


## Brazilians

Mayor Martin J. Walsh

- Brazilians, those who were born in Brazil or who identify as having Brazilian ancestry, make up 0.6% of Boston's population (3,770 people).
- Brazilians in Boston had a total income of \$114.5 million in 2016.
- Brazilians hold 2,370 jobs and approximately 493 are self-employed.
- Brazilian consumer demand supported an additional 375 jobs and contributed \$57.6 million to Boston's gross city product in 2016.
- Brazilians contributed \$5.8 million in state income taxes and \$1.9 million in state sales taxes in 2016.


#### 27,421 Brazilians in Massachusetts live primarily in Somerville, Everett, Malden, Lowell, Marlborough, and Framingham.






#### Boston Brazilians predominantly live in East Boston, Brighton, Allston, West Roxbury, and Roslindale.


## The native-born share of the Brazilian population has grown from 11% in 2010 to 19% in 2016.




# The foreign-born Brazilian population is predominately female.




## The foreign-born Brazilian population is older, while more than half of the native-born Brazilians are children.



### Native-born Brazilians speak English very well, but half of foreignborn Brazilians speak English less than well.




## Brazilians are employed at higher rates than Boston residents as a whole.





**Brazilian Share of Occupations** 




#### Only 19% of foreign-born Brazilian full-time workers earn more than \$75,000 a year.



Earnings of Full-Time Workers by Nativity


### Almost half of Brazilians end their education at high school.

About 24% of Brazilian workers in Massachusetts are self-employed, compared to about 9% of all Massachusetts workers.




#### Median Earnings by Type of Work
