Trends

Historical Trends in Brighton

- More Asian and Hispanic residents have increased the diversity of the neighborhood, but 65% of the population identified as Non-Hispanic White.
- From 2000 to 2010, the owner-occupany rate has remained relatively stable, at 25% of households owning their homes.
- The share of households owning at least one vehicle increased from 63% in 2000 to 69% in 2017.
- Between 2011 and 2015, payroll jobs increased by 13% throughout Brighton.


The Future for Brighton

- Brighton's growth is poised to continue, with 2,903 housing units approved for construction between 2014 and 2018.
- 1,394 new housing units were built in Brighton between 2011 and 2018.⁴


Population

 According to the 2013-2017 American Community Survey, Brighton had 51,785 residents, 13% of Boston's population.¹

Age Distribution

- In 2017, 21% of Brighton's residents were young adults (18-24), compared to 15% of Boston's residents.
- The share of children (0-17) accounted for 10% of Brighton's population, compared to 16% of Boston's population.


Brighton & Boston Residents by Age 2017

Economy

Jobs

- In 2015, Brighton had 16,831 payroll jobs, 33% of which were in Healthcare and Social Assistance.²
- Brighton had 0.50 payroll jobs for every resident worker, 3% of the payroll jobs in Boston.


Labor Force

- In 2017, Brighton's resident labor force had 33,387 workers, 8% of Boston's resident labor force.
- 70% of Brighton residents participated in the labor force, compared to 69% of Boston's residents.
- The top occupations among residents in 2017: Education,
 Office and Administrative Support, and Management.

Education

- In 2017, 24% of Brighton's residents were enrolled in college or university, higher than 16% of Boston's residents.
- 65% of Brighton's residents had at least a Bachelor's degree, compared to 47% of Boston's adult residents.

• In 2017, the median household income in Brighton was \$47,787, lower than \$62,021 throughout Boston.

Households

 In 2017, 33% of Brighton's households were families, compared to 48% of Boston's households.

Renters and Owners

- In 2017, 76% of Brighton's housing units were renter-occupied.
- In FY2018, 33% of Brighton's 6,618 condominiums were owner-occupied.³
- The median rent was \$1,623 throughout Brighton, compared to \$1,445 throughout Boston.

Vehicles

- In 2017, 69% of Brighton's households had at least one vehicle, compared to 66% of Boston's households.
- The ratio of vehicles to households in Brighton was 0.69, lower than Boston's ratio of 0.95.
