Parkway, Beech, Anawan, etc. I finally realized it may be attributed to longer pedestrian walk lights, which we have badly needed. If we need to wait a few more seconds at a light so that old ladies like myself can hobble across the street without getting run over, I have no problem with that. If there is additional traffic once the new school is built, I have no objections to waiting an additional few minutes at these intersections.

In addition, I was completely satisfied with the transportation studies and plans that were presented. The combination of public buses, commuter rail, and some parent drop-offs seem more than adequate to meet the needs of this new school and our community.

I was particularly offended and embarrassed by the racist complaints about students standing around waiting for buses after school. These are mature, intelligent, highly-functioning young people who have already demonstrated responsible behavior, in and out of school. At the January 30 meeting, they showed extraordinary forbearance during the ugly racist declarations and repeated questions about so-called issues that had already been completely answered.

I enthusiastically welcome this beautiful new school building and vibrant community of scholars to our neighborhood. They will enrich our neighborhood in many ways, and we should be proud and happy that they chose this site for their building.

Dear Aisling:

We spoke briefly at the January 30, 2019 BPDA public meeting on the 361 Roxbury Prep High School project. Like many there, I never signed in at the meeting—I didn't realize there was a sheet to sign, possibly ; however, as an attendee I voiced some of my concerns about the project. My questions were not adequately addressed and I would like to address these and other outstanding concerns here. Overall, I am concerned about the enormity of this project, which will negatively impact local traffic, transportation, and parking. I am an active community member: I volunteer in the community and I shop in the community. Anawan, Belgrade, and the West Roxbury Parkway are important roadways for my work commute as well as my activities in the community. These major streets, as well as nearby secondary roads, will be adversely affected by this project.

Since the Project proponents could not do a thorough study of the streets in the area it is my duty as a resident to provide information to you. The project is on Belgrade and is bordered by the West Roxbury Parkway and Anawan Ave; Anawan is being co-opted as a drop off and driveway for the project; and West Roxbury Parkway forms a triangle with Belgrade and Anawan. Belgrade and Anawan provide important routes to traverse safely across or onto the West Roxbury Parkway. West Roxbury Parkway is a major commuting route from West Roxbury, Roslindale, Hyde Park, Dedham, etc, to Boston, Newton, Brookline, etc. Changing the flow of traffic on these streets will impact the area tremendously leading to gridlock, and increasing traffic in local neighborhoods as commuters frantically search for ways to get around the gridlock.

This project not only brings a large number of commuters to the area, it is a school. School hours dictate a strict schedule. Although there may be more scatter at the end of some days due to after school activities, local roadways, transportation systems, and sidewalks will have to accommodate the en masse movement of 625 or so people (students and staff) at set times of arrival and dismissal, which correspond to peak traffic times. As a person who works across from a BPS public high school (that is well serviced by MBTA buses and green/orange line trains), I can tell you that the rush of cars dropping off/picking up students combined with MBTA buses creates an unbelievably chaotic situation. After school and special events are even worse, as public transportation isn't always an option.

At the meeting, I questioned the Project organizers about the mass movement of commuters at the school. According to the project's projection 75% of the students (about 420) will be taking the local buses. And according to Roxbury Prep school literature "Roxbury Prep Roslindale will be located just a few hundred feet from the Bellevue Commuter Rail stop, and will be within yards of bus lines 35, 36, 37 and 38." Note: three of these lines use the same bus stops on Belgrade and the 38 uses a stop on Belgrade and the West Roxbury parkway. Unfortunately the closest, or "yards away" stops are all on the other side of the West Roxbury Parkway from this project. When I asked about this at the meeting I was told that students will likely use other stops (rather than these closest stops). However, the literature about the Roslindale Roxbury Prep High School project indicates that two bus monitors will be present at the closest bus stops on the far side of the West Roxbury Parkway. At some point, even the project proponents considered that use of these closest bus spots will require careful supervision. Overall, the large influx of commuters to this triangle of three major intersecting and busy streets will be problematic.

Parking is another issue that will adversely affect nearby residents, shoppers and businesses. At the January 30thBPDA meeting the project planners suggested that they may have to secure other parking for events held on site. (On site parking will be difficult to navigate, as it includes valet parking in the surface lot and/or tandem parking in the garage.)

The supporters for this project have placed a heavy emphasis on calling this a neighborhood school (see <https://www.roxpreproslindale.org> for how the school is being presented to the community). In the

BPDA project submission "This proposal has many important and unique characteristics. Most significant is the creation of a new charter high school facility to serve not only existing students from several Boston neighborhoods, but also increasing number of students from Roslindale and nearby West Roxbury neighborhoods." However, given the large numbers from Roxbury Prep feeder middle schools, it will be difficult for any student not already in this charter school system to gain admittance (by lottery).

The building will take up much of the frontage along Belgrade Avenue. In fact, this enormous building exceeds the floor to area ratio for the district and also exceeds the height limit. This building will fill the site and dominate the local landscape. The proposed building is approximately 50% smaller than the original proposal; however, the student population is reduced by only 30%, increasing student density. Lacking completely are outdoor fields for sports, recreation, and fitness. The building size, the overcrowding, and the lack of outdoor space are all negatives.

Finally, at issue is the overall impact of this project. Some project proponents equated this project to the Holy Name Parish School—but that school is over 60 years old! 60 years ago traffic was light, and there wasn't a nearby school 0.3 miles down the road (the distance of the current project to the established Holy Name School). My strong opposition is due to the scale and size and density of this project. I support responsible urban planning and am against this and any other large and densely populated project at 361 Belgrade Ave.

I believe that the developers have made significant concessions in response to "concerns" raised by certain neighbors. Unfortunately, it appears that nothing short of withdrawing the application would appease many who have weighed in. That is an unreasonable request, in my opinion, and therefore, I encourage the BPDA to recognize the importance of this school and the students it serves as well as the work that has been done based on feedback received and to approve the application. If there is continued concerns regarding parking and driving, then I would recommend that the BPDA condition the approval on the school prohibiting cars, except for those able to fit within the lot as designed, perhaps assigned spaces, and then, if the condition is violated to repeal the permit.

I am a Roslindale resident and frequently travel through the Belgrade/Parkway/Anawan intersection. I attended the Roxbury Prep community meetings sponsored by the Boston Planning and Development Agency on January 30 and February 13, and listened intently to the discussions.

It is clear that traffic and mass transit load will increase in the area immediately around the school at certain times during the day. Compared to having a vacant car dealership there, what else is to be expected? Any development of that site, including condos or apartments, would also increase traffic. After all, as one community member commented, it's Boston.

To provide a viable school building for this excellent high school is part of our social commitment as a community—to provide for the next generation. We have done so for decades building both public and charter schools. Social commitments have to be placed in someone's "backyard."

Why this particular project is being scrutinized so exceedingly carefully is open to debate. As was mentioned, Holy Name School causes substantial delays in commute times through that area—and yet Holy Name is considered part of the community and people accept the disruption. Themes of race whirled below the surface of the discussion and emerged at times with the least provocation. That does not mean that the opposition is racist, or that proponents are playing "the race card." What is clear, however, is that a vocal segment of the West Roxbury and Roslindale populace political and community power have rallied to a remarkable extent to fight the placement of Roxbury Prep at 361 Belgrade—the "Stop 361 Belgrade" banners hanging in the neighborhood are ample proof of that.

And yet we have a commitment to provide for our next generation. Where racism is unarguably an issue is not in the actions or feelings of individuals present last night, but in our history and in the institutional and structural residue of centuries of racism in our society, including here in Boston. Opponents in a neighborhood of plenty (or at least adequacy) like West Roxbury and Roslindale have the wherewithal to commit their time and their intellectual and monetary resources to fighting for what they want. Disadvantaged people of color, whose children make up the vast majority of Roxbury Prep's student body, often work multiple jobs or are unable to get to places off public transit lines (like 7 VFW Parkway where the discussion was held). They do not have the same ease and capability as the middle and upper classes—and yet as your staff saw, they came in droves to last night's discussion.

It is the mandate of the BPDA to be good stewards of our resources to benefit the residents of our great city. This means working to level the playing field after centuries of explicit racism and its structural residue.

Do not take too seriously the squeaky wheels whose traffic time will likely increase—a bit—as it will for all of us. It's in the public interest to permit Roxbury Prep to build at 361 Belgrade. Yes, in my backyard!

Since the comment period on 361 Belgrade Ave is ending on 02/22/19 I am reaching out to all of you again.

This project is NOT APPROPRIATE FOR THIS SITE. How this has ever gotten so far is amazing and it is clear the city and our elected officials are not listening to their constituents.

Sitting in on community meetings in regards to this proposed site for Roxbury Prep it becomes more apparent that this about big business /political deals more than anything else. These meetings take time and actual community members who live in this neighborhood want their voices heard. Instead we have to sit through hours of listening to students, parents, and teachers who are not residents. That is not the point of a community meeting. I would not go to Dorchester, JP etc etc and think I should have a voice in what happens in their neighborhoods.

We had to listen to these parents, teachers, and students tell us our concerns about "traffic" and "smog" were not valid because this "is the city". Well our Mayor describes West Roxbury a bit different. Please all refer to West Roxbury cityofboston.gov. Our Mayor describes our neighborhood as "A friendly suburban community in Boston". Now residents who live here, pay HUGE taxes here, raise their families here are being demonized for wanting to preserve our suburban community in Boston.

We heard from supporters who live in other neighborhoods in the city that have multiple schools and how they "just deal with it" - the difference is these schools were already in these neighborhoods for decades - so it was the community they chose. I specifically chose the neighborhood of West Roxbury 10 yrs ago because of it's "suburban vibe with its tree lined streets and single family homes" (again... I quote cityofboston.gov).

I have had the unique experience of being a home owner and a former resident of the neighborhood of Roxbury Prep's original school on Mission Hill (0.5 miles from my house) and now I am residing in West Roxbury with this new proposed site 0.4 miles from my current home and residence. When this school came to Fisher Ave I did not oppose the school - this site is 0.5 miles from my house. It is placed on Fisher Ave - NOT A MAJOR INTERSECTION / NOT A SITE THAT CONSIDERABLY CHANGED THE NEIGHBORHOOD with congestion (pedestrian and vehicle) , traffic, "smog" (as the supporters say). So listening to supporters tell the crowd that the West Roxbury residents are not for schools or educating children -is RIDICULOUS AND LAUGHABLE. This is Massachusetts not a third world country. This is about a building project that is too big for this site. If AMAZON wanted to build there and bring 600 + people daily, it again would not be an appropriate site.

Many of us understand Charter Schools and how they operate. While saying they are non profit does not mean that they do not make money. Every dollar that goes towards a student does not go to stockholders - kind of an adversarial relationship don't you think? I am a neighbor and voter and SUPPORT the Roxbury Prep high school project proposed at 361 Belgrade Ave in Roslindale . I attended this week's meeting regarding the reduction in building size and student numbers and other attention to neighbors' concerns. I certainly respect immediate abutters questions but am impressed with the efforts made by the school to address them, coordinate and optimize existing public transportation , travelling against the majority of rush hour traffic, etc.

It is essential for you to know that the group that formed to oppose this school and continues to do so, does NOT represent our neighborhood and community or speak for the rest of us. I understand and sympathize with the discomfort that comes from some of the changes that have already come to the community including rising housing costs, traffic, etc but disagree that the solution is to prevent a public high school from moving here or that does anything to "save our community" .

I was also disappointed in you, our public officials , not to hear any leadership articulating the public good. What makes a community vital? It is not another high priced condo building in a community without a public high school but a community that comes together to embrace our city's children and make sure everybody receives a high quality education. While my passion on this subject means I prefer public schools to funding another charter school, that is not the issue here. I am writing to ask that BPDA not move forward with the Charter School at 361 Belgrade for the following reasons:

1. a high density building with over 500 people traveling to/from every day will exacerbate an already major problem at the Holy Name Rotary. Traffic backs up there to the point where Centre Street and WR Pkwy are both locked up.
2. One of the students who stood up to speak said she was looking forward to a Single location and the ability to play soccer at the school etc. yet there are no sport options within a reasonable distance.
3. I was crossing from the 361 side of the intersection across Belgrade to walk toward Washington street and there is no walk indicator after 3 light changes and me pressing the cross button. There is a walk indicator to cross WR Pkwy but then when you try to cross Belgrade to head toward Anawan, there is no cross indicator on that light either. The lights will need to be modified to support crossing indicators and add more delays/back ups. In fact the police cannot exit their parking area now due to back ups at the rotary which adds more potential problems for the local community.
4. Last, but not least, the Peak Events will result in parking on Center Street and all the other side streets, Holy Name, etc and impact what has become a very social area in WRox with West on Centre, Porter Cafe, Himalayan Restaurant, and the other smaller businesses to be negatively impacted. WRox already lost the bowling complex to the USPS building, along with associated parking cut by 50%, so another parking impact is not fair in this area. Dear Director Golden:

This is in reference to the proposal to build Roxbury Prep Charter High school, at 361 Belgrade, Avenue, on the Roslindale/West Roxbury line. While I appreciate the need for Roxbury Prep to build a permanent high school, I strongly believe that the chosen site is not suitable for a project of this magnitude.

As a lifelong resident of Boston, I have resided in West Roxbury for all but 6 of my 72 years, and have owned my home since 1973. Much has changed in these 46 years, most especially, the congestion caused by significant increases of traffic. One need not be a traffic flow expert to notice the back-up of vehicles (especially at peak morning and afternoon commuting times) on the West Roxbury Parkway, between Washington and Centre Street, as well as from Putterham Circle in South Brookline to Centre Street, on LaGrange Street from the VFW Parkway to Washington Street, on Centre Street from Holy Name Circle to the VFW Parkway, as well as from Putterham Circle in South Brookline to Centre Street. There probably are equal back-ups on Belgrade Avenue, as well. The drive from my home on Park Street to access the West Roxbury Parkway, via Woodard Road, is often delayed, where I sit waiting for a considerate driver to let me in, crossing two lanes of traffic if I need to go left toward Holy Name Circle. This is true, no matter what alternate route I might try.

Much of this traffic is clearly caused by the drop-off/pick-up/pedestrian foot traffic at Holy Name School, the Lyndon School, Catholic Memorial Schools, VA Hospital, 2 day care facilities, and all the motorists looking to cut through on their way to and from work. My neighbors and I have been observing this for the past several years, and can't help but think that the Roxbury Prep project will just exacerbate an already imposing traffic situation, which will undoubtedly be magnified during the months of construction and the necessary construction vehicles, as well as once the project is completed. As the proposal states, "The Project is expected to generate approximately 262 vehicular trips on a typical school day, with 53 staff trips entering the school in the morning and exiting the school in the afternoon, and 39 vehicles completing pick-up/drop-off maneuvers during both the weekday a.m. and p.m. peak hours."

Even though the school leaders have worked earnestly to address the traffic-flow concerns, I worry for the safety of those students who decide to ignore such admonitions, and who may decide to visit the business section of Centre Street, ignoring the need to cross safely by waiting for the dense traffic to slow. Just recently, a woman was killed in West Roxbury, reportedly crossing outside of cross walks. I also know, first hand, as the one who was in charge of the buses at my school, that things very often do not go according to plan.

Please note that I, personally, attended Boston Public Schools (BPS), and my daughter is a graduate of Boston Latin School (BLS). Now retired, I taught students with severe learning and behavioral disabilities, in BPS, for 35 years. The need for quality education for all students is truly one of my personal beliefs, but the location chosen by Roxbury Prep is, in my opinion, inadequate.

Having attended inner-city schools, with no accommodations for outdoor sports, I am too familiar with the inconvenience of traveling to other locations to practice and play team sports. My daughter and her swim team had to travel from Boston Latin School to the Murphy School in Dorchester because there was no swimming pool at BLS. When West Roxbury High School was built, the students finally had a high school campus that was in line with the 21st century. Roxbury Prep deserves the same. Unfortunately, the complex that housed Urban Science Academy and West Roxbury Academy will now be razed for safety concerns.

In their proposal, the applicants cite a minimum of 5 areas for which they will need to apply for variances, and others where they anticipate they will need waivers, as well. I can't help but be dismayed by the fact that even before they develop the property, they are anticipating non-conformance to existing zoning and environmental regulations. This would set a bad precedent, should these future requests be met.

Approximately 32% of West Roxbury and about 25% of Roslindale residents are ages 55 or over. Many of them are retirees who raised their families, here, for many years. When it comes time to downsize, they would love to stay in the area, but rental and condominium property is often out of their reach. Several new housing facilities are being completed from Belgrade Avenue, to Centre and Spring Streets. The property at 361 Belgrade Avenue would much better serve the needs of the community if it were to be used for affordable housing that is close to public transportation, rather than to a facility that will have a negative impact on the quality of life because of the increased traffic, one that will serve only a small amount of neighborhood families, and one that is equal to the type of facility these students deserve.

I urge you to deny approval of this proposal

First, I commute to work daily and have to drive through the intersection of Belgrade and West Roxbury Parkway between 7:00am and 7:30am each day. I can tell you that there is a constant backup for the morning and evening commutes with cars constantly blocking the intersection. This isn't just once or twice a week, it's everyday! The area around the Holy Name rotary is so bad that if for some reason I have to travel near that area I will find an alternate route. Washington street is even worse. I can't believe that anyone from this project has taken any time to study this and with the proposed number of students taking the T etc...this is unbelievable to me that this is a serious consideration. You will have trucks making deliveries double parking causing even more backups and traffic. The traffic on Belgrade for the evening commute is so bad now that it can take me 15-20 min from the 361 area to get to my house on the lower end of Belgrade.

Secondly, because I live near the commuter rail stop we have a serious parking problem on Belgrade, as well as some side streets. 361 Belgrade Avenue in Roslindale, Massachusetts is not a location for any school. This match box sized property is shoved into a corner of a major intersection and virtually sits on a commuter railroad track. It would be a charter school that cannot offer each student a decent sized classroom and will only have an outdoor campus consisting of a public cement sidewalk and a dangerous railroad track. This property should raise many concerns for you as an elected official of Boston. Massachusetts already has codes regulating the size of school buildings, which includes charter schools, and this property does not pass any of them. If a Boston Public School could never be established in this location neither can a charter school. There are reasons for establishing codes for teaching institutions. I find it completely stunning that this project was not stopped from the moment it was suggested! The sheer logistics of this property immediately rules it out as a potential school site. What each and every one of you need to do is visit the site and then let the surrounding community residents know that you would want your own child to attend a school in such a **"make-it-fit-no-matter-what-condition" with total disregard for logistical safety.** Locating a charter school in this lot serves only one purpose and that is to shift the school's problem from one part of the city of Boston to another while simultaneously creating issues for a whole new community. Currently in the Roslindale/West Roxbury area there is not one school that has a similar inferior property design.

I have lived on Belgrade Avenue for over 50 years. I am vehemently opposed to having a school built in this location. My neighbors living next to me and across from me all agree this is a bad idea for both the students and this community. Additionally, we do not believe a single piece of analysis that the **contracted real estate developers** for this property have to offer because it is biased and based solely on greed.

I attended the meeting February 13th meeting at the Our Lady of the Annunciation Church and I was appalled at the lack of honesty I heard from the architects and developers contracted for this project. For one thing, their sketch of the property was extremely misleading because it was not drawn to scale and this was done intentionally. As Boston officials, you should be reviewing independent studies only. **The Anawan/Belgrade Terrace area is nothing more than a "public driveway"** yet this is where the school supplies and the staffs' cars will enter for parking in an underground garage on a daily basis. According to the developer's sketch this driveway was enlarged erroneously. I find this quite disingenuous and hope you are not fooled by it. This driveway is barely long enough for four cars to enter at any given time in one direction let alone both directions. The developers admitted there would be no loading docks either. Now segue to a winter scene with snow piled up all along the way and you will have a major grid lock with cars, delivery trucks, garbage trucks, city snow plows, the traffic generated by the condo residents directly across from there and pedestrians heading to work via the commuter rail. This grid lock will just spill over onto Belgrade and the West Roxbury Parkway. We already have enough problems with traffic and parking for residents as it is on Belgrade. **If you listen closely to the real estate developers they are actually making the argument that in order to accommodate a school on this location a subpar and complicated design to include every square inch up to the surrounding sidewalks and the railway tracks are needed to do so.** Requests to the MBTA would also be made to re-establish stops and schedules. In other words, this property by its very nature has a bad design and they know it.

And exactly why isn't the 361 Belgrade Avenue charter school project subject to a vote by the Roslindale/West Roxbury residents? I was expecting this on the last election's ballot.

Additionally, the developers claimed at the meeting that they scaled back the number of students the school would house from over 1,000 to approximately 560. The residents of this area see this as nothing more than a ruse. The numbers I believe did not even cover the staff required to run the school such as the teachers, administrators, janitors, etc. If they were given permission to build we know that in a year or so a petition would be filed to build up the additional floors to house 1,000 students again. This project must be stopped now! The charter school's representative claimed that only 100, that is, approximately 17% of the student body, already live in the Roslindale/West Roxbury area. Great - but **what about the other 82%+ of the Roxbury Prep students?** Why were none of them at the meeting on February 13th? The location of Roxbury Prep should remain where the majority of its students reside and it should have ample space not only for classrooms but an outdoor campus as well. The school should not be positioned on a railroad track either. The commuter

fares have been increasing quite a bit over the past several years on the MBTA since Boston's public transportation services are far too stretched as it is. The 82%+ of these students will be facing the brunt of the fare costs by not having their school in a more local area.

And speaking of safety, whether it is 600 or 1,000 students, how are the emergency vehicles going to access the school? What about fire drill situations or God forbid an actual fire -- where are the students suppose to file out to stand -- should they file out to the street intersection or the train tracks? In any of the schools I have attended (both public and private) emergency vehicles were able to get onto the school property itself. And again, speaking of codes, I would be astounded if the Boston Fire Department would sanction this location for a high school! And a fire department's inspection is required. Why has this not been done yet? Why wasn't a Fire Department's representative at the meeting? Likewise, who represented the MBTA at this meeting? The 361 Belgrade lot is not sufficient for even 100 students let alone 560+.

Please review the history of the West Roxbury High School on the VFW Parkway in relation to traffic safety. The median island surrounding that school's area was not fenced off for decades. Once the high school was established there the Boston/MBTA traffic authorities found it necessary to erect chain link fences along the median island on the parkway. What was the reason for this? The reason was that **the West Roxbury High School students were not using the crosswalks nor the traffic lights to cross the VFW Parkway.** High school students were not following traffic regulations. And yes, unfortunately, this is the nature of any high school student. Now switch to the Belgrade location and we will have a similar nightmare but worse since it is a more condensed area with narrower streets and the additional peril of having a railroad track right there. In addition, a number of multi-unit condo apartments are planned on going up in the same block. The MBTA will not hesitate to erect a fence along the train track near Belgrade/Bellevue station to block that area should this school be located there. The students will then have to circle around to get to the school along with the residents in the area who use the train for commuting to work. It is certain that the pedestrian routes will be clogged and cause numerous traffic safety issues.

Secondly, you need to ask the current owner of 361 Belgrade Avenue, Mr. Clay himself, how many times the cars sitting in his used car parking lot at that intersection's corner were cracked up because they were hit by cars making left turns from the West Roxbury Parkway onto Belgrade or cars heading down Belgrade coming from Center Street that try to zip by those wanting to make a right hand turn onto the Parkway and end up on his lot -- smack dab onto the sidewalk and into his cars. Yes, this is a dangerous intersection and over the years I have seen many accidents here including those that have knocked down the traffic light poles. This makes it an ideal location for a high school-- Right?!?!

Roslindale and West Roxbury properties are already being **over developed** as it is. The distinction for this Boston area has always been as being part of the "outer skirts" of the city and should remain as such. The beauty of Boston is that we have a city with diverse landscapes and character unique to each section. The reason why Bostonians from every corner of the city choose this area to live is because there are more open spaces than the inner city. Traffic problems from the inner city should not be directed to this area as it only solidifies transportation issues citywide for Boston including vehicles and all forms of public transportation. This is not a solution and will only spread more traffic congestion.

In the February 2019 edition of the magazine, *Boston*, there is an article discussing how several Boston colleges are on the brink of bankruptcy. Roxbury Prep officials need to investigate which of these colleges may offer a better location for their school. These properties, should they become available, are already built for a teaching institution and will have more to offer their student body. This would be so much more ideal than the Belgrade's dangerous postage-sized lot. Why should this charter school have to settle for a subpar piece of property while other Boston schools have better?

Now I ask you once again why the communities of Roslindale and West Roxbury are not allowed to have a public vote on this matter?

I thank you in advance for making the **right decision to not zone the lot at 361 Belgrade Avenue in Roslindale, MA as a property for any school.**

Many older Boston city schools were brought up to code at great expense in areas that balanced the needs of students with traffic needs of the community. Urban students deserve open green, recreational space, and careful transportation planning for bus safety that considers our community traffic concerns. The 361 charter proposal does not offer green space or a careful transportation plan and it is unknown if it proposed an open campus.

West Roxbury streets are hyper-burdened. The community has become very over-developed and congested with vehicles. Stop signs and reduced speeds to 25 mph have not solved the traffic problems. Apps redirect hurried commercial vehicles through the neighborhoods to access Washington Street, two different Parkways, Centre Street, and Belgrade Ave, to and from downtown Boston.

How do we balance the economic development of Boston with the safe development of our community? The BPDA impacts this balance by trying to limit the discussions on development projects and not hearing the community objections that currently fail to resonate as data.

Development projects, like the 361 charter share many considered viewpoints tallied online through BPDA's portal and via other data mining resources. The 361 project is heavily reliant on data; but data aggregating sites have limitations especially that the West Roxbury community since one third residents represent the older demographic being a little less than tech savvy. Message I am among the hundreds of neighbors of 361 Belgrade Avenue, Roslindale, who oppose the construction of a facility at 361 Belgrade Ave. that will accommodate 600+ individuals.

As a longtime resident and home owner in West Roxbury, only one block from this location, I believe this project would greatly harm the community. In addition, I am not the only person who is concerned for the safety of the students due to congestion from cars, buses and other types of transportation in this community.

When one invests in a home and a community, people look for many things including schooling, congestion, traffic, and ease of transportation. I attended high school in Roslindale because there was no high school in West Roxbury. Many students attend high school outside their community. While I am open to change, there is a breaking point. Look at your own homes and how you would react to the kind of change that this particular project would bring. There is also a massive amount of buildings and projects approved and others seeking approval for this area including apartments and condos. This is a busy suburban Boston area. If anything, it would be better to build apartments/condos/senior housing on this sight rather than the project that is being proposed.

We have been told that the school will also be used evenings and on weekends (which will include parents and families). The commuter rail does not run on weekends. Where will people park? I have been told by some residents, who have health issues that they are frightened that they will have to park further and further away and it will become even more difficult to get to and from their cars/homes.

We also have been told that travel will be increased by only 1-2 minutes. I feel we have been made to feel that we are selfish to complain about this issue. I can guarantee that it takes much more than 1 to 2 minutes in additional time to navigate the increased traffic even now!!! There is no such thing as an average delay!!! Proponents of the project have said that this problem is happening all over the city. Should we continue to add to this problem? Should we succumb to this thinking? We have been told to just "get over it".

Try turning left on Anawan Avenue where you will come to a six-way intersection on the West Roxbury Parkway, Anawan Avenue, and Beech Street. Frequently, cars traveling on the Parkway do not stop when the light turns red, traffic backs up across the intersection preventing cars from Anawan Ave. and Beech St. from moving through the green light.

Enforcement has told us that they do not have enough coverage to address this situation.

The school has said they will monitor congestion problems. How is the school going to monitor their students, staff and school? As a teacher for 35 years in the city of Boston, I know that those who are asked to monitor these issues (often due to other issues going on) do not always show up to take care of these problems. The school tells us to tell them if there are problems. So, the community/hard working people now need to monitor this in addition to being "patient" with increased travel time? Have you studied the massive traffic/congestion on the West Roxbury Parkway including the area of the school? The traffic study that was done is ridiculous. Can there not be an independent traffic study? Can we see this study? Can there not be a discussion of available square footage per student?

Those who support the school have often told us we do not care about the students. They say "this is our school" as if we are against education and students. As a teacher in Boston for 35 years, this cannot be further from the truth. We also deserve the kind of community we have worked hard for. I believe they have not listened to what we are saying. Our concerns have NEVER been about the students (unless it has to do with safety). It may be "their school" but I feel this is "our community" where residents have worked hard for a good quality of life. I have lived here most of my life. People in favor of the project have from the start used unflattering and untruthful descriptions of us. Do they realize that it is people in this community that has made it the type of place they want to build their school? We have a right to make our reasons heard and understood.

Proponents of the project say they want a good education for their students. We are NOT against students. We are against the building in this specific area. We feel this is not the best location in size and square footage for this project. We have been told by architects in the area that building this project is a mistake.

We have repeatedly heard that this is "their school", one which has free tuition. It is not free tuition. It is paid for by the tax payers. Now the taxes we pay will take away from our community's quality of life that we have worked so hard for.

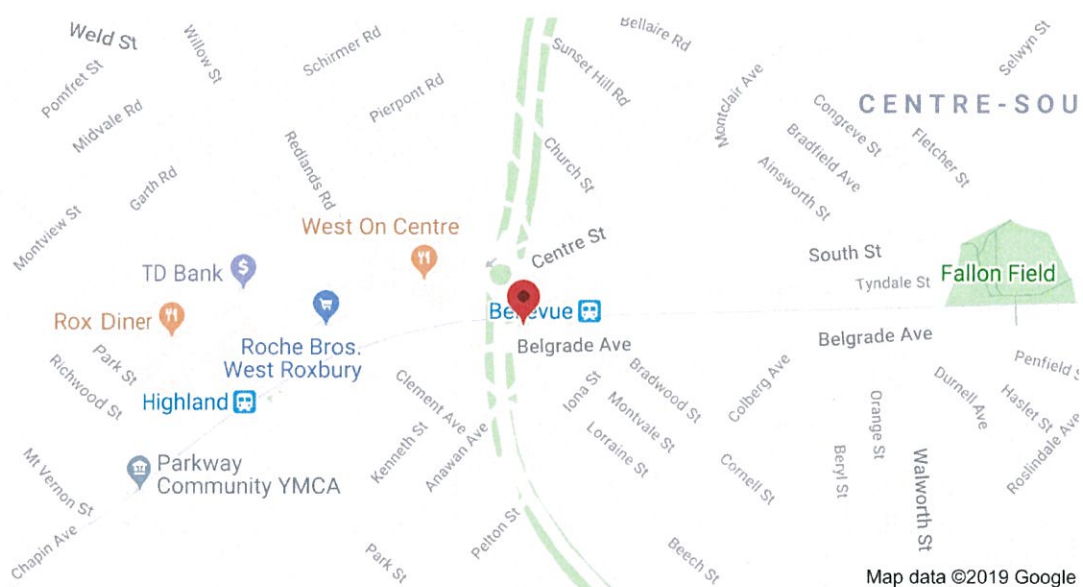

The red dot in the middle of the map above will remind you of the 1 acre location where Upton Partners wants to locate a charter school, complete with all components that a school requires:

Students and Staff totaling more than 650 people, five days per week

Cars, Buses and Trains delivering those 650 folks in the morning and picking them up again in the afternoon
Truck deliveries of mail, packages and equipment, five days a week (Try watching West Roxbury High School or the Kilmer for an hour to see what gets delivered.)

Ambient traffic in the area by people going to Boston Paws Dog Grooming, people who live across the street, people who head to the shops further down the street and to Roslindale Square.

And, you think additional traffic caused by a one acre school complex at the gateway to West Roxbury is a good thing?

The proposed area is the gateway to West Roxbury and already one of gridlock almost all day, every day. To simplify the picture, you might think of Anawan Ave., WR Parkway, Belgrade Ave, and Centre St. not far away, as spokes in a traffic wheel. Suggestions re: the Roxbury Prep project from a neighbor who attended the 2/13 mtg.

1. Anawan Extension will present a problem. Cars will wait to pick-up students, thereby clogging the turn-around area. Parents and others may just "run into school for a moment to drop something off/pick something up", again causing back-up on Anawan. Any back-up will spill over onto Belgrade as cars wait to turn onto Anawan. A traffic cop may need to be stationed on Anawan and actually give out tickets....

Also, cars exiting Anawan Ext and trying to make a left turn onto Belgrade will cause traffic to back up on Anawan Ext. Suggestion: allow only a right-hand turn as cars exit Anawan. The traffic study estimate of 4 additional seconds delay exiting Anawan Ext seems very unrealistic.

2. Parking in the vicinity of the school should be for residents only. Signage and enforcement are critical.

3. The trash issue is important to reconsider. Wheeling trash bins to the curb has to be minutely coordinated with pick-up of the trash. Several trash bins waiting on the sidewalk will take up valuable space and hinder foot traffic.

4. Someone at the town meeting raised the issue of deliveries and the lack of a loading dock. If these deliveries occur during school entrance or exiting times OR during rush hour traffic, major congestion will result on Belgrade.

5. If 40% of the students leave at dismissal, that will involve 224 kids. Even if only 10% of these (only 22 kids) are picked up, Anawan Ext. becomes clogged and traffic is backed up onto Belgrade.

6. After school, kids (being kids) will try to beat the train and run across the tracks, if they are running late and need to catch it OR if they are just on a dare. An adult has to be posted to monitor the situation.

7. Buses taking kids to athletic practices will need to load and unload on Belgrade, as too many pickup cars will be on Anawan Ext..

In sum, several transportation issues still need to be resolved.

I am among the hundreds of neighbors of 361 Belgrade Avenue, Roslindale, who oppose the construction of a facility at 361 Belgrade Ave. that will accommodate 600+ individuals.

As a longtime resident and home owner in West Roxbury, only one block from this location, I believe this project would greatly harm the community. In addition, I am not the only person who is concerned for the safety of the students due to congestion from cars, buses and other types of transportation in this community.

When one invests in a home and a community, people look for many things including schooling, congestion, traffic, and ease of transportation. I attended high school in Roslindale because there was no high school in West Roxbury. Many students attend high school outside their community. While I am open to change, there is a breaking point. Look at your own homes and how you would react to the kind of change that this particular project would bring. There is also a massive amount of buildings and projects approved and others seeking approval for this area including apartments and condos. This is a busy suburban Boston area. If anything, it would be better to build apartments/condos/senior housing on this sight rather than the project that is being proposed.

We have been told that the school will also be used evenings and on weekends (which will include parents and families). The commuter rail does not run on weekends. Where will people park? I have been told by some residents, who have health issues that they are frightened that they will have to park further and further away and it will become even more difficult to get to and from their cars/homes.

We also have been told that travel will be increased by only 1-2 minutes. I feel we have been made to feel that we are selfish to complain about this issue. I can guarantee that it takes much more that 1 to 2 minutes in additional time to navigate the increased traffic even now!!! There is no such thing as an average delay!!! Proponents of the project have said that this problem is happening all over the city. Should we continue to add to this problem? Should we succumb to this thinking? We have been told to just "get over it".

Try turning left on Anawan Avenue where you will come to a six-way intersection on the West Roxbury Parkway, Anawan Avenue, and Beech Street. Frequently, cars traveling on the Parkway do not stop when the light turns red, traffic backs up across the intersection preventing cars from Anawan Ave. and Beech St. from moving through the green light. Enforcement has told us that they do not have enough coverage to address this situation.

The charter school has said they will monitor congestion problems. How is the school going to

monitor their students, staff and school? As a teacher for 35 years and ultimately retiring from Boston Latin School after working in many other Boston schools, I know that those who are asked to monitor these issues (often due to other things going on) do not always show up to take care of these problems. The charter school tells the community to monitor any problems. So, the community/hard working people now need to monitor this in addition to being "patient" with increased travel time? Have you studied the massive traffic/congestion on the West Roxbury Parkway including the area of the school? The traffic study that was done is ridiculous. Can there not be an independent traffic study? Can we see this study? Can there not be a discussion of available square footage per student?

Those who support the school have often told us we do not care about the students. They say "this is our school" as if we are against education and students. As a teacher in Boston for 35 years, this cannot be further from the truth. However, we also deserve the kind of community we have worked hard for. I believe they have not listened to what we are saying. Our concerns have NEVER been about the students (unless it has to do with safety). It may be "their school" but I feel this is "our community" where residents have worked hard for a good quality of life. I have lived here most of my life. People in favor of the project have from the start used unflattering and untruthful descriptions of us. Do they realize that it is people in this community that has made it the type of place they want to build their school? We have a right to make our reasons heard and understood.

Proponents of the project say they want a good education for their students. We are NOT against students. We are against the building in this specific area. We feel this is not the best location in size and square footage for this project. We have been told by architects in the area that building this project is a mistake.

We have repeatedly heard that this is "their school", one which has free tuition. It is not free tuition. It is paid for by the tax payers. Now the taxes we pay will take away from our community's quality of life that we have worked so hard for.

As a West Roxbury resident, I have witnessed all of the traffic jams that occur in the intersection. Since it is an area that connects 7 streets, there is no excess space for a school that holds 500 people, including the staff's vehicles and buses.

In the morning (around 6-8am), there is a large mass of vehicles that attempt to rush past the red lights which results in several automobile crashes. As a high school student who attends Boston Latin School, I have to commute from my house to the city utilizing the resources of the MBTA. There are several bus stops and a commuter rail stop near the area. Since there is already so much traffic caused by ordinary cars, the buses are delayed which makes commuters like myself, late to school or work. There is already so much gridlock in the intersection; if an entire school of 500 students from all over Boston were to commute to this area, the delays would be even worse, and nobody would be punctual in getting to their destination.

Unlike my school's area, there are no places for students to hang out while waiting for parents to pick them up or to just pass time. There are only houses nearby, and if 500 unfamiliar students were to roam around the neighborhood, none of the residents would feel safe.

Message Dear Committee and city and state officials,

I oppose this project and have written comments similar to the ones I'm writing again in previous forums. I've also spoken publicly about my opposition to Roxbury Prep becoming my direct neighbor at the meeting on 2/7. I have now read the comments from the 2/13 meeting. I can't emphasize enough the negative impact that 500 + students, 70 + staff and who knows how many families and members of community organizations that offer services to Roxbury Prep will have on the neighborhood in which I live. It will impact us via Commuter Rail traffic- on a line not meant to accommodate that number of riders. It will impact us via the bus line- which will mean additional buses running up Belgrade Ave and large numbers of people waiting on a small plot of land. It will impact the neighborhood noise, our mornings getting out to work, our evenings returning home, how we spend time outside, how our family and friends access our homes. It will bring additional service trucks to the access road on Anawam- which leads into my driveway and also the driveway into the Roxbury Prep garage (causing blockages in high peak times since this is also supposed to be the "kiss and turn"). This is more than a M-F 8-3 (we can stagger drop off to minimize impact on the neighborhood) because good schools open early and stay open late; there are supposedly sports and afterschool activities, the building is supposedly also a community resource (basketball games, tables outside etc.). This is a 7 day/wk building. I've written this before but it's important to state again- unlike other people in roslindale who live near schools- that already existed in the neighborhood- had a choice to rent or buy there, fully aware of the neighborhood culture that the school brings. I did not buy a home in a neighborhood like that- and I don't want to live next to a school. I feel like that should be really important.

Finally- the impact on West Rox Prkway and Belgrade will be substantial. There have been 2 accidents in that intersection recently. Traffic backs up to Washington St, Centre St and past the Holy Name rotary. These will only increase with that many cars entering and exiting on such a small corner plot. There was just a death in the neighborhood (on Centre st.) due to increased traffic. It seems very likely that a property with that many people coming in and out of it will only make things worse.

This potential will not be realized, however, in the presence of vacant or abandoned lots, as well as auto-centric uses such as the Clay Auto Center that currently sits at and badly underutilizes this location. Activating this location with a school will change the character of the area for the better, and yield tangible benefits in the form of increased foot traffic (from both students and staff) to neighboring businesses in both West Roxbury and Roslindale. It is primarily for this reason that we support the project.

We note that much of the controversy and opposition to the project has involved transportation and parking issues. We believe rather than serving as a justification to oppose this project (or further diminish its scale), these concerns present an opportunity and an important reminder of the need to better coordinate transportation planning with land use decisions. These improvements could include a protected bicycle lane (two-way cycle track) along much or all of the road; spacious sidewalks with ample greenery and other placemaking amenities; as well as improved geometry at intersections and pedestrian crossings to improve safety for all users.

Particular attention should be given to providing for a safe pedestrian crossing across Belgrade Avenue at Anawan Avenue; this is a key crossing point for reaching the Bellevue Commuter Rail Station as well as the bus stop on Belgrade Avenue. We should not have to wait for a pedestrian death or serious injury to occur to justify improvements.



We believe it is important that these subsidies--both for construction workers as well as all employees of the school when built--be made a condition of approval of the project, and that they be sufficient to completely cover the cost of all such passes.

Finally, we understand the data strongly support the notion that the vast majority of students and many faculty will commute to the school by means other than driving, most notably by mass transit, but also by foot and bicycle. My home on Belgrade Avenue is in close proximity to the proposed site for Roxbury Prep, operated by a New York charter school company. At both of the recent BPDA public meetings for the proposed high school, I listened to all the vagaries of the project presented by the proponent's representatives. It is difficult to understand how a project of this scope that clearly is not well thought out reaches the point of making a public presentation to the community. For a public charter school, there's not much public information available or transparency with transactions surrounding this project.

If I wanted to build an addition to my home, I would face far greater scrutiny. However, despite all the zoning violations, lot restrictions, student enrollment and safety issues, and impact on the immediate neighbors that encompass this project, it is moving forward in the process under a BPDA small project review. Educational uses may be allowed on this tiny parcel of land, but I don't think anyone involved in making that designation ever envisioned cramming well over 600 individuals on it.

The proponent claims the smaller building project is in response to the immediate neighborhood's concerns. I don't recall being at a neighborhood meeting where anyone suggested a smaller building with the same issues would be better.

It appears the proponent is trying to circumvent the process. They made some hard to believe assurances at the BPDA public meetings about student enrollment and the building size. Aren't there such things as permit amendments, building additions, acquiring additional property, and the like no matter what is put in writing for this project at this time? There's always tomorrow to expand. They heard the immediate neighborhood concerns and objections loud and clear at previous meetings in 2017 when the original intent was to build a larger building requiring a BPDA large project review and their solution is to ignore us.

After the 2017 preliminary meetings, the proponent did "extensive" community outreach further away from the proposed site where it is easier to shape opinions with individuals who are not directly impacted. The proponent's poorly developed plan based on generalizations might appeal to a broader base. Immediate neighbors have significant concerns and object to this project at this location.

During their recent public presentation, the proponent's representatives indifferently pointed to buildings near the proposed site. They had to be reminded the buildings are someone's home. At both meetings, some immediate neighbors, as close as the next-door condominiums, stated that the proponent has never attempted to reach out to them over the course of the past two years. That is how limited their outreach was with regard to the immediate neighborhood and highlights their lack of concern with the impact of their proposed project.

The proposed site is located in a dense mostly residential neighborhood made even denser by recent real estate development. It is at the intersection of Belgrade Avenue and West Roxbury Parkway, near a heavily traveled rotary, and next to the Bellevue commuter rail station.

The commuter rail is a key component of the proponent's transportation plan. Potentially, this means hundreds of students will be traveling through the neighborhood's small one track rail station. There is no significant evidence of safety measures put in place by the proponent to

convince me that is a good idea. There is nothing but the empty assurances the proponent's representatives offered at the BPDA public meetings. The same empty assurances apply for embarking and disembarking MBTA buses by hundreds more students.

Providing bus and train schedules and ridership statistics for a reverse commute is not adequate and would be laughable if it didn't involve students and neighborhood commuters. I got the impression the proponent's representatives had a dismissive attitude to questions about transportation safety and logistics. After all, they assured us, no one has been killed or seriously injured at their current sites. This is not a simple building project. It is not like some of their smaller sites. It is a significantly larger project involving hundreds of school children, and a clear safety plan should already be in place for consideration. That is not something the proponent should be allowed to figure it out after the fact out of public view with no oversight. For this lack of good judgment alone, their project should not be allowed to proceed.

The proponents say our neighborhood needs a high school, yet Roxbury Prep uses a citywide lottery to fill their seats. Roslindale and West Roxbury students are unlikely to get a seat since far more middle school students will be advancing than the proposed maximum capacity of 562 high school students.

The high school has 568 students according to the 2018-19 enrollment data on the state's Department of Education website. High school enrollment will grow to 550 according to their BPDA application, and they claim they are serving "approximately 800 students" on Roxbury Prep High School's website. This is very confusing and conflicting data. Either way, there will not be enough seats to meet the needs of their current (950, from DOE website; 950, BPDA application; or 940, Roxbury Prep website) middle school students at the proposed high school—388 will not get a seat as they advance. There will be no seamless transition to high school for them. That's a lot of students for the proponent to overlook if educating children is the their main concern.

The proponent does not have a sound plan in place to meet the current and future needs of their own students. Crowding 500, 600, 700, 800, 900, however many hundreds of students they would like to fit on less than an acre of land falls short of anything resembling responsible planning. On their website, they claim, "By 2019, we will serve 1,800 students at three middle school campuses and a high school." With that as their goal, how does this proposed project make any sense? It doesn't.

A portion of this tiny parcel of land includes public parkland along West Roxbury Parkway with a deed restriction that it can only be used for parking purposes. The parkland is currently used for sales and storage of unregistered used cars. How did that parkland arrangement happen? Why was the restriction not enforced? How is that happening with today's strict standards of protecting our green spaces?

The proposed high school will generate an influx of well over 600 individuals a day into the neighborhood. It's also important to note additional congestion and traffic will continue in the evening and on weekends as they plan to rent out multi-purpose areas—they claim this will benefit the neighborhood. For large events, they plan to provide valet parking. Where? Our driveways?

The roads around the proposed site were not built to handle the current amount of traffic, and I will venture to guess that other infrastructure such as water and sewer will need serious upgrading. Yet, the proponent takes these safety and quality of life issues as nuisances. Conversely, poor development planning by the proponent should not be a detriment to the immediate neighborhood.

It rings hollow when proponents say traffic delays are a small price to pay for the education of children. At the public meetings, we were informed a few of their staff travel up to a half hour or

more in slow traffic between the two current sites. There was an especially exasperating moment when a staff member told us that instead of sitting in that traffic, he would be able to walk a short distance to work. This is while several hundred students will travel longer distances both to and from the site on public transportation for up to an hour if they're lucky and there are no service delays or cancellations. It appears inconvenience for students to accommodate the staff is preferable.

The proponent has unlimited funds at their disposal to hire attorneys and PR people to push their project. Those funds could be better used to finding a suitable location to unify their school and meet their needs. Not for a moment do I believe the proponent's claim that an exhaustive search was made to find a suitable location. Someone competent should be hired to carry out a professional and productive Boston site location search.

My opinion is the New York charter school company, supported with our tax dollars, is telling the students and parents of the middle and high school that this project is good enough for them. I say they deserve better than this substandard excuse of a modern high school building on a tiny parcel of land for all the money that is being thrown at it. My neighbors and I deserve better than to have our concerns ignored.

The immediate neighbors are clearly outmatched in terms of resources—no attorneys, no PR people, and no unlimited funds. We have voiced our concerns at meetings, signed petitions, sent letters to our elected officials, put up signs, made phone calls, and handed out flyers. We have done everything a private citizen can do in the hope our concerns would be heard.

The proponent's PR people responded to our strong objections to their project by insinuating we are racists, directing ageist remarks at some of us, and belittling and misrepresenting GBANA, our neighborhood association (I live on the wrong side of the tracks to join LANA—the tracks are a membership boundary line—how appropriate). Residents directly impacted by this project have a right to voice their concerns and objections and receive answers to their questions. The proponent's insults are an attempt to discredit and trivialize our concerns about their poorly planned project.

This school project serves only those who benefit monetarily: the auto dealer who owns the land, the developer, architects, attorneys, contractors, PR people, and the New York charter school company. They, among a few others, are the only ones who stand to gain from this project.

Much of the new development in our community brings to mind the "revitalization" of the West End. It is a different time and a different approach, but it is exactly the same kind of maneuvering by self-serving individuals who flaunt their indifference and use excessive influence without any regard to how they impact a community. One of the comments repeatedly expressed in the neighborhood about this project is that "it's a done deal." It troubling to hear that is what residents think. The apparent lack of good judgment and good data exhibited by the proponent in planning this development is evident in various aspects of this deal. Some aspects are vague or invisible. In the public interest, this project, no matter what the size, should not move forward. We need responsible planning and development of our neighborhood.

Tom and I would like to go on the record as strong opponents of the proposal to build a new High School for Roxbury Prep at 361 Belgrade Avenue. Despite changing the proposal to barely meet the criteria for small development, the proposal remains way too large. With the reduction in size the Recommended Criteria for Square Feet/Student are only slightly above 1/3 of recommended guidelines. A new and wonderful school should meet all of those guidelines, have outdoor space, access to playing fields and a safe environment. Building immediately adjacent to train tracks is not a safe environment. A drop-off area that blocks the egress from an already developed small condo building garage is not a safe environment. At meetings, other recent builds have been cited that have less space than this one. Should we continue to condone the building of sub standard educational facilities in the city of Boston? We have 14 schools within 2.5 miles of this site. These schools already exist and have serious impact on our traffic and transportation. How can we, in good conscience, add yet another? The MBTA is already overloaded. The Needham Line is one track. How will our commuters get to their jobs in Boston, already a major challenge due to the condition of our public transportation, with the addition of close to 600 students and staff that we are being told will use public transportation? The public information meetings have been much more pep rallies for RP than informational. RP students, parents and faculty are champions of their school. Why they are rallying for a sub standard facility that just happens to be new is a mystery to us.

The decisions around these proposals should not be based on a "popularity contest" of who makes the most phone calls. Message My wife and I are residents of Belgrade Ave., Roslindale, for more than forty years. In recent years, new apartment buildings have been built on Belgrade Ave. each containing more dwelling units than the existing triple-deckers predominant in this area.

In 2017, we heard about a proposal to construct a high school at 361 Belgrade Ave., a site owned by Clay Chevrolet, presently selling used cars. We went to a Roxbury Prep presentation at the District E-5 police station.

Representatives from Roxbury Prep proposed to construct a high school, on a parcel of land (less than an acre in size) three to four stories high, to contain over 900 students and faculty. They would arrive by MBTA commuter rail, buses and cars. There was almost unanimous opposition to this proposal. Most objections centered on this location being inappropriate for such use, because of condensing so many people in a small space (for a high school) and traffic problems at the intersection of Belgrade Ave. and the West Roxbury Parkway, both bearing major traffic during weekdays. Other objections included that few children from the Roslindale/West Roxbury areas would be able to attend as this is a charter school where enrollment is determined by lottery. We thought this was the end of the matter.

In January and February 2019, we attended meetings at Annunciation Church on VFW Parkway hosted by the BPDA. The hall was packed. About a third of the people wore blue T-shirts supporting the school. Roxbury Prep presented a new plan for a three level building, containing about 562 students plus faculty on the subject site.

Testimony was heard from people from both sides of this issue. However, the people who testified in favor would not be affected by the problems that would be caused by construction of this school. It is my impression that the people who support this proposal were enticed by promises of favoritism.

It is my further impression that Roxbury Prep intends to build additional stories on the building in the near future, in order that they may expand enrollment to the numbers they proposed in 2017, i.e., over 900 students and faculty.

The West Roxbury High School building, which has been under enrolled for years and in need of repairs, is to be closed at the end of this school year and eventually reconstructed. Even if this is true, I don't think enrollment will be increased.

I am not opposed to charter schools; they are a good alternative. I think the City of Boston should lease or sell this building to Roxbury Prep. Instead of spending millions for construction on a dubious site much too small for such use, Roxbury Prep should spend it on an existing building architecturally designed as a high school. This would be a better solution in the long term and allow for future expansion.

This letter is going via email to All Boston City Councilors, State Representatives Angelo Scaccia and Ed Coppinger as well as BPDA Project Manager and Director Aisling Kerr and Brian Golden respectively and State Senator Mike Rush along with Mayor Martin Walsh.

My name is Nancy Geourntas and I live in the neighborhood directly affected by the proposed building at 361 Belgrade Avenue. I live on Iona Street, directly across from the proposed site.

I would first like to start by saying that after attending several community meetings regarding this proposed project, I am appalled by the people supporting this project who call those opposed to this project as racist! I am proud to say that I live in one of the most diverse neighborhoods in the City of Boston and that this project has nothing to do with the color, race or ethnicity of the students who would attend this school and it is a shame that when things don't go a certain way, the race card is always in play! **This should never happen.** As a matter of fact, we were never privy to any information on the race, ethnicity or color of any person who would attend this school and quite frankly, it doesn't matter! Let's keep this where it belongs, with the project itself.

What does matter is that I have several issues with this proposed project. First of all, each time I attended one of the community meetings, the project specs changed. It is hard to believe what the actual project will end up looking like based on all the changes, and it also leaves something to be desired in terms of trust with this company proposing the project because at every turn there was a different story. This company has caused much friction with us, the direct abutters!

Our community was also told that this plan was in place because the school had many different locations and they felt it would be most efficiently run if they could unify all their locations and have all their students under one roof. With that said, I am not sure why they have now reduced the square footage and number of students to half the capacity of their original plan since it completely detracts from their overall goal. What happens when they have more students enrolled in this school..... do they build yet another building or add another floor?? It doesn't make sense and quite honestly, if this was their goal for the students, then it doesn't seem right or fair to the students to keep them in all the separate buildings across the city. The students deserve better!

There was a very large community meeting held at the Annunciation Cathedral Hall on Wednesday, January 30, 2019. My concern with this meeting was that there was not one person taking notes on the concerns of the attendees especially those in opposition. If there were, I request here in writing to see them. There were many people there touting blue t-shirts who were for the project and most of these folks were students from the other locations. These are not people who live in the neighborhood around the proposed location who are concerned with the direct negative impacts on the neighborhood.

This project is going to cause additional traffic stresses to an already stressed out area. There will be students driving to school, and there is absolutely nowhere to park. My street is over full capacity with cars of actual residents who live there, never mind additional vehicles. I realize the school has a no driving policy for students, but they really will not be able to control that.

I did not see any concrete details about the transportation plan for this proposal just suggestions and speculation about the MBTA/Commuter Rail accommodating students for arrival and departure from the school. No direct verifiable agreement and/or commitment was announced or produced at any meeting. This has been discussed since this process started and here we are almost a year into it and no firm plans about the public transportation issues and the impact on commuters who utilize commuter rail every day to get to work.

On the traffic study presentation, it was quite incomprehensible and to tell you the truth, I do not even think one was even conducted. The consultant making the presentation was all over the place with no clear cut answer to any question from the meeting attendees. Just a lot of double talk.... No clear coherent results that accompany genuine traffic studies.

The use of Anawan Avenue as a "drop off and pick-up" is another concern of direct abutters as this will utilize a public roadway for a private purpose. This should be moved to be part of the project within the parcel boundaries not on a public street where traffic and backups will be a daily occurrence and residents that live directly across from this parcel have serious concerns about access to their right-of-way into their property.

Also, I'm concerned with student safety. Kids will be kids and I fear for their safety. I don't think it's a good idea to build a school next to a rail line! We have already lost kids by accidents on these tracks!

There are two other major projects already slated to happen in this very same vicinity. One is diagonally across from the 361 Belgrade Ave, at the triangle. A condo development is going up there, so that has to be taken into consideration as well as the project on the same side of the street as 361 Belgrade Ave., one block down, another housing development is slated to go up. This adds to the stresses of the neighborhood already in a very significant way.

I understand that this company declined many other sites proposed for this project. I recommend they re-evaluate the overall goal and choose another site more fitting for their needs. Even in its reduced size, it's not the place to build a school.





Comments: I'm writing about the projects at 400 Belgrade and 361 Belgrade on the Roslindale/West Roxbury line. I live 1 block from 400 Belgrade, 2 blocks from 361. I know that 400 Belgrade has been approved, I hope with an adjustment of pulling back from the narrow corner at Beech/Belgrade so that visibility at that intersection is improved. I wish that the City would use this (and any) opportunity to make safer intersections; a second one could happen if a cross-walk for 400 Belgrade crosses Beech St just north of the Kenneth St intersection, making the Beech/Kenneth St intersection safer with more visibility. Otherwise, we obviously need more housing and I appreciate the modifications that the developer made so far so that the building won't be 5 stories tall towering over the neighborhood. I still worry about the eventual people who will live in a building on a traffic island (with traffic going in both directions on all sides), but if adjustments are made, the project could make the intersections safer for everyone. (Has anybody studied if Beech St needs to be made one-way?) As for 361 Belgrade, I'd rather see another apartment building, including more affordable units. Housing would fit that lot more effectively than a school. (If a school is to be built, it should be a BPS school, not a charter that's part of a chain controlled by a company located on Broadway, NYC. Who will the City be paying rent to for the lease on that land?) I do not have and will not have a "Stop 361 Belgrade" sign in my yard. It's a complicated issue; the sign is too blunt, too easy to assign unintended meanings. I am, however, against Roxbury Prep being built at 361 Belgrade. As a process point, since I assume that the BPDA wants to develop and isn't actually trying to alienate residents in the neighborhoods, both projects involved badly rolled out processes for community information and input, though the school's process was far worse, seemingly a deliberately polarizing process. There are so many, many, many ways they could have conducted the process more effectively. Their process leaves a stain on them, on the neighborhood, on the BPDA and on the Mayor.

As a West Roxbury resident and mother to four children, I have seen great changes in the BPS over the 25 years we have been (and continue to be) in our public school system.

With regards to the proposed location of the Roxbury Prep Charter High School, I feel that [361 Belgrade Ave.](#) is not appropriate for such a large high school community - especially in regards to traffic. I understand that many of the Roxbury Prep students and faculty currently travel to and from school via public transportation, however it is naïve to think that such a good high school option will continue to only serve those in the city who travel to and from school via MBTA/commuter rail. As a matter of fact, I suspect that within four years of this charter school moving into West Roxbury, many more "local" families will also begin to choose and hope to win a Lottery seat for their child to attend Roxbury Prep. At the proposed location, it is shortsighted not to plan for more local students coming to join this school community - and this, in turn, will add even more traffic to the area... as local parents will probably be dropping their kids off to school. A project of this size and density will only increase the amount of congestion in an already heavily trafficked, main route into the downtown Boston area. Nowhere else in the city do you have a school with 900 students, faculty and staff squeezed into such limited square footage, and specifically not one surrounded by residences as this area is. Contrary to the school's letter of intent it is not "a highly commercialized" area. There is a "mom and pop pizza shop, a yoga studio and an independent dentist and eye doctor's office on Belgrade. In fact there are even *more housing units* being built within 100 yards of the proposed location!

At one of the very early community meetings, the school stated that the majority of their students will use public transportation in a reverse commute. As it stands currently the commuter rail serves approximately 400 people at most over the course of the day at the station. I commute to and from the Bellevue stop each day and most days there are not enough cars for everyone to sit by the time it gets there. Often times I stand! It is unreasonable to expect that the commuter rail could handle 600-800 arriving at one time *regardless of direction of travel*. They would need to add cars and staff. The school has shown no evidence of concrete agreements with the MBTA proving they are willing or able to handle out this reverse commute. Nor was there any mention of ability to increase the number of buses running from Forest Hills, but again this increases traffic congestion on the roadways, and Belgrade Avenue to Roslindale Square is already at a standstill in the afternoon hours, again regardless of direction!

The proposed "Kiss and Drop" at the end of Anawan Ave., allowing parents to circle in to drop students off, will cause huge back ups on Belgrade Ave. in both directions at the height of commute times in the area. Cars entering the turn around on Anawan will also directly block the *only driveway access* to the condos next door at 345 Belgrade.

As students reach driving age, what's to stop them from driving in and parking a block or two up on a side street and walking to school? People using the commuter rail already do this instead of paying at the lot. Extending the "Resident Only" areas was suggested but that becomes an burden to those who live in the neighborhood without driveways (and there are many), or who have guests visiting, by having to deal with stickers and visitor passes.

At the recent pro-school rally families were told the facility would be used for events for all grades of the school. This is extremely alarming from a parking standpoint. Where do all those cars park for sporting events, graduations, performances, fund raisers etc.? Evening hours when residents are home leave little if any open street parking spaces on Belgrade or any other street in this already dense area. The limited parking at the school would not be nearly enough if even a fraction of the 800 students' families chose to attend events. The builder at the rally also had reworked drawings with LESS parking than was originally shown at previous meetings.

It is also my opinion that the location is a huge safety concern! When I worked for BPS, there were two mandatory fire drills each year. Where do 900 students, faculty and staff safely go should there be a catastrophic emergency such as a fire? They are bound on one side by the commuter tracks, and have two major roadways and intersections on the other side. Using the small commuter rail parking lot is not viable as it would entail crossing the tracks, and it would be full of cars. If students must go across Belgrade or head towards the Parkway, that is directly in the path of services (police and fire) rushing to the scene. Would students then be lining the sidewalks for blocks? What would happen if they are unable to return to the school? It would be very unsafe for the students and drivers alike, not having removed spaces large enough for the children to regroup so arrangements could be made to get them safely home.

Will the current municipal services (police, fire, ambulance, transit) be adequate to support the addition of a school this size, *as well as the other three housing projects already approved* for the immediate area (317 Belgrade, 400 Belgrade and 1721 Centre Street)?

I certainly believe all families in Boston deserve quality public school education choices and do not wish to deny anyone those choices. However, as a homeowner and abutter, I feel I must speak out against building the school at this location. Simply put it is the wrong place for a project of that size and density. The safety issues and increased traffic and congestion caused will have an immediate and dramatically negative effect on the neighborhood and day to day lives.

The area would be better served by putting in affordable senior housing possibly with limited commercial businesses at street level. Too many seniors who were born and raised families here but now wish to downsize from the responsibilities of a single family home, are being forced out of the city because they can't afford the "luxury rentals" being built.

I hope you will take my concerns and those of my neighbors who feel the same into consideration, and support our efforts to prevent this project from moving forward.

Hello again. Our paths have crossed at both at the BAC and my (prelude) time as Vice Chairman of the BRA (now BPDA). Congratulations to you to hold critical leadership for our City.

I wish to seek your help and the help of the BPDA. I have been active in West Roxbury and Roslindale for many decades. My Dad was the State Representative for a quarter century.

A controversy has arisen in WR and Roslindale over the siting of a Charter School (*Roxbury Prep*) at the former site of an automobile dealership at the bottom of my adjacent street, Anawan Avenue.

There are many concerns the neighborhood has about this site. The first concern is for the students of the school. This site has no space for a schoolyard or parking for either teachers or pupils. The Needham Commuter rail track is located in the back yard of the school. There is no backyard. The school is located on the West Roxbury Parkway and Belgrade Ave. This is a very busy intersection with heavy traffic all day and very intense at commuter hours. The site itself has been a car dealership for many years. It is a toxic site due to the residue from oil regularly drawn from engines.

The school is currently leasing the Most Precious Blood School in Hyde Park. This site has a large schoolyard parking for all, and is located across from the commuter railroad and other transportation. The school seems fixated on the Belgrade site, even to the detriment of the students. This is an improper site for a school. The Globe listed the salary of the principal of the school as \$250,000 a year. This salary is inordinate for the principal of one school. The teachers, non-union, are not paid in a proportionate rate to the principal.

The proximate cause of this letter to you is untoward behavior on the part of the school. GBANA is the neighborhood association that has had meetings about the school site. They have NOT taken a stand; and if anything most members are opposed. The school sent out a flier co-opting the logo of GBANA and claiming the organization is in support of the school, a falsehood. In my nearly 80 years here in Boston I have not heard of such rogue activity by a group desiring a permit. This process has not been transparent or straightforward.

Please look into this situation. We believe the neighborhood is being denied fundamental due process by reason of some rogue communications from the school with the affected neighborhood -- and perhaps with City Hall.

Re: Clay Chevrolet, Proposed Site of Roxbury Prep at 361 Belgrade Avenue

Dear Board Members:

I write to express my concerns about the proposed construction of a building for Roxbury Prep at 361 Belgrade Avenue. I have been informed that Suffolk Construction has begun work at the site of the former Clay Chevrolet site, despite the existence of a number of regulatory preconditions that have not yet been satisfied.

I share with many of my neighbors in the Bellevue Hill and Belgrade Avenue areas a number of legitimate concerns that need to be addressed by your agency. None of these concerns are based upon NIMBYism or racial animus, as the Boston Globe has recently insinuated.

361 Belgrade location is at the intersection of West Roxbury Parkway and Belgrade Avenue. That area is already overburdened on a daily basis with automobile traffic, largely caused by single passenger. suburban commuters who have made it virtually impossible for local residents to drive in our own neighborhood during increasingly longer morning and afternoon commutes.

Many of us who live in Boston are philosophically opposed to the expansion of charter schools. Roxbury Prep is owned by the for-profit Uncommon Schools and its policies, financing, practices and the hybrid compensation of its executives have not been publicly disclosed. As a charter school, the facility would also be exempt from oversight by Boston School Committee, yet it would siphon off money for the Boston Public Schools for every child it enrolls.

We are concerned that without a vibrant, inclusive public school system with the highest academic standards and best educational practices, Boston will be unable to attract and maintain young families who will commit themselves to the city's future. The expansion of Roxbury Prep will do nothing to address that concern.

361 Belgrade Avenue is not an appropriate site for a high school. Because of the dense traffic, the safety of pupils who would attend the school should be paramount concern. Further, the proposed facility would lack space for a cafeteria, a gymnasium and any athletic fields.

A number of us also question why the owners of Clay Chevrolet should be permitted to enrich themselves with a 99 year lease after the formerly public land that it now owns was transferred five years after the voters approved Article 97, the purpose of which was to maintain public lands in perpetuity.

In addition to these public policy concerns, there are significant legal issues that have not yet been addressed. In 1894 the Metropolitan Park Commission took private property that included a parcel of land that is now a part of the property at 361 Belgrade Avenue. See the attachment 1, the public taking deed. The Metropolitan Park Commission was established in 1892 and appointed by the legislature. In 1919, the commission was renamed the Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) after merging with the Metropolitan Water and Sewer Commission.

West Roxbury Parkway is an historic parkway that extends from Washington Street in Boston, Massachusetts, where the Enneking Parkway runs south, to Horace James Circle in Brookline, where it meets the Hammond Pond Parkway. The parkway serves as a connector between Stony Brook Reservation and Hammond Pond Reservation (via Hammond Pond Parkway). West Roxbury Parkway itself was built between 1919 and 1929 and added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2006. The parkway was developed by the Metropolitan District Commission beginning around the turn of the 20th century, it was built in collaboration with the City of Boston, and is maintained by the city.

Although land was taken for the construction of the parkway as early as 1894, actual construction did not begin on its southernmost section until 1919, when the section from Washington Street to Belgrade Avenue was built. It was extended to Centre Street in 1920, and provided access via that road to the Arnold Arboretum, one of the city's objectives in the development of the parkway. The segment to Weld Street was completed in 1924, and the last section, to its terminus at Newton Street in Brookline, was completed in 1929. In 1924 construction of Bellevue Hill Road (originally called West Border Road) was completed.

In 1972, the voters of Massachusetts by referendum Article 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution. See attachment 2, the text of the amendment. Then Attorney General Quinn's advisory opinion states that the provisions of Article 97 should be interpreted broadly. See attachment 3, the Attorney General's advisory opinion.

Five years later, in 1977, the Massachusetts General Court directed to MDC to convey some 6,275 feet of public land that was a part of West Roxbury Parkway to Clay Chevrolet in exchange for \$3,000.00, in an apparent sweetheart deal. See attachment 4, the legislature's vote. It is unclear whether Massachusetts General Court's action was taken by a voice vote or roll call that was recorded, but it does not appear that a 2/3ds vote of either house, authorized the conveyance.

The deed that conveys the land to Clay Chevrolet is a restrictive deed and expressly provides that "said premises are conveyed" subject to six specific conditions. Restriction 5 provides that "said premises are conveyed subject to the condition that if at any time said premises shall cease to be used for parking purposes then, and in that event, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts shall enter upon said premises and repossess itself of its former estate therein..." See attachment 5, the MDC deed that conveyed the property to Clay Chevrolet.

The Department of Conservation and Recreation was formed in 2003 under Governor t Romney, when the former Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) and Department of Environmental Management (DEM) were merged to form the DCR.

Attorney General's Quinn's broad interpretation of Article 97 has been underscored by an important decision by the Supreme Judicial Court in *Smith v. Westfield*, 478 Mass. 49 (2017). See attachment 6. The court considered whether Article 97 applied to a parcel of land originally acquired by the city through a tax taking. The Court held that the property was subject to Article 97 because the city, through its actions, clearly expressed its intent to protect the property permanently. See attachment 6, the court's decision.

The MDC's conveyance of the property in 1978 to Clay Chevrolet raises, at a minimum, at least three legal questions that need to be answered by the by the Attorney General of the Commonwealth and by the Boston Law Department:

(1) Don't the restrictions contained in the deed create a compelling legal presumption suggest that the MDC and its successors -in-interest intended continued oversight to protect the public's interest in the property permanently?


(2) If the conveyance of the property was for a specific purpose, doesn't the closing of Howard Chevrolet and the proposed lease of the property to another entity, Roxbury Prep - for an entirely different purpose and with proposed new construction that has never been approved by the DCR - require that the property now revert back to the Commonwealth?

(3) If, as a matter of fact, the land in question is public land subject to Article 97, and was improperly conveyed by the MDC five years after the adoption of Article 97, doesn't that render the conveyance a nullity?

Given the significant public policy and legal concerns, the Boston Planning and Development Agency should request a full legal review from the city's law department and the

Office of the Attorney General before it permits any construction 361 Belgrade Avenue to go forward.

Now therefore we, said Board of Metropolitan Park Commissioners, by virtue of the authority conferred upon us by said act, and of any and every other power and authority us hereto in any wise enabling acting herein in consultation and concurrence with the proper local board, have taken and do hereby take in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and for the benefit of the said Commonwealth and the inhabitants thereof, in manner prescribed in and by said acts and for all the purposes therein provided the lands and rights in land, and all easements, privileges and appurtenances of every name and nature thereto belonging, lying in the City of Boston in the County of Suffolk and shown on plan marked "Plan of Taking for Parkway in West Roxbury by Metropolitan Park Commission", Boston Oct 10, 1894. William Jackson City Engineer, Olmsted, Olmsted & Eliot Landscape Architects, being Metropolitan Park Commissioners Plan No 16 the original of which is to be recorded herewith and the duplicate of which is on file in the official archives of said Commissioners and bounded and described as follows viz: a strip or parcel of land lying next to and northerly and in continuation of the Parkway in West Roxbury. So called described in a taking bearing even date herewith and shown upon Metropolitan Park Commissioners Plan No 13. accompanying the same, beginning at a point marked A on the plan herein first above referred to in the South Easterly side ^{line} of Anawan Avenue, thence running North easterly curving to the right on a radius of three thousand

Attachment 2

Article XCVII. Article XLIX of the Amendments to the Constitution is hereby annulled and the following is adopted in place thereof: - The people shall have the right to clean air and water, freedom from excessive and unnecessary noise, and the natural, scenic, historic, and esthetic qualities of their environment; and the protection of the people in their right to the conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral, forest, water, air and other natural resources is hereby declared to be a public purpose.

The general court shall have the power to enact legislation necessary or expedient to protect such rights.

In the furtherance of the foregoing powers, the general court shall have the power to provide for the taking, upon payment of just compensation therefor, or for the acquisition by purchase or otherwise, of lands and easements or such other interests therein as may be deemed necessary to accomplish these purposes.

Lands and easements taken or acquired for such purposes shall not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of except by laws enacted by a two thirds vote, taken by yeas and nays, of each branch of the general court.

Opinion of the Attorney General Regarding the Disposition of Public Lands Under the “Clean Environment” Amendment to the Constitution of Massachusetts

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OPINION OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL REGARDING
THE DISPOSITION OF PUBLIC LANDS UNDER THE
"CLEAN ENVIRONMENT" AMENDMENT TO THE
CONSTITUTION OF MASSACHUSETTS

In November, 1972, the voters of Massachusetts approved an amendment to the state constitution which established the right to a clean environment for every citizen.¹ Subsequently, the Massachusetts House of Representatives addressed several questions to me, as Attorney General, regarding those provisions in the amendment (Article 97) requiring that acts concerning the disposition of, or certain changes in, the use of public lands be approved by a two-thirds roll call vote of each branch of the Legislature.²

The questions were as follows.

1. Do the provisions of the last paragraph of Article XCVII of the Articles of the Amendments to the Constitution requiring a two-thirds vote by each branch of the general court, before a change can be made in the use or disposition of land and easements acquired for a purpose described in said Article, apply to all land and easements held for such a purpose regardless of the date of acquisition or, in the alternative, do they apply only to land and easements acquired for such purposes after the effective date of said Article of Amendments?

2. Does the disposition or change of use of land held for park purposes requires a two thirds vote, to be taken by the yeas and nays of each branch of the general court, as provided in Article XCVII of the Articles of the Amendments to the Constitution, or would a majority vote of each branch be sufficient for approval?

3. Do the words "natural resources" as used in the first paragraph of Article XCVII of the Articles of the Amendments to the Constitution include ocean, shellfish and inland fisheries; wild birds, including song and insectivorous birds; wild mammals and game; sea and fresh water fish of every description; forests and all uncultivated flora, together with public shade and ornamental trees and shrubs; land, soil and soil resources, lakes, ponds, streams, coastal, underground and surface waters; minerals and natural deposits, as formerly set out in the definition of

the words "natural resources" in paragraph two of section one of chapter twenty-one of the General Laws (of Massachusetts)?

4. Do the provisions of the fourth paragraph of Article XCVII of the Articles of the Amendments to the Constitution apply to any or all of the following means of disposition or change in use of land held for a public purpose: conveyance of land; long-term lease for inconsistent use; short-term lease, two years or less, for an inconsistent use; the granting or giving of an easement for an inconsistent use; or any agency action with regard to land under its control if an inconsistent use?

The proposed amendment to the Constitution was agreed to by the majority of the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives, in joint session, on August 5, 1969 and again on May 12, 1971, and became part of the Constitution by approval by the voters at the state election next following, on November 7, 1972. The full text of Article 97 is as follows:

ART. XCVII. Article XLIX of the Amendments to the Constitution is hereby annulled and the following is adopted in place thereof:—The people shall have the right to clean air and water, freedom from excessive and unnecessary noise, and the natural, scenic, historic, and esthetic qualities of their environment; and the protection of the people in their right to the conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral, forest, water, air and other natural resources is hereby declared to be a public purpose.

The general court shall have the power to enact legislation necessary or expedient to protect such rights.

In the furtherance of the foregoing powers, the general court shall have the power to provide for the taking, upon payment of just compensation therefor, or for the acquisition by purchase or otherwise, of lands and easements or such other interests therein as may be deemed necessary to accomplish these purposes.

Lands and easements taken or acquired for such purposes shall not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of except by laws enacted by a two thirds vote, taken by yeas and nays, of each branch of the general court.

I. QUESTION ONE

The first question of the House of Representatives asks, in effect, whether the two-thirds roll-call vote requirement is retroactive, to be applied to lands and easements acquired prior to the effective date of Article 97, November 7, 1972. For the reasons below, I answer in the affirmative.

The Legislature did not propose this Amendment nor was it approved by the voting public without a sense of history nor void of a

purpose worthy of a constitutional amendment. Examination of our constitutional history firmly establishes that the two-thirds roll-call vote requirement applies to public lands wherever taken or acquired.

Specifically, Article 97 annuls Article 49, in effect since November 5, 1918. Under that Article the Legislature was empowered to provide for the taking or acquisition of lands, easements and interests therein "for the purpose of securing and promoting the proper conservation, development, utilization and control" [of] "agricultural, mineral, forest, water and other natural resources of the commonwealth." Although inclusion of the word "air" in this catalogue as it appears in Article 97 may make this new article slightly broader than the supplanted Article 49 as to purposes for which the Legislature may provide for the taking or acquisition of land, it is clear that land taken or acquired under the earlier Article over nearly fifty years is now to be subjected to the two-thirds vote requirement for changes in use or other dispositions. Indeed all land whenever taken or acquired is now subject to the new voting requirement. The original draftsmen of the Massachusetts Constitution prudently included in Article 10 of the Declaration of Rights a broad constitutional basis for the taking of private land to be applied to public uses, without limitation on what are "public uses." By way of acts of the Legislature as well as through generous gifts of many citizens, the Commonwealth and Massachusetts cities and towns have acquired parkland and reservations. To claim that new Article 97 does not give the same care and protection for all these existing public lands as for lands acquired by the foresight of future legislators or the generosity of future citizens would ignore public purposes deemed important in Massachusetts laws since the beginning of the Commonwealth.

Moreover, if this amendment were only prospective in effect, it would be virtually meaningless. In Massachusetts, with a life commencing in the early 1600s and already cramped for land, it is most unlikely that the Legislature and the voters would choose to protect only those acres hereafter added to the many thousands already held for public purposes. The comment of the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court concerning the earlier Article 49 is applicable here: "It must be presumed that the convention proposed and the people approved and ratified the Forty-ninth Amendment with reference to the practical affairs of mankind and not as a mere theoretical announcement."³

II. QUESTION TWO

In its second question the House asks, in effect, whether the two-thirds roll-call vote requirement applies to land held for park purposes, as the term "park" is generally understood. My answer is in the affirmative, for the reasons below.

One major purpose of Article 97 is to ensure that the people shall have "the right to clean air and water, freedom from excessive and unnecessary noise, and the natural, scenic, historic, and esthetic qualities of their environment." The fulfillment of these rights is uniquely carried out by parkland acquisition. As the Supreme Judicial Court has declared:

The healthful and civilizing influence of parks in or near congested areas of population is of more than local interest and becomes a concern of the State under modern conditions. It relates not only to the public health in its narrow sense, but to broader considerations of exercise, refreshment, and enjoyment.⁴

A second major purpose of Article 97 is "the protection of the people in their right to the conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral, forest, water, air and other natural resources." Parkland protection can afford not only the conservation of forests, water and air but also a means of utilizing these resources in harmony with their conservation. Parkland can undeniably be said to be acquired for the purposes in Article 97 and is thus subject to the two-thirds roll-call requirement.

This question as to parks raises a further practical matter in regard to implementing Article 97 which warrants further discussion. The reasons the Legislature employs to explain its actions can be of countless levels of specificity or generality and land might conceivably be acquired for general recreation purposes or for very explicit uses such as the playing of baseball, the flying of kites, for evening strolls or for Sunday afternoon concerts. Undoubtedly, to the average man, such land would serve as a park but at even a more legalistic level it clearly can also be observed that such land was acquired, in the language of Article 97, because it was a "resource" which could best be "utilized" and "developed" by being "conserved" within a park. But it is not surprising that most land taken or acquired for public use is acquired under the specific terms of statutes which may not match verbatim the more general terms found in Article 10 of the Declaration of Rights of the Constitution or in Articles 39, 43, 49, 51 and 97 of the Amendments. Land originally acquired for limited or specific public purposes is thus not to

be excluded from the operation of the two-thirds roll-call vote requirement for lack of express invocation of the more general purposes of Article 97. Rather the scope of the Amendment is to be very broadly construed, not only because of the greater broadness in "public purpose", changed from "public uses" appearing in Article 49, but also because Article 97 establishes that the protection to be afforded by the Amendment is not only of public uses but of certain express rights of the people.

Thus, all land, easements and interests therein are covered by Article 97 if taken or acquired for "the protection of the people in their right to the conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral, forest, water, air and other natural resources" as these terms are broadly construed. While small greens remaining as the result of constructing public highways may be excluded, it is suggested that parks, monuments, reservations, athletic fields, concert areas and playgrounds clearly qualify. Given the spirit of the Amendment and the duty of the Legislature, it would seem prudent to classify lands and easements taken or acquired for specific purposes not found verbatim in Article 97 as nevertheless subject to Article 97 if reasonable doubt exists concerning their actual status.

III. QUESTION THREE

The third question of the House asks, in effect, how the words "natural resources", as appearing in Article 97, are to be defined.

Several statutes offer assistance to the Legislature, all without limiting what are "natural resources". Massachusetts General Laws (M.G.L.) ch. 21, §1 defines "natural resources", for the purposes of Department of Natural Resources jurisdiction, as including:

ocean, shellfish and inland fisheries; wild birds, including song and insectivorous birds, wild mammals and game; sea and fresh water fish of every description; forests and all uncultivated flora, together with public shade and ornamental trees and shrubs; land, soil and soil resources, lakes, ponds, streams, coastal, underground and surface waters; minerals and natural deposits.

In addition, M.G.L. ch. 12, §11D, establishing a Division of Environmental Protection under the Attorney General, uses the words "natural resources" in such a way as to include air, water, "rivers, streams, flood plains, lakes, ponds or other surface or subsurface water resources" and "seashores, dunes, marine resources, wetlands, open spaces, natural areas, parks or historic districts or sites." M.G.L. ch. 214, §10A, the so-called citizen-suit statute, con-

tains a recitation substantially identical. To these lists Article 97 would add only "agricultural" resources.

It is safe to say, as a consequence, that the term "natural resources" should be taken to signify *at least* these catalogued items. Public lands taken or acquired to conserve, develop or utilize any of these resources are thus subject to Article 97.

It is apparent that the Legislature has never sought to apply any limitation to the term "natural resources" but instead has viewed the term as an evolving one which should be expanded according to the needs of the time and the term was originally inserted in our Constitution for just that reason.⁵ The resources enumerated above should, therefore, be regarded as examples of and not delimiting what are "natural resources."

IV. QUESTION FOUR

The fourth question of the House requires a determination of the scope of activities which is intended by the words: "shall not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of."

The term "disposed" has never developed a precise legal meaning. As the Supreme Court has noted, "The word is *nomen generalissimum*, and standing by itself, without qualification, has no technical signification."⁶ The Supreme Court has indicated however, that "disposition" may include a lease.⁷ Other cases on unrelated subjects suggest that in Massachusetts the word "dispose" can include all forms of transfer no matter how complete or incomplete.⁸

In this absence of precise legal meaning, *Webster's Third New International Dictionary* is helpful. "Dispose of" is defined as "to transfer into new hands or to the control of someone else." A change in physical or legal control would thus prove to be determinative.

I therefore conclude that the "dispositions" for which a two-thirds roll-call vote of each branch of the General Court is required include: transfers of legal or physical control between agencies of government, between political subdivisions, and between levels of government, of lands, easements and interests therein originally taken or acquired for the purposes stated in Article 97, and transfers from public ownership to private. Outright conveyance, takings by eminent domain, long-term and short-term leases of whatever length, the granting or taking of easements and all means of transfer or change of legal or physical control are thereby covered, without limitation and without regard to whether the transfer be for the same or different uses or consistent or inconsistent purposes.

This interpretation affords a more objective test, and is more

easily applied, than "used for other purposes." Under Article 97 that standard must be applied by the Legislature, however, in circumstances which cannot be characterized as a disposition—that is, when a transfer or change in physical or legal control does not occur. A change of use within a governmental agency or within a political subdivision would serve as an apt example. Within any agency or political subdivision any land, easement or interest therein, if originally taken or acquired for the purposes stated in Article 97, may not be "used for other purposes" without the requisite two-thirds roll-call vote of each branch of the Legislature.

It may be helpful to note how Article 97 is to be read with the so-called doctrine of "prior public use," application of which also turns on changes in use. That doctrine holds that

public lands devoted to one public use cannot be diverted to another inconsistent public use without plain and explicit legislation authorizing the diversion.⁹

The doctrine of "prior public use" is derived from many early cases which establish its applicability to transfers between corporations granted limited powers of the Commonwealth, such as eminent domain, and authority over water and railroad easements.¹⁰ The doctrine was also applied at an early date to transfers between such corporations and municipalities and counties.¹¹

The doctrine of "prior public use" has in more modern times been applied to the following transfers between governmental agencies or political subdivisions: (1) a transfer between state agencies;¹² (2) transfers between a state agency and a special state authority;¹³ (3) a transfer between a special state commission and special state authority;¹⁴ (4) transfers between municipalities;¹⁵ (5) transfers between state agencies and municipalities;¹⁶ (6) a transfer between a special state authority and a municipality;¹⁷ (7) a transfer between a state agency and a county;¹⁸ and (8) transfers between counties and municipalities.¹⁹

The doctrine has also been applied to the following changes of use of public lands within governmental agencies or within political subdivisions: (1) intra-agency uses;²⁰ (2) intramunicipality uses;²¹ and (3) intracounty uses.²² The doctrine may also possibly reach *de facto* changes in use,²³ and may be available to protect reservation land held by charitable corporations.²⁴ In addition to these extensions of the doctrine, special statutory protections, codifying the doctrine of "prior public use", are afforded local parkland and commons²⁵ and public cemeteries.²⁶

This is the background against which Article 97 was approved.

The doctrine of "prior public use" requires legislative action, by majority vote, to divert land from one public use to another inconsistent public use. As the scope of the doctrine discussed above indicates, the doctrine requires an act of the Legislature regardless of whether the land in question is held by the Commonwealth, its agencies, special authorities and commissions, political subdivisions or by certain corporations granted powers of the sovereign. And the doctrine applies regardless of whether the public use for which the land in question is held in a conservation purpose.

As to all such changes in use previously covered by the doctrine of "prior public use" the new Article 97 will only change the requisite vote of the Legislature from majority to two-thirds. Article 97 is designed to supplement, not supplant, the doctrine of "prior public use."

Article 97 will be of special significance, though, where the doctrine of "prior public use" has not yet been applied. For instance, legislation and a two-thirds roll-call vote of the Legislature will now, for the first time, be required even where a transfer of land or easement between governmental agencies, between political subdivisions, or between levels of government is made with no change in the use of the land, and even where a transfer is from public control to private.

Whether legislation pending before the General Court is subject to Article 97, or the doctrine of "prior public use," or both, it is recommended that the legislation meet the high standard of specificity set by the Supreme Judicial Court in a case involving the doctrine of "prior public use":

We think it is essential to the expression of plain and explicit authority to divert [public lands] to a new and inconsistent public use that the Legislature identify the land and that there appear in the legislation not only a statement of the new use but a statement or recital showing in some way legislative awareness of the existing public use. In short, the legislation should express not merely the public will for the new use but its willingness to surrender or forgo the existing use.²⁷

Each piece of legislation which may be subject to Article 97 should, in addition, be drawn so as to identify the parties to any planned disposition of the land.

CONCLUSIONS

Article 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution establishes the right of the people to clean air and water, freedom from excessive and unnecessary noise, and the natural, scenic, his-

toric and esthetic qualities of their environment. The protection of the people in their right to the conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral, forest, water, air and other natural resources is declared to be a public purpose. Lands, easements and interests therein taken or acquired for such public purposes are not to be disposed of or used for other purposes except by two-thirds roll-call vote of both the Massachusetts Senate and House of Representatives.

Answering the questions of the House of Representatives, I advise that the two-thirds roll-call vote requirement of Article 97 applies to all lands, easements and interests therein *whenever* taken or acquired for Article 97 conservation, development or utilization purposes, even prior to the effective date of Article 97, November 7, 1972. The Amendment applies to land, easements and interests therein held by the Commonwealth, or any of its agencies or political subdivisions, such as cities, towns and counties.

I advise that "natural resources" given protection under Article 97 would include at the very least, without limitation: air, water, wetlands, rivers, streams, lakes, ponds, coastal, underground and surface waters, flood plains, seashores, dunes, marine resources, ocean, shellfish and inland fisheries, wild birds including song and insectivorous birds, wild mammals and game, sea and fresh water fish of every description, forests and all uncultivated flora, together with public shade and ornamental trees and shrubs, land, soil and soil resources, minerals and natural deposits, agricultural resources, open spaces, natural areas, and parks and historic districts or sites.

I advise that Article 97 requires a two-thirds roll-call vote of the Massachusetts Senate and House of Representatives for all transfers between agencies of government and between political subdivisions of lands, easements or interests therein originally taken or acquired for Article 97 purposes, and transfers of such land, easements or interests therein from one level of government to another, or from public ownership to private. This is so without regard to whether the transfer be for the same or different uses or consistent or inconsistent purposes. I so advise because such transfers are "dispositions" under the terms of the new Amendment, and because "disposition" includes any change of legal or physical control, including but not limited to outright conveyance, eminent domain takings, long and short-term leases of whatever length and the granting or taking of easements.

I also advise that *intra*-agency changes in uses of land from Article 97 purposes, although they are not "dispositions", are similarly

subject to the two-thirds roll-call vote requirement.

Read against the background of the existing doctrine of "prior public use", Article 97 will thus for the first time require legislation and a special vote of the Legislature even where a transfer of land between governmental agencies, between political subdivisions or between levels of government results in no change in the use of land, and even where a transfer is made from public control to private. I suggest that whether legislation pending before the General Court is subject to Article 97, or the doctrine of "prior public use", or both, the very highest standard of specificity should be required of the draftsmen to assure that legislation clearly identifies the locus, the present public uses of the land, the new uses contemplated, if any, and the parties to any contemplated "disposition" of the land.

In short, Article 97 seeks to prevent government from ill-considered misuse or other disposition of public lands and interests held for conservation, development or utilization of natural resources. If land is misused a portion of the public's natural resources may be forever lost, and no less so than by outright transfer. Article 97 thus provides a new range of protection for public lands far beyond existing law and much to the benefit of our natural resources and to the credit of our citizens.

Chap. 849. AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE PAYMENT OF A SUM NECESSARY TO CORRECT AN ERROR IN THE SCHOOL AID DISTRIBUTION TO THE CITY OF BROCKTON FOR THE YEAR NINETEEN HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FOUR.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Notwithstanding the provisions of section eighteen A of chapter fifty-eight of the General Laws to the contrary, the commissioner of corporations and taxation is hereby directed to certify to the state treasurer the amounts necessary to correct the error which occurred in the general school aid formula for the city of Brockton for the calendar year ending December thirty-first, nineteen hundred and seventy-four. Said treasurer shall pay the amounts so certified to said city during the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seventy-nine, from the amount appropriated for the distributions required by said section eighteen A.

Approved December 23, 1977.

Chap. 850. AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE DEDHAM, MILTON, NATICK, WELLESLEY REGIONAL VOCATIONAL TECHNICAL SCHOOL DISTRICT TO LEASE EQUIPMENT, LAND AND BUILDINGS FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES FOR CERTAIN PERIODS OF TIME.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

The Dedham, Milton, Natick, Wellesley regional vocational technical school district is hereby authorized to lease, or lease with an option to purchase, equipment for educational purposes for periods not exceeding ten years; and to lease land and buildings or portions of buildings for educational purposes for periods not exceeding ten years. Said lease of land and buildings may contain provisions for the extension of such lease for two additional terms not in excess of five years each, exercisable at the option of the Dedham, Milton, Natick, Wellesley regional vocational technical school district committee.

Approved December 23, 1977.

Chap. 851. AN ACT DIRECTING THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION TO SELL AND CONVEY A CERTAIN PARCEL OF LAND IN THE CITY OF BOSTON TO CLAY CHEVROLET, INC.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

The metropolitan district commission is hereby authorized and directed to sell and convey, in the name and on behalf of the

commonwealth, to Clay Chevrolet, Inc., a corporation duly incorporated under the laws of the state of Delaware and doing business in the commonwealth, by a quit claim deed approved as to its form by the attorney general, for such consideration as may be acceptable to said commission, a certain parcel of land under the control of said commission located on the West Roxbury parkway in the city of Boston, presently used under a lease agreement by Clay Chevrolet, Inc. Said parcel is shown on a plan entitled "Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Metropolitan District Commission, Parks Division, West Roxbury Parkway, Boston (West Roxbury District), Plan of Land to be Leased to Clay Chevrolet Inc., August 24, 1953, Benjamin W. Fink, Director of Park Engineering," being plan accession number 31819, a copy of which is on file with said commission, said land being more particularly bounded and described as follows:

Southerly by the northerly line of Belgrade Avenue, fifty-seven (57) feet more or less;

Westerly by land of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, known as West Roxbury Parkway, one hundred twenty (120) feet more or less.

Northerly by the southerly side line of the location of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, fifty-seven (57) feet more or less; and

Easterly by land now or formerly of Clay Chevrolet, Inc., one hundred twenty-three (123) feet more or less; containing six thousand nine hundred twenty-five (6925) square feet more or less.

All proceeds from said conveyance shall be credited to the Metropolitan Parks Trust Fund as provided by section thirty-four of chapter ninety-two of the General Laws.

Chap. 852. AN ACT RELATIVE TO PAYROLL DEDUCTIONS FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Chapter 180 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after section 17H the following section:-

Section 17I. A single deduction on payroll schedules shall be made from the salary of any school teacher in an amount which such teacher may specify in writing to the city, town or district school committee by which he is employed; provided, however, that no specific deduction shall be made for the payment of con-

- SOUTHERLY by the northerly line of Belgrade Avenue, fifty-seven (57) feet more or less;
- WESTERLY by land of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts known as West Roxbury Parkway, one hundred twenty (120) feet more or less;
- NORTHERLY by the southerly side line of the location of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, fifty-seven (57) feet more or less; and
- EASTERLY by land now or formerly of Clay Chevrolet, Inc., one hundred twenty-three (123) feet more or less;

Containing six thousand nine hundred twenty-five (6,925) square feet more or less, as shown on the aforesaid plan.

Said premises are conveyed subject to the following conditions and restrictions for the benefit of the remaining land of the Grantor known as West Roxbury Parkway:

1. That all signs shall be removed from the roof of the existing building and that no new signs will be erected on the roof of said existing building or the roof of any other building which may be constructed in the future without Commission approval.
2. That the new sign will be attached to the existing building facing the Parkway, and it will not exceed twenty-five (25) feet in length and two and one-half (2½) feet in height.
3. That the said sign will read only "HOWARD CHEVROLET".
4. That additional tree planting, landscaping, fencing, etc. within the granted premises shall be subject to the approval of the Commission.
5. That said premises are conveyed subject to the condition that if at any time said premises shall cease to be used for parking purposes, then, and in that event, said Commonwealth of Massachusetts shall enter upon said premises

and repossess itself as of its former estate therein and said premises shall revert and revest in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

6. GANTS, C.J. Article 97 of the Amendments to the
Massachusetts Constitution, approved by the Legislature and
ratified by the voters in 1972, provides that "[l]ands and
easements taken or acquired" for conservation purposes "shall
not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of" without
the approval of a two-thirds roll call vote of each branch of
the Legislature. The issue on appeal is whether a proposed
change in use of municipal parkland may be governed by art. 97
where the land was not taken by eminent domain and where there
is no restriction recorded in the registry of deeds that limits
its use to conservation or recreational purposes. We conclude
that there are circumstances where municipal parkland may be
protected by art. 97 without any such recorded restriction,
provided the land has been dedicated as a public park. A city
or town dedicates land as a public park where there is a clear
and unequivocal intent to dedicate the land permanently as a
public park and where the public accepts such use by actually
using the land as a public park. Because the municipal land at

issue in this case has been dedicated as a public park, we conclude that it is protected by art. 97.⁴

Background. The subject of this appeal is a parcel of property owned by the city of Westfield (city), known as the John A. Sullivan Memorial Playground or Cross Street Playground (the parcel or Cross Street Playground), on which the city seeks to build an elementary school. The parcel contains 5.3 acres of land and includes two little league baseball fields and a playground. Because the parcel's history is at the center of the parties' dispute in this case, we recount it in some detail.

The parcel has served as a public playground for more than sixty years. The city obtained title to the parcel in 1939 through an action to foreclose a tax lien for nonpayment of taxes. In 1946, the city planning board recommended that the land be used for a "new playground," and referred the matter to the mayor. The city council voted in 1948 to turn over "full charge and control" of the property to the playground commission, and in 1949 to transfer funds to the commission to cover costs of "work to be done on Cross [Street] Playground." In November, 1957, the city council passed an ordinance formally

naming the playground the "John A. Sullivan Memorial Playground."⁵ The mayor approved the ordinance early in 1958. Despite the name formally given, the parcel eventually came to be commonly known as the "Cross Street Playground."

In 1979, working in cooperation with the State government, the city applied for and received a grant from the Federal government (as well as matching funds from the State) to rehabilitate several of its playgrounds, including the Cross Street Playground. The Federal conservation funds that the city received were made available by the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 (act). See P.L. 88-578, 78 Stat. 900 (1964), codified as 16 U.S.C. § 4601-8 (1976).⁶ The purpose of the act is to assure "outdoor recreation resources" for "all American people of present and future generations" by enabling "all levels of government and private interests to take prompt and coordinated action to the extent practicable without diminishing or affecting their respective powers and functions to conserve, develop, and utilize such resources for the benefit and

enjoyment of the American people." 16 U.S.C. § 4601 (1976). Grant money distributed pursuant to the act is known as LWCF funding.

The act imposed several key requirements on States seeking LWCF funding in support of local park projects. First, it required States to develop a "comprehensive statewide outdoor recreation plan" (SCORP) setting forth, among other information, the State's evaluation of its need for outdoor recreation resources and designating the State agency that would represent the State in the LWCF funding process. Id. at § 4601-8(d).⁷ The act also mandated that "[n]o property acquired or developed with assistance under this section shall . . . be converted to other than public outdoor recreation uses" without the approval of the United States Secretary of the Interior (Secretary). Id. at § 4601-8(f)(3). Further, the act stated that "the Secretary shall approve such conversion only if he finds it to be in accord with the then existing comprehensive statewide outdoor recreation plan and only upon such conditions as he deems necessary to assure the substitution of other recreation properties of at least equal fair market value and of reasonably

equivalent usefulness and location." Id. The grant agreement for rehabilitation of the Cross Street Playground indicates that the grant was expressly conditioned on compliance with the act. Therefore, by accepting the Federal monies under the act, the city forfeited the ability to convert any part of the Cross Street Playground to a use other than public outdoor recreation unilaterally; such a conversion could only proceed with the approval of the Secretary. The 2006 Massachusetts SCORP states explicitly that "[l]and acquired or developed with [LWCF] funds become[s] protected under the Massachusetts Constitution (Article 97) and [F]ederal regulations -- and cannot be converted from intended use without permission" from the National Park Service and Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs. See Massachusetts Outdoors 2006: Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs 4, <http://www.mass.gov/eea/docs/eea/dcs/massoutdoor2006.pdf> [<https://perma.cc/T3D7-4EKN>]. See also Massachusetts Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs 2 (2012), <http://www.mass.gov/eea/docs/eea/dcs/scorp-2012-final.pdf> [<https://perma.cc/F4D6-W4MS>] (describing land funded by LWCF as protected under art. 97).⁸ The restrictions imposed by the act

on the management of land acquired or developed with LWCF funding remain in full effect over the Cross Street Playground. See 54 U.S.C. § 200305(f)(3) (2012 & Supp. II).

In 2009, a report on a survey of the city's parks and open space conducted by the Department of Conservation and Recreation, the Pioneer Valley planning commission, and the Franklin Regional council of governments included a map that identifies the Cross Street Playground as "permanently protected open space." A year later, the city's mayor endorsed an open space plan which noted that, although not all public land is "permanently committed for conservation purposes," Cross Street Playground was public land with a "full" degree of protection and "active" recreation potential.

On August 18, 2011, the city council voted to transfer the entire Cross Street Playground from the city's parks and recreation department to its school department for the purpose of constructing a new elementary school on the land. In 2012, the city began a demolition process that included taking down century-old trees and removing a portion of the playground.

The plaintiffs, a group of city residents, commenced this action in April, 2012, naming the city and city council as defendants, as well as the mayor and city councillors in their

comprehensive Statewide outdoor recreation plan (SCORP) in effect at the time of the 1979 grant application characterized the status of the Cross Street Playground.

official capacities. The plaintiffs sought a restraining order to halt the construction project under G. L. c. 214, § 7A, and G. L. c. 40, § 53.⁹ In addition, the plaintiffs sought relief in the nature of mandamus under G. L. c. 249, § 5, requesting that the court order the defendants to comply with art. 97 of the Massachusetts Constitution prior to any construction or operation of a new school on any part of the Cross Street Playground.

A Superior Court judge issued a temporary restraining order to halt construction of the school on the Cross Street Playground in September, 2012, and later granted the plaintiffs' motion for a preliminary injunction. In issuing the injunction, the judge agreed with the defendants that "the failure to build a new public school would have an adverse impact on the residents of the city, specifically the children, who are currently learning in outdated and decaying schools." But the judge made clear that she was "not prohibiting the construction of a new school"; she was "merely ordering the [c]ity to comply with the law before it proceeds."

⁹ Under G. The parties later submitted cross motions for the entry of judgment based on an agreed statement of facts, essentially asking the court to decide whether the preliminary injunction should be made permanent or vacated. By this stage of the litigation, the parties had stipulated that the only question for decision was whether the Cross Street Playground was protected by art. 97. Another Superior Court judge concluded that the Supreme Judicial Court in Mahajan v. Department of Env'tl. Protection, 464 Mass. 604, 615 (2013), "decided that a parcel of land acquires Article 97 protection only when the land is specifically designated for Article 97 purposes by a recorded instrument." Because there was no recorded instrument designating that the Cross Street Playground was to be used as a playground or for any other recreational purpose, the judge concluded that the parcel was not protected by art. 97. Consequently, he vacated the preliminary injunction and ordered judgment to enter for the defendants.

The plaintiffs appealed, and the Appeals Court affirmed the judgment. Smith v. Westfield, 90 Mass. App. Ct. 80, 81 (2016). The Appeals Court agreed with the motion judge that land is protected by art. 97 only where it was taken or acquired for conservation or another purpose set forth in art. 97, or where "the land is specifically designated for art. 97 purposes by deed or other recorded restriction." Id. at 82. Justice

Milkey, in a concurrence, agreed that the Supreme Judicial Court opinions in Selectmen of Hanson v. Lindsay, 444 Mass. 502, 506-509 (2005), and Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 615-616, "appear to say" that, where land was taken or acquired for non-art. 97 purposes, it will only be subject to art. 97 "where the restricted use has been recorded on the deed, e.g., through a conservation restriction." Smith, 90 Mass. App. Ct. at 86. But Justice Milkey invited this court to "revisit such precedent," id. at 84, declaring, "Nothing in the language or purpose of art. 97 suggests that its application should turn on whether the underlying deed provides record notice that the land has been committed to an art. 97 use." Id. at 87. He concluded, "The overriding point of art. 97 is to insulate dedicated parkland from short-term political pressures. I fear that the effect of Hanson and Mahajan is to rob art. 97 of its intended force with regard to a great deal of dedicated parkland across the Commonwealth." Id. at 88. We allowed the plaintiff's application for further appellate review.

Discussion. Article 97 provides, among other things, that "[t]he people shall have the right to clean air and water . . . and the natural, scenic, historic, and esthetic qualities of their environment." It declares a "public purpose" in "the protection of the people in their right to the conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral,

forest, water, air and other natural resources." Id. It grants the Legislature the power "to provide for the taking, upon payment of just compensation therefor, or for the acquisition by purchase or otherwise, of lands and easements or such other interests therein as may be deemed necessary to accomplish these purposes." Id. And, most importantly for purposes of this appeal, it provides: "Lands and easements taken or acquired for such purposes shall not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of except by laws enacted by a two thirds vote, taken by yeas and nays, of each branch of the general court." Id.¹⁰

¹⁰ The full text of art. 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution annuls art. 49 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution and then provides:

"The general court shall have the power to enact legislation necessary or expedient to protect such rights.

"Lands and easements taken or acquired for such purposes shall not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of except by laws enacted by a two thirds vote,

The issue on appeal requires us to interpret the meaning of art. 97 to determine whether the Cross Street Playground is protected land under art. 97 that may be used for another purpose -- here, the purpose of building a public school -- only by obtaining the approval by a two-thirds vote of each branch of the Legislature. We do not interpret art. 97 on a clean slate. We have recognized that the language of art. 97 is "relatively imprecise" and that its provisions must be interpreted "in light of the practical consequences that would result from . . . an expansive application, as well as the ability of a narrower interpretation to serve adequately the stated goals of art. 97." Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 614-615. We also have recognized that land may be protected by art. 97 where it was neither taken by eminent domain nor acquired for any of the purposes set forth in art. 97 provided that, after the taking or acquisition, it "was designated for those purposes in a manner sufficient to invoke the protection of art. 97." See id. at 615. Therefore, to resolve the issue in this case, we must first determine what it means to "designate" land for an art. 97 purpose in a manner

sufficient to invoke art. 97 protection, and then determine whether the Cross Street Playground was so designated.¹¹

We do not agree with the motion judge and the Appeals Court that we have already concluded in our opinions in Selectmen of Hanson and Mahajan that the only way to designate land for art. 97 purposes is through a deed or recorded conservation restriction, although we acknowledge that there is language in those opinions that invites this inference.¹²

In Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 608, 612, 615 n.15, the issue on appeal was whether a plaza area surrounding an open-air pavilion at the eastern end of Long Wharf in Boston that was identified as a park "was 'taken' for art. 97 purposes." The parcel was a small part of the land taken by eminent domain in 1970 by the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) as part of the 1964 Downtown Waterfront-Faneuil Hall urban renewal plan. Id. at

¹¹ The city did not challenge the plaintiffs' assertion below that the use of Cross Street Playground fell within the range of environmental purposes contemplated by art. 97.

First, we said a city might record a conservation restriction pursuant to G. L. c. 184, § 31. See Selectmen of Hanson v. Lindsay, 444 Mass. 502, 506-507 (2005). Second, we suggested that a city might "deed the land to itself for conservation purposes." See Mahajan v. Department of Env'tl. Protection, 464 Mass 604, 616 (2013). This distinction is not relevant to this case, where it is undisputed that there is no recorded restriction on the use of the Cross Street Playground. For the sake of simplicity, we shall characterize both procedures as "recorded deed restrictions" on the use of property when referring to these decisions.

606-607. We recognized that one of the fifteen "planning objectives" under that plan was "[t]o provide public ways, parks and plazas which encourage the pedestrian to enjoy the harbor and its activities," id. at 608 n.7, but we determined that the "overarching purpose" for which the land was taken was to eliminate "decadent, substandard or blighted open conditions." Id. at 612, quoting G. L. c. 121B, § 45. We declared that land is not taken for art. 97 purposes simply because it "incidentally" promotes conservation, or because it "simply displays some attributes of art. 97 land generally," or because "a comprehensive urban renewal plan may identify, among other objectives, some objectives that are consistent with art. 97 purposes." Id. at 613-614, 618. We concluded that, "[g]iven the overarching purpose of the 1964 urban renewal plan to eliminate urban blight through the comprehensive redevelopment of the waterfront area, including its revitalization through the development of mixed uses and amenities, it cannot be said that the retention of certain open spaces, like the project site, is sufficiently indicative of an art. 97 purpose as to trigger a two-thirds vote of the Legislature should the BRA wish to slightly revise the use of certain spaces in a manner consistent with the objectives of the original urban renewal plan." Id. at 618.

Nevertheless, we recognized that land taken by eminent domain specifically for art. 97 purposes could fall under the provision's protections "where an urban renewal plan accompanying a taking clearly demonstrates a specific intent to reserve particular, well-defined areas of that taking for art. 97 purposes." Id. at 619. And we recognized that, "[u]nder certain circumstances not present here, the ultimate use to which the land is put may provide the best evidence of the purposes of the taking, notwithstanding the language of the original order of taking or accompanying urban renewal plan." Id. at 620.

In Selectmen of Hanson, 444 Mass. at 504-505, the issue was not whether a parcel of land had been taken for art. 97 purposes (it was not), but whether a town meeting vote was sufficient by itself to transform a town's general corporate property into conservation land protected by art. 97. The town had acquired the property through a tax taking in 1957 and held it as general corporate property that could be disposed of in any manner authorized by law. Id. at 504. In 1971, the town at its annual meeting voted "to accept for conservation purposes, a deed, or deeds to" the parcel, but the property was never actually placed under the custody and control of the conservation commission. Id. at 504, 506. Rather, the property remained under the control of the board of selectmen, which was authorized to

execute a deed imposing a conservation restriction on the property but never did.¹³ Id. at 506, 508. In 1998, the town sold the property at a public auction to the defendant, but in 2002 commenced an action seeking a declaration that the sale was invalid and void because the land was subject to art. 97 and the sale had not been approved by a two-thirds vote of each branch of the Legislature. Id. at 503. We rejected the town's claim, reasoning that the 1971 vote "merely expressed the town's interest in dedicating the locus to conservation purposes," and that subsequently the town took "no further action" to achieve that goal. Id. at 508. In these circumstances we declared that "an instrument creating such a property restriction had to be filed with the registry of deeds in order for the town's interest to prevail over that of any subsequent bona fide purchaser for value." Id. at 505.

In the circumstances presented in Selectmen of Hanson, where the town intended to designate land for conservation purposes by executing a deed with a conservation restriction but

¹³ "'A conservation restriction means a right, either in perpetuity or for a specified number of years, whether or not stated in the form of a restriction, easement, covenant or condition, in any deed, will or other instrument executed by or on behalf of the owner of the land or in any order of taking, appropriate to retaining land or water areas predominantly in their natural, scenic or open condition or in agricultural, farming or forest use . . . ' (emphasis added)." Selectmen of Hanson v. Lindsay, 444 Mass. 502, 507 (2005), quoting G. L. c. 184, § 31.

never did, it is true, as we said in Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 616, that "the town had to deed the land to itself for conservation purposes -- or record an equivalent restriction on the deed -- in order for art. 97 to apply to subsequent dispositions or use for other purposes." But this should not be understood to mean that, in all circumstances, the only way that land not taken or acquired for an art. 97 purpose may become protected by art. 97 is through a recorded deed restriction. To understand the other ways that land may be "designated" for conservation purposes "in a manner sufficient to invoke the protection of art. 97," see Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 615, we need to examine two related common law doctrines: the dedication of land for public use and prior public use. See id. at 616 ("the spirit of art. 97 is derived from the related doctrine of 'prior public use'").

Under our common law, where developers on private land built roads that were dedicated to the use of the public, the land on which those roads were built became "subject to the easement of a public way" where "the intent to dedicate [is] made manifest by the unequivocal declarations or acts of the owner" and where the dedication is accepted by the public. Hayden v. Stone, 112 Mass. 346, 349 (1873). "No specific length of time is necessary; the acts of the parties to the dedication when once established complete it." Id. See Longley v. Worcester, 304 Mass. 580, 588 (1939) ("The owner's acts and

declarations should be deliberate, unequivocal and decisive, manifesting a clear intention permanently to abandon his property to the specific public use"). Similarly, where a developer in Wareham bought a large tract of land to sell building lots for residences, and private businesses, and reserved open space for "parks, squares, groves and shore fronts," the open space was subject to an easement for public use upon proof that the owner "had dedicated the use of these lands to the public" and that the public had accepted the dedication through use of the open space. Attorney Gen. v. Onset Bay Grove Ass'n, 221 Mass. 342, 347-348 (1915) (Onset Bay Grove Ass'n). See Attorney Gen. v. Abbott, 154 Mass. 323, 326-329 (1891). The dedication "may spring from oral declarations or statements by the dedicator, or by those authorized to act in his behalf, made to persons with whom he deals and who rely upon them; or it may consist of declarations addressed directly to the public." Onset Bay Grove Ass'n, 221 Mass. at 348. "It also may be manifested by the owner's acts from which such an intention can be inferred." Id.

A city or town that owns land in its proprietary capacity and uses the land for a park may also dedicate the parkland to the use of the public. "A municipality may dedicate land owned by it to a particular public purpose provided there is nothing in the terms and conditions by which it was acquired or the

purposes for which it is held preventing it from doing so, . . . and upon completion of the dedication it becomes irrevocable" (citation omitted). Lowell v. Boston, 322 Mass. 709, 730 (1948). "The general public for whose benefit a use in the land was established by an owner obtains an interest in the land in the nature of an easement." Id. This court applied the public dedication doctrine in holding that, even though title to the Boston Common and the Public Garden "vested in fee simple in the town free from any trust," the city did not possess title to this parkland "free from any restriction, for it is plain that the town has dedicated the Common and the Public Garden to the use of the public as a public park." Id. at 729-730. "The title to the Common and the Public Garden is in the city; the beneficial use is in the public." Id. at 735.

The "general public" that has obtained an "interest in the land in the nature of an easement," id. at 730, is not simply the residents of the particular city or town that owns the parkland. See Higginson v. Treasurer and Sch. House Comm'rs of Boston, 212 Mass. 583, 589 (1912). This court in Higginson declared:

"[T]he dominant aim in the establishment of public parks appears to be the common good of mankind rather than the special gain or private benefit of a particular city or town. The healthful and civilizing influence of parks in and near congested areas of population is of more than local interest and becomes a concern of the State under modern conditions. It relates not only to public health in

its narrow sense, but to broader considerations of exercise, refreshment and enjoyment."

Id. at 590.

Because the general public has an interest in parkland owned by a city or town, ultimate authority over a public park rests with the Legislature, not with the municipality. See Lowell, 322 Mass. at 730. "The rights of the public in such an easement are subject to the paramount authority of the General Court which may limit, suspend or terminate the easement." Id. As stated in Lowell, 322 Mass. at 730, quoting Wright v. Walcott, 238 Mass. 432, 435 (1921):

"Land acquired by a city or town by eminent domain or through expenditure of public funds, held strictly for public uses as a park and not subject to the terms of any gift, devise, grant, bequest or other trust or condition, is under the control of the General Court . . . The power of the General Court in this regard is supreme over that of the city or town."

Because the Legislature has "paramount authority" over public parks, dedicated parkland cannot be sold or devoted to another public use without the approval of the Legislature. "The rule that public lands devoted to one public use cannot be diverted to another inconsistent public use without plain and explicit legislation authorizing the diversion is now firmly established in our law." Robbins v. Department of Pub. Works, 355 Mass. 328, 330 (1969). See Higginson, 212 Mass. at 591 ("Land appropriated to one public use cannot be diverted to another inconsistent public use without plain and explicit

legislation to that end"). This "rule," known as the doctrine of "prior public use," Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 616, is not limited to parkland. See, e.g., Boston & Albany R.R. v. City Council of Cambridge, 166 Mass. 224, 225 (1896); Old Colony R.R. v. Framingham Water Co., 153 Mass. 561, 563 (1891); Boston Water Power Co. v. Boston & W.R. Corp., 23 Pick. 360, 398 (1839). But it is applied more "stringently" where a public agency or municipality seeks to encroach upon a park. Robbins, supra at 330 ("In furtherance of the policy of the Commonwealth to keep parklands inviolate the rule has been stringently applied to legislation which would result in encroachment on them"); Gould v. Greylock Reservation Comm'n, 350 Mass. 410, 419 (1966), quoting Higginson, 212 Mass. at 591-592 ("The policy of the Commonwealth has been to add to the common law inviolability of parks express prohibition against encroachment"). Three years before the ratification of art. 97, this court declared in Robbins, supra at 331:

"We think it is essential to the expression of plain and explicit authority to divert parklands, Great Ponds, reservations and kindred areas to a new and inconsistent public use that the Legislature identify the land and that there appear in the legislation not only a statement of the new use but a statement or recital showing in some way legislative awareness of the existing public use. In short, the legislation should express not merely the public will for the new use but its willingness to surrender or forgo the existing use."

The meaning of the provision in art. 97 at issue in this case -- "Lands and easements taken or acquired for such purposes shall not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of except by laws enacted by a two thirds vote, taken by yeas and nays, of each branch of the general court" -- must be understood in this common-law context. Cf. Industrial Fin. Corp. v. State Tax Comm'n, 367 Mass. 360, 364 (1975), quoting Hanlon v. Rollins, 286 Mass. 444, 447 (1934) (where meaning of statute is not plain from its language, we look to intent of Legislature "ascertained from all its words construed by the ordinary and approved usage of the language, considered in connection with the cause of its enactment, the mischief or imperfection to be remedied and the main object to be accomplished, to the end that the purpose of its framers may be effectuated"). The consequence of art. 97's ratification was that "plain and explicit legislation authorizing the diversion" of public parkland under the prior public use doctrine, which previously could be enacted by a bare majority of the Legislature, now required a two-thirds vote of each branch. See Robbins, *supra* at 330. See also Legislative Research Council, Report Relative to the Preservation of the Natural Environment, 1971 House Doc. No. 5301. In Opinion of the Justices, 383 Mass. 895, 918 (1981), we made clear that art. 97 applied to all property that was taken or acquired for art. 97 purposes, including property

taken or acquired before its ratification in 1972. "To claim that new Article 97 does not give the same care and protection for all these existing public lands as for lands acquired by the foresight of future legislators or the generosity of future citizens would ignore public purposes deemed important in our laws since the beginning of our Commonwealth." Id., quoting Rep. A.G., Pub. Doc. No. 12, at 139, 141 (1973).

There is no reason to believe that art. 97 was intended by the Legislature or the voters to diminish the scope of parkland that had been protected under the common law by the prior public use doctrine or the doctrine of public dedication. Such an interpretation would suggest that voters were hoodwinked into thinking they were expanding the protection of such lands by replacing art. 49 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution with art. 97 when, in fact, they were actually reducing the protection already afforded these lands under the common law.¹⁴ See Bates v. Director of Office of Campaign &

¹⁴ Article 49, which was annulled by art. 97, see note 10, supra, provided:

"The conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral, forest, water and other natural resources of the commonwealth are public uses, and the general court shall have power to provide for the taking, upon payment of just compensation therefor, of lands and easements or interests therein, including water and mineral rights, for the purpose of securing and promoting the proper conservation, development, utilization and control

Fin., 436 Mass. 144, 173-174 (2002), quoting Boston Elevated Ry. v. Commonwealth, 310 Mass. 528, 548 (1942) ("We will not impute to the voters who enacted the clean elections law an 'intention to pass an ineffective statute'"). Therefore, we conclude that parkland protected by art. 97 includes land dedicated by municipalities as public parks that, under the prior public use doctrine, cannot be sold or devoted to another public use without plain and explicit legislative authority. See Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 615 (art. 97 protects land "designated" for art. 97 purposes "in a manner sufficient to invoke the protection of art. 97").

Given this conclusion, we turn to the question whether the Cross Street Playground was dedicated by the city as a public park such that the transfer of its use from a park to a school would require legislative approval under the prior public use doctrine and, thus, under art. 97. Under our common law, land is dedicated to the public as a public park when the landowner's intent to do so is clear and unequivocal, and when the public accepts such use by actually using the land as a public park. See Longley, 304 Mass. at 587-588; Onset Bay Grove Ass'n, 221 Mass. at 347-348; Hayden, 112 Mass. at 349. There are various ways to manifest a clear and unequivocal intent. See e.g.,

thereof and to enact legislation necessary or expedient therefor."

Onset Bay Grove Ass'n, 221 Mass. at 348-349 (dedication found based on Association's plan, sales statements, and repeated declarations that its open spaces "should never be encroached upon"). The recording of a deed or a conservation restriction is one way of manifesting such intent but it is not the only way. For instance, it was "plain" to this court that the Boston Common and Public Garden had been dedicated as a public park without there being any deed or conservation restriction declaring the land to be a public park. See Lowell, 322 Mass. at 729-730.

The clear and unequivocal intent to dedicate public land as a public park must be more than simply an intent to use public land as a park temporarily or until a better use has emerged or ripened. See Longley, 304 Mass. at 588 (requiring "a clear intention permanently to abandon his property to the specific public use"). Rather, the intent must be to use the land permanently as a public park, because the consequence of a dedication is that "[t]he general public for whose benefit a use in the land was established . . . obtains an interest in the land in the nature of an easement," Lowell, 322 Mass. at 730, and "upon completion of the dedication it becomes irrevocable." Id.

The plaza area on Long Wharf in Mahajan, although identified as a park, failed to meet this standard because there

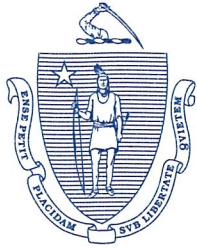
was not proof of a clear and unequivocal intent by the BRA to make the plaza permanently a public park. The urban renewal plan accompanying the taking did not reflect a specific intent to reserve that land forever as a public park but instead left open the possibility of revising the use of such open space if doing so would better accomplish the objectives of the urban renewal plan. Mahajan, 464 Mass. at 618-619. The parcel in Selectmen of Hanson, although accepted for conservation purposes by town meeting, failed to meet this standard both because there was no clear and unequivocal intent to dedicate the land permanently as conservation land where the town never actually transferred control of the land to the conservation commission and never acted to impose any restriction on the land, and where the land was never actually used by the public as conservation land. Selectmen of Hanson, 444 Mass. at 506-508.

The Cross Street Playground, however, was dedicated as a public park by the city under this standard, and therefore is protected under the prior public use doctrine and art. 97. We need not determine whether it would have been enough to meet the clear and unequivocal intent standard that the land had been used as a public park for more than sixty years, or that control of the land had been turned over to the playground commission, or that an ordinance was passed naming the parcel. Although we consider the totality of the circumstances, the determinative

factor here was the acceptance by the city of Federal conservation funds under the act to rehabilitate the playground with the statutory proviso that, by doing so, the city surrendered all ability to convert the playground to a use other than public outdoor recreation without the approval of the Secretary. See 16 U.S.C. § 4601-8(f)(3). Regardless of whether the parcel had been dedicated earlier as a public park, it became so dedicated once the city accepted Federal funds pursuant to this condition. It is significant that this understanding was shared by the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, whose 2006 SCORP stated that land developed with LWCF funds became protected under art. 97.

Conclusion. Because we conclude that the Cross Street Playground is protected by art. 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution, the judgment in favor of the defendants is vacated. Where the parties have agreed that, if the land is so protected, judgment should enter for the plaintiffs converting the preliminary injunction into a permanent injunction, we remand the case to the Superior Court for the issuance of such a judgment consistent with this opinion.

So ordered.


Dear Director Golden,

We, the undersigned State Senator, State Representatives, and Boston City Councilors, are writing today in response to the recently submitted proposal for the Roxbury Preparatory Charter School at 361 Belgrade Avenue in Roslindale. After meeting with community members, stakeholders, and proponents, we feel as though this proposal does not take into consideration or address the concerns raised by the community throughout the process to date.

The proposed size, transportation access, and parking continue to be the issues of most concern to the community. The proposal submitted to build a three-story school on this property—with classrooms, science and computer labs, a full-sized gym, cafeteria, theater, and rehearsal space—is inconsistent with the scale of the neighborhood. Roxbury Preparatory anticipates that many students will use the MBTA bus lines and the Commuter Rail to travel to and from school, but we do not feel that the transportation required to do so can be met with the existing infrastructure. Furthermore, the proposed parking spaces seem insufficient to accommodate the teachers, school staff, parents, and visitors attending sports games or extracurricular events in an already congested neighborhood. Additionally, the recently approved mixed-use building at 317 Belgrade Avenue further adds to our concerns regarding adequate parking space and traffic access in the neighborhood.

Because Roxbury Preparatory Charter School has insufficiently addressed these concerns, we remain in opposition to this proposal.
