INTRODUCTION & DEFINITIONS

Similar to national trends, Boston has seen households with children decline.

Research questions guiding this analysis:

- *How do households with children compare to other households in the city?*
- *Where do households with children live? How has this changed over time?*
- *Who are Boston's households with children?*
- *What kind of housing do households with children live in?*
- *What housing cost burdens do households with children face?*

Terms & Definitions:



Householder

Person in whose name the housing unit is owned or rented, or any adult member. The person designated as the householder is the “reference person” to whom the relationship of all other household members, if any, is recorded.



Households with children

Households with children aged 0-17. Does not require relation.

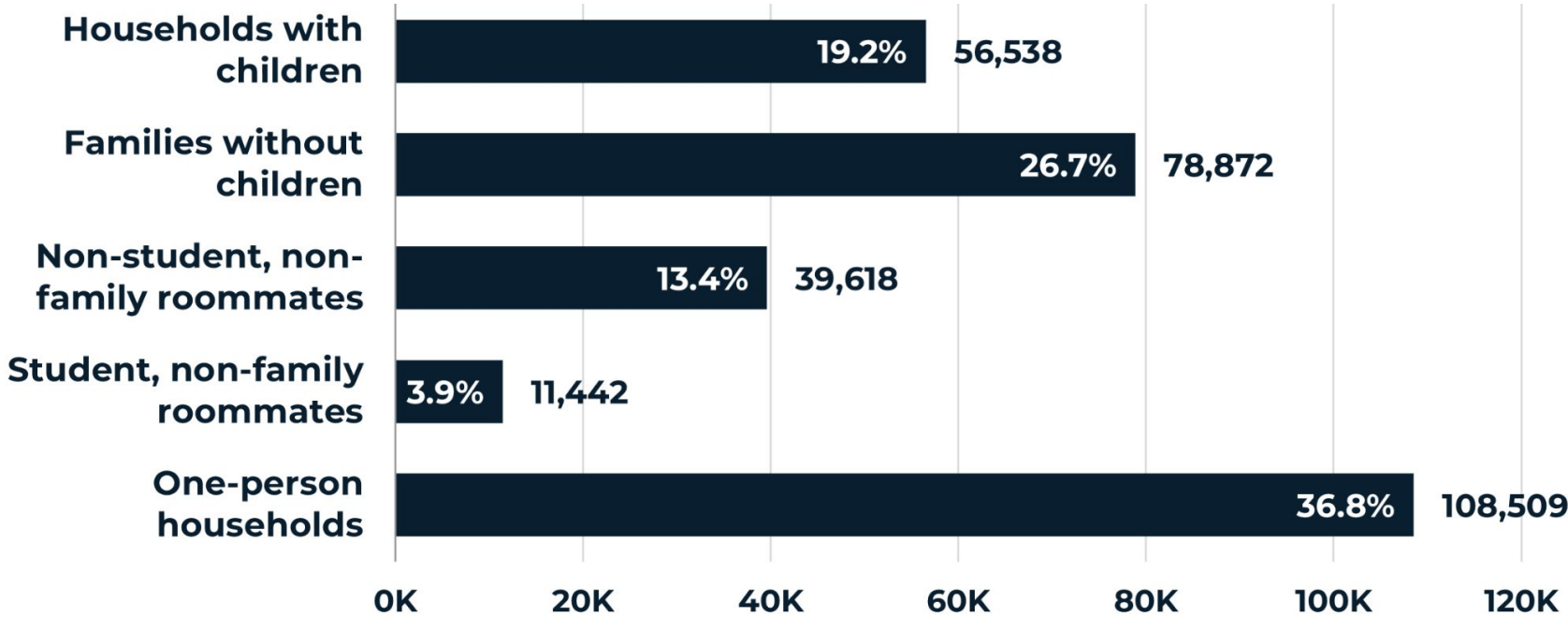
DEMOGRAPHIC TRENDS AFFECTING HOUSEHOLDS WITH CHILDREN

How do local and national trends affect households with children in Boston?



Boston has ~56,000 households with children under 18

Boston Households by Type, 2025

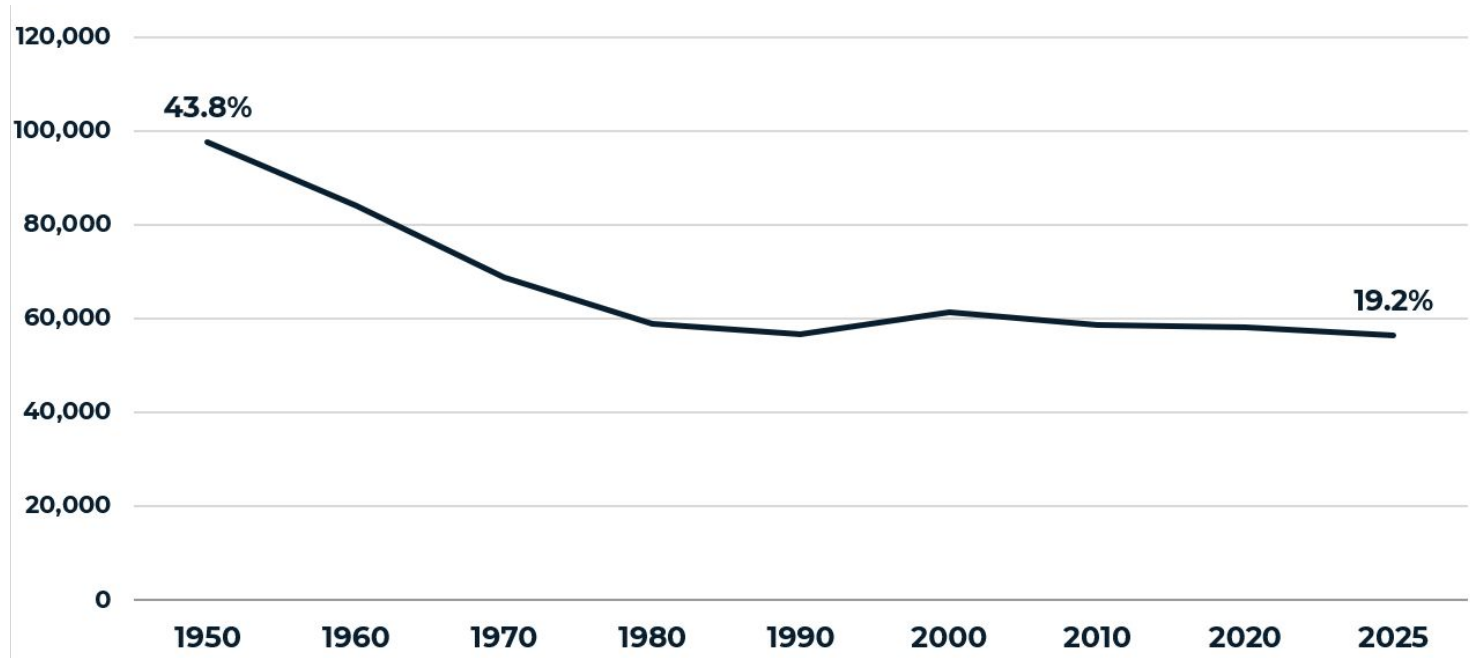

In 1950, households with children made up 44% of all households in Boston - but dropped to 19% by 2025

Boston is not unique: its 6.4 percentage point decline in share of households with children from 2010 to 2024 places it 12th out of 25 peer cities

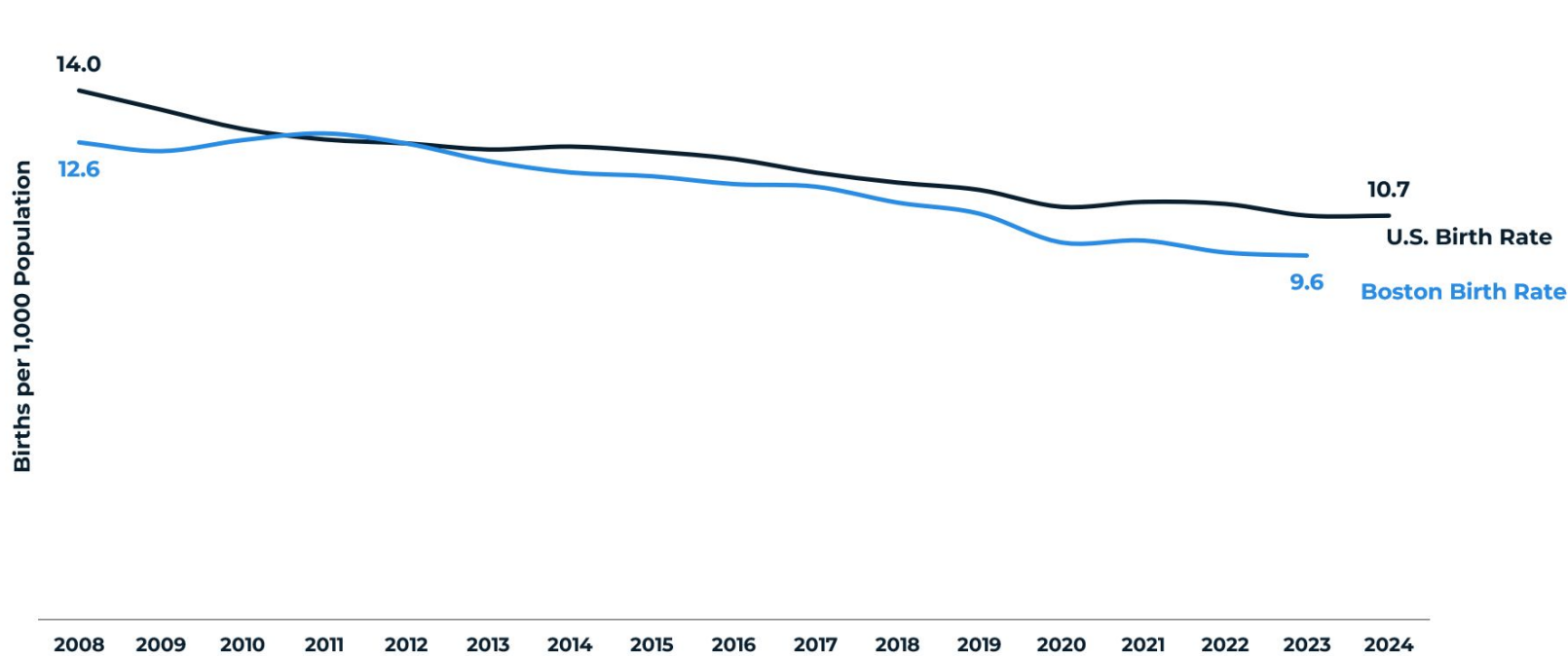

The recent decline in the number of children in Boston is mostly due to declining birth rates, which mirror national trends

Birth Rates in Boston, 2008-2024

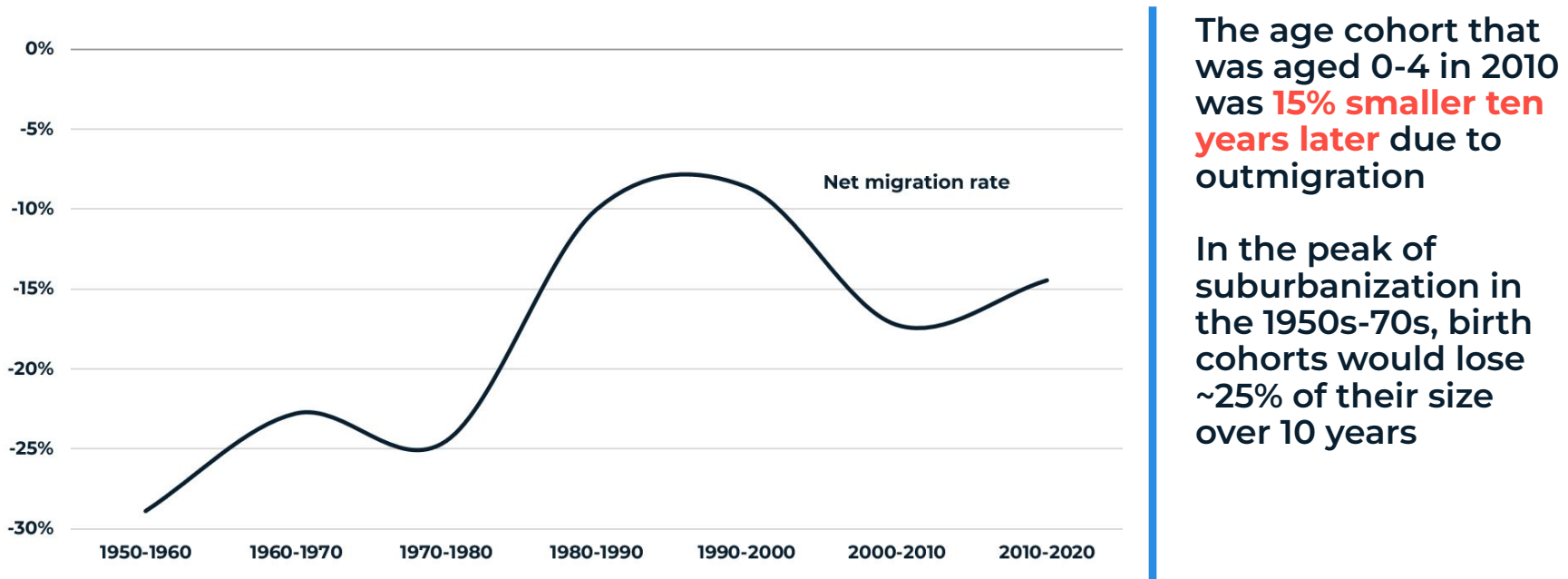

Young children have long seen significant **negative net migration** from Boston

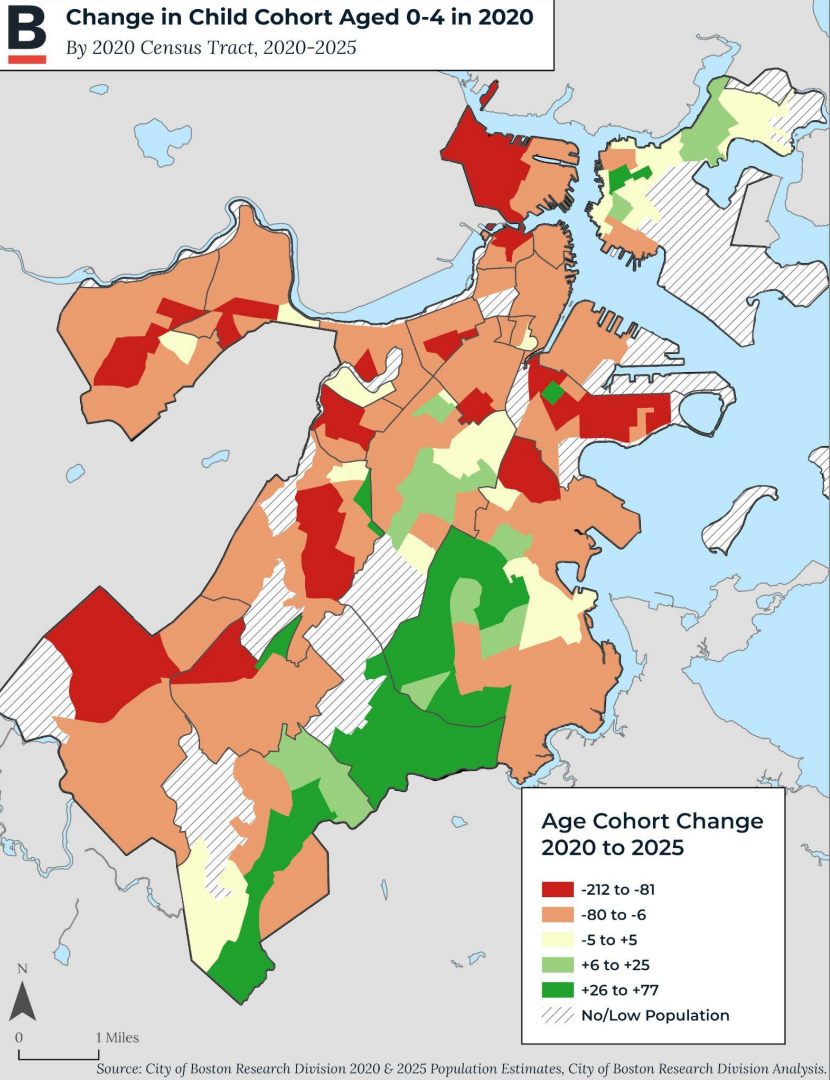
Where do households with children live?



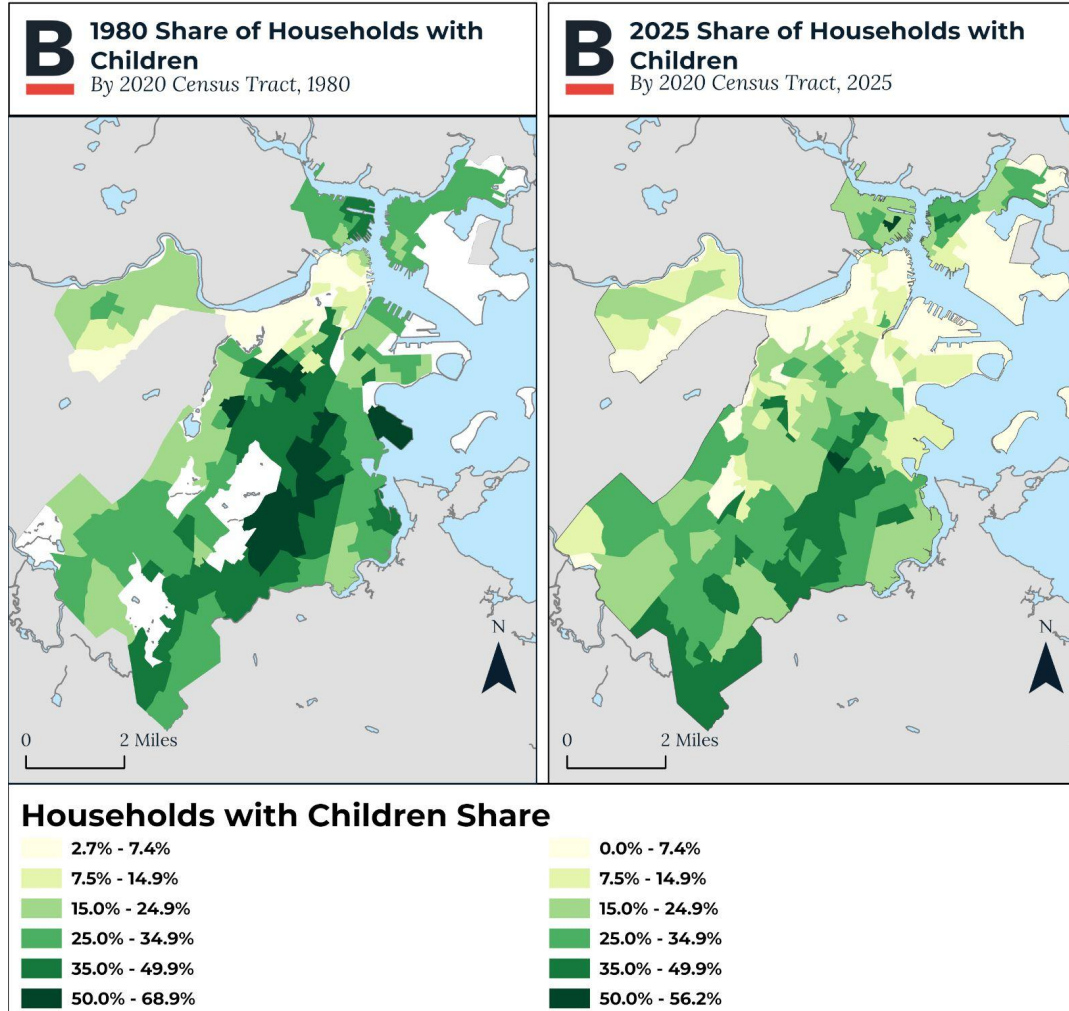
Over the past 5 years, most tracts in Boston saw **young children move out** as they aged, with only some **seeing more move in**

Tracts in **East Boston, Roxbury, Dorchester, Mattapan, and Hyde Park** were more likely to see **NET POSITIVE** migration of children, meaning that families with children tended to move **TO** these areas, some as new immigrants

Tracts in the rest of the city are more likely to see **NET NEGATIVE** migration of children, meaning that many children moved **FROM** these areas in their first five to ten years of life

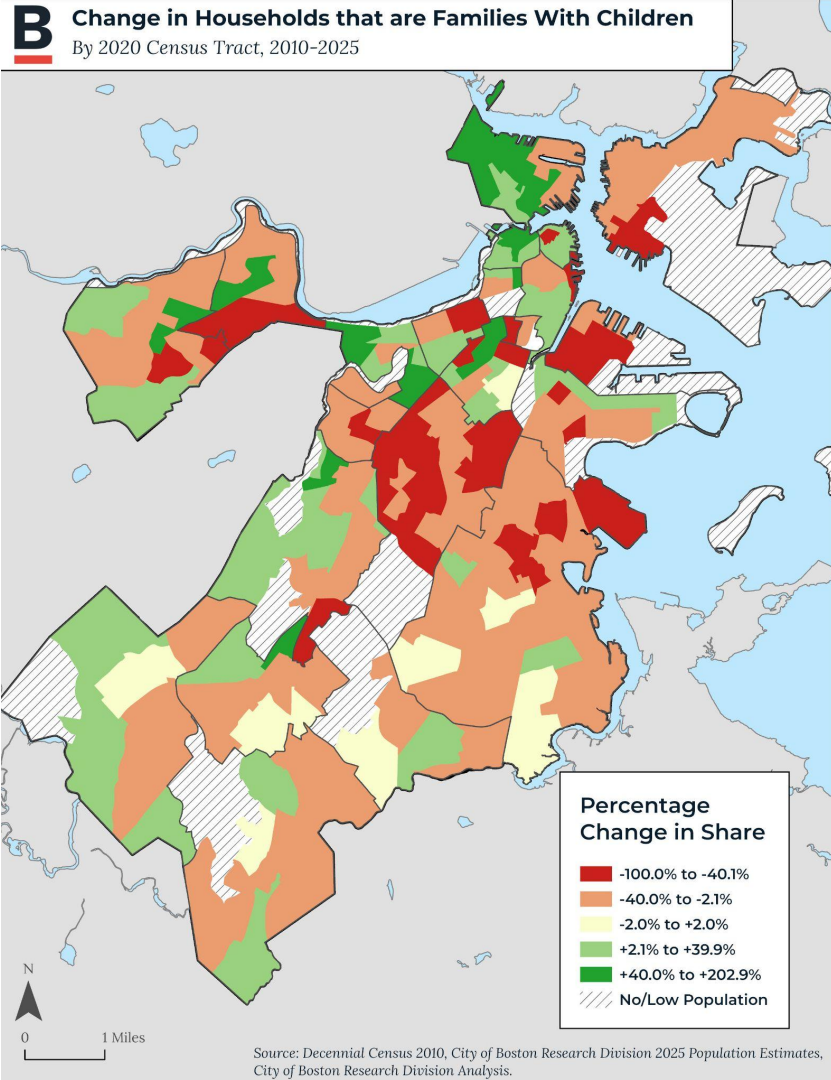

Recent trends show families with children today are living in different places than in 2010

East Boston (-12.8 pp) and **Roxbury (-11.7 pp)** saw the largest **percentage-point declines** in the share of households with children.

In contrast, **Charlestown** saw a **5.9 percentage point increase**, the **largest gain** of any Boston neighborhood, despite net negative migration of children as they age



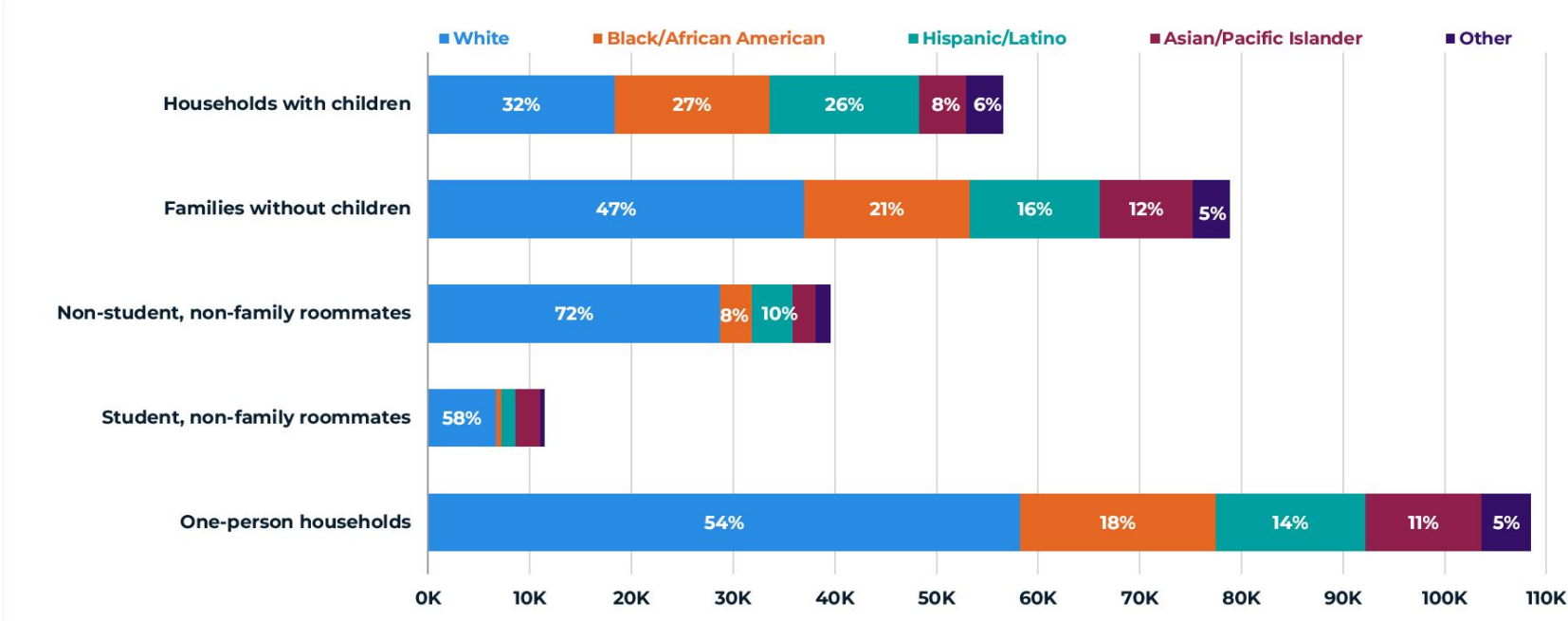
SHIFTING HOUSEHOLD DEMOGRAPHICS

How have households with children changed over time?



Householders with children are relatively more racially diverse than other householders in Boston

Boston Households by Type & Race/Ethnicity of Householder, 2025*

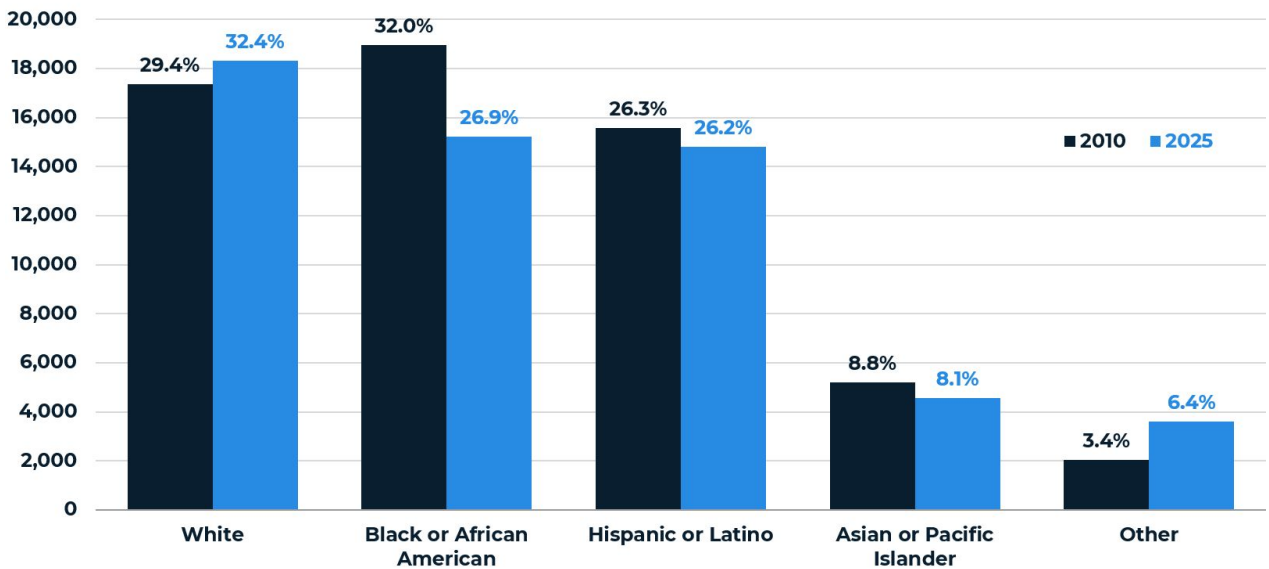

The number and share of **Non-Hispanic White** householders with children in Boston **increased** since 2010

The shift in Black/African American and “Other” categories may be partially explained by changes in Census Bureau race and ethnicity classification methodologies.

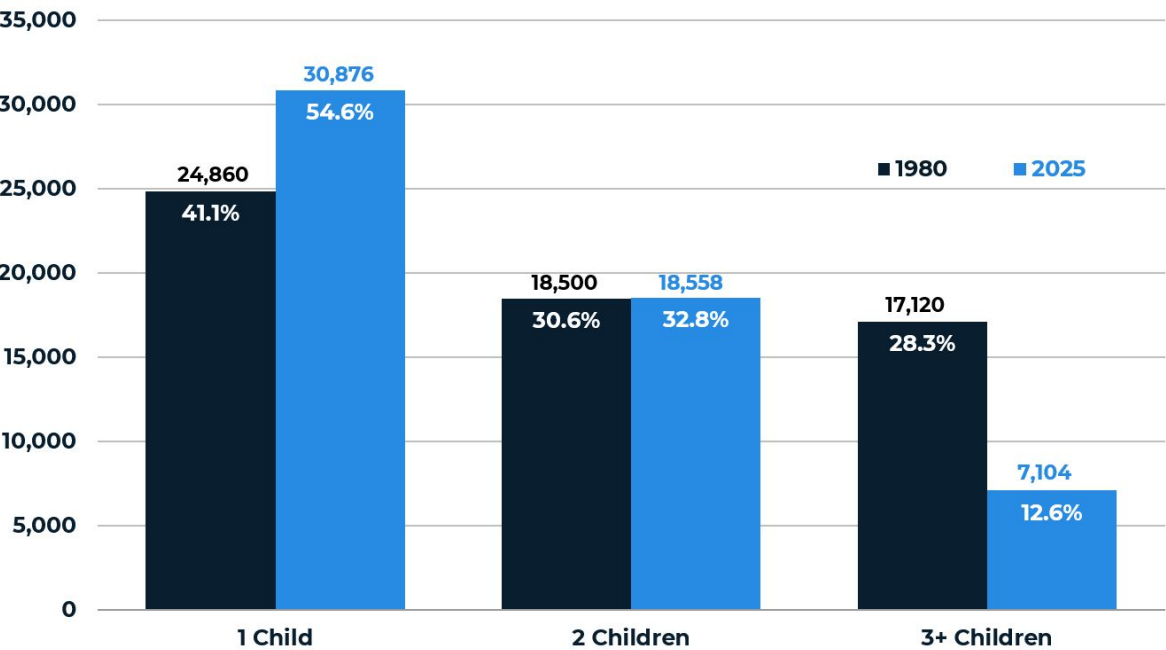

This may in part contribute to the significant increase in the “Other” category between 2010 and 2025. Cape Verdeans and Brazilians were classified as “some other race” and included the “Other” category not as Black/African American or Hispanic/Latino.

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Lower birth rates have led to smaller families with children: by 2025, the share of households with 3+ children fell from 28% in 1980 to just 13%

Boston Households with Children by Number of Children, 1980 & 2025



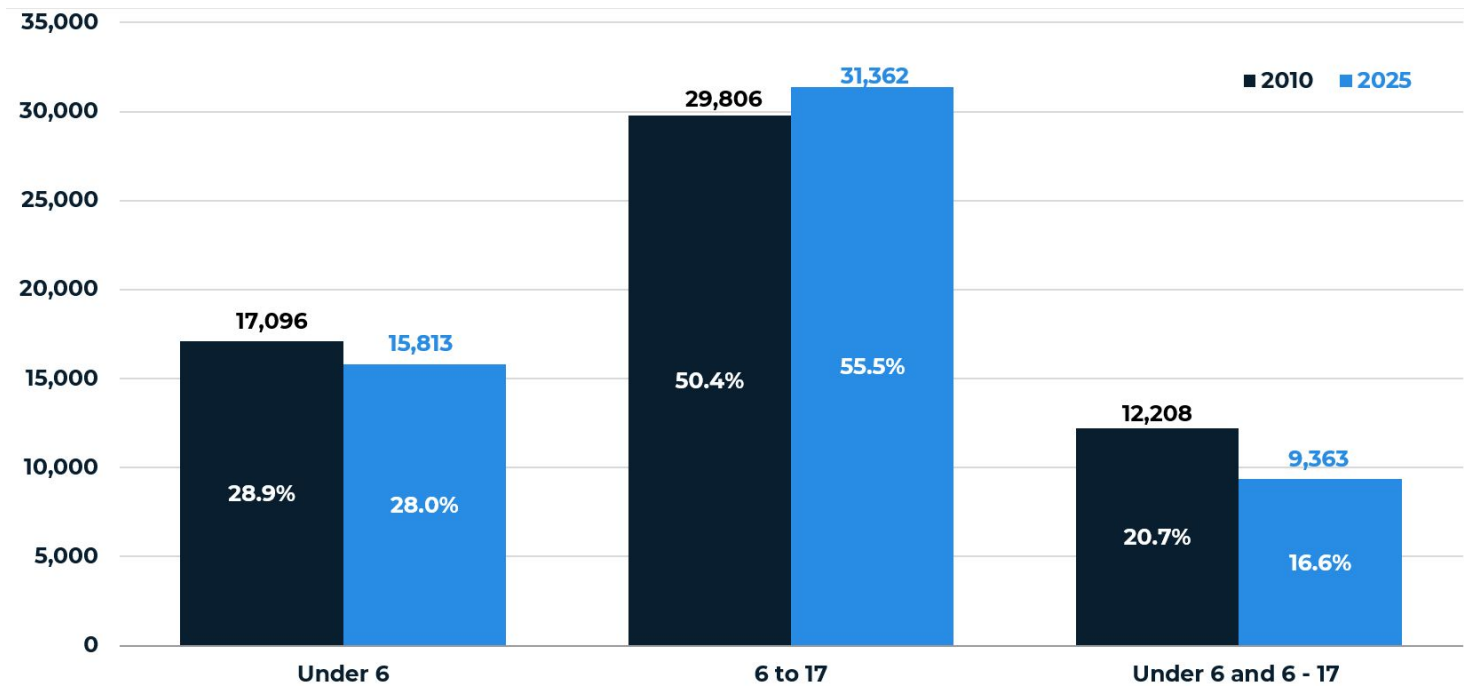
Single-child households grew from **41.1% to 54.6%** of all households with children.

~28% of households with children have only a child/children under age 6, while about half have only children aged 6+

Households with Children by Age of Child, 2010 & 2025

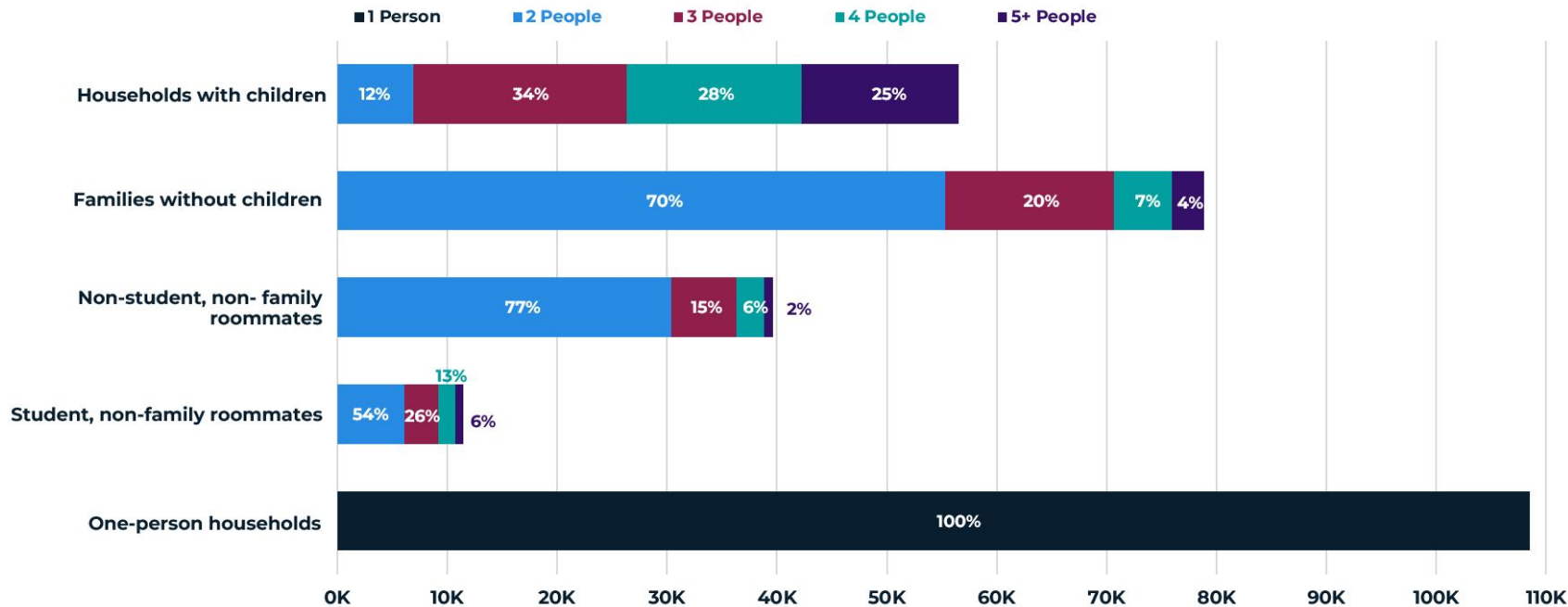

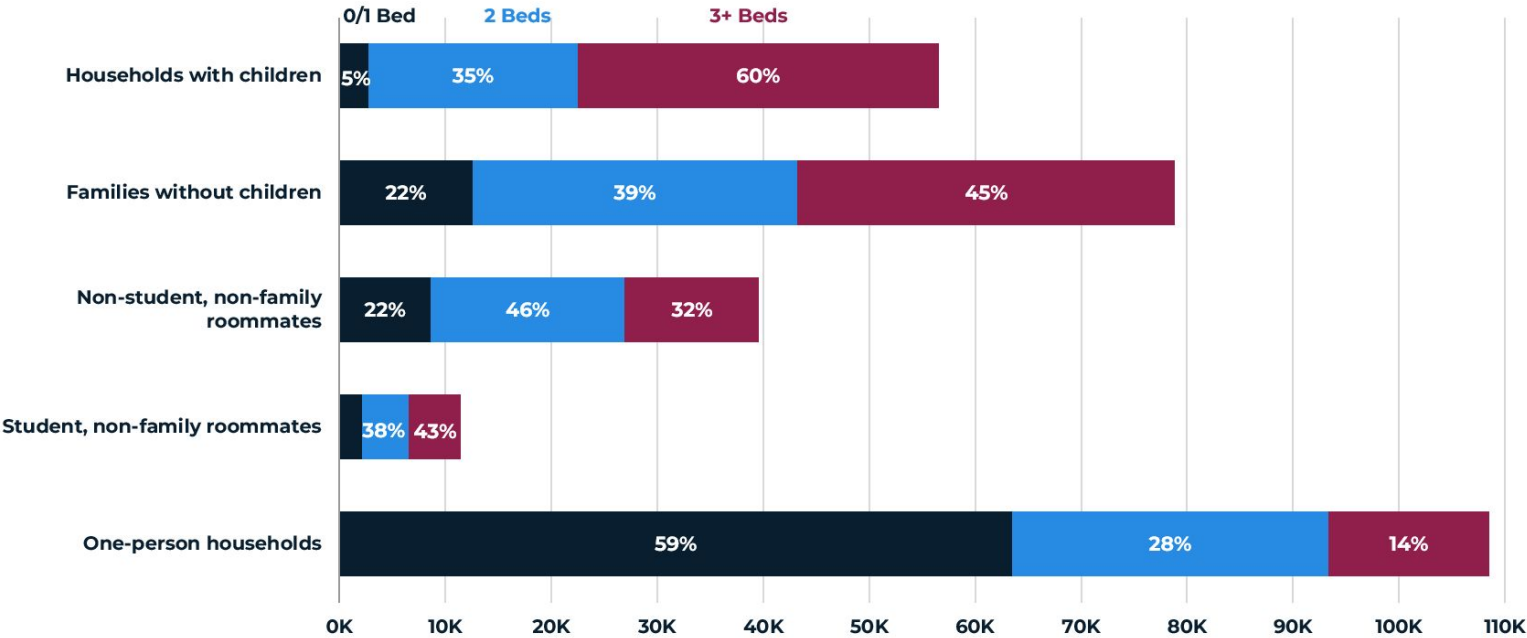
HOUSING OF HOUSEHOLDS WITH CHILDREN

What kind of housing do households with children live in?



Households with children tend to live in the city's larger units: 60% live in homes with 3+ bedrooms, and another 35% in 2-bedrooms

Boston Households by Type & Unit Size, 2025

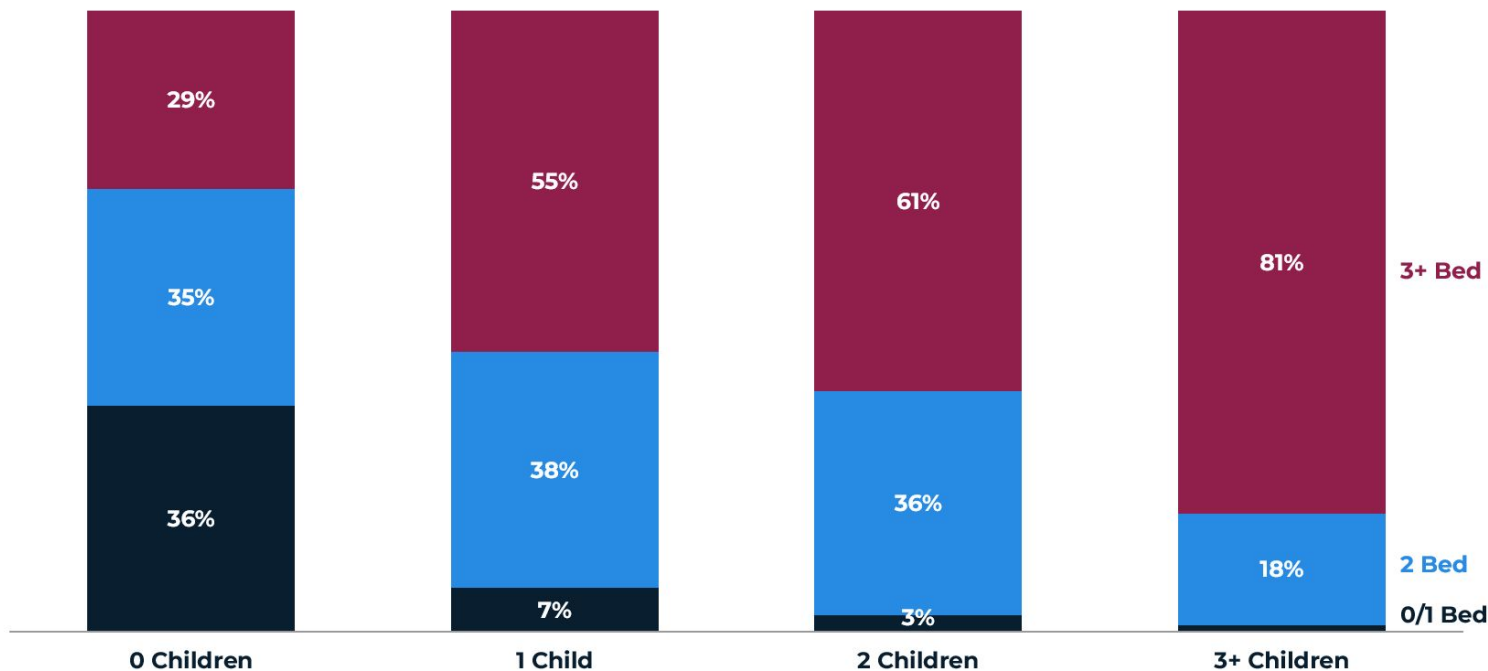

81% of households with 3+ children live in 3+ bedroom units, while 61% of 2-child and 55% of 1-child households do

Boston Households by Number of Children and Bedrooms, 2025

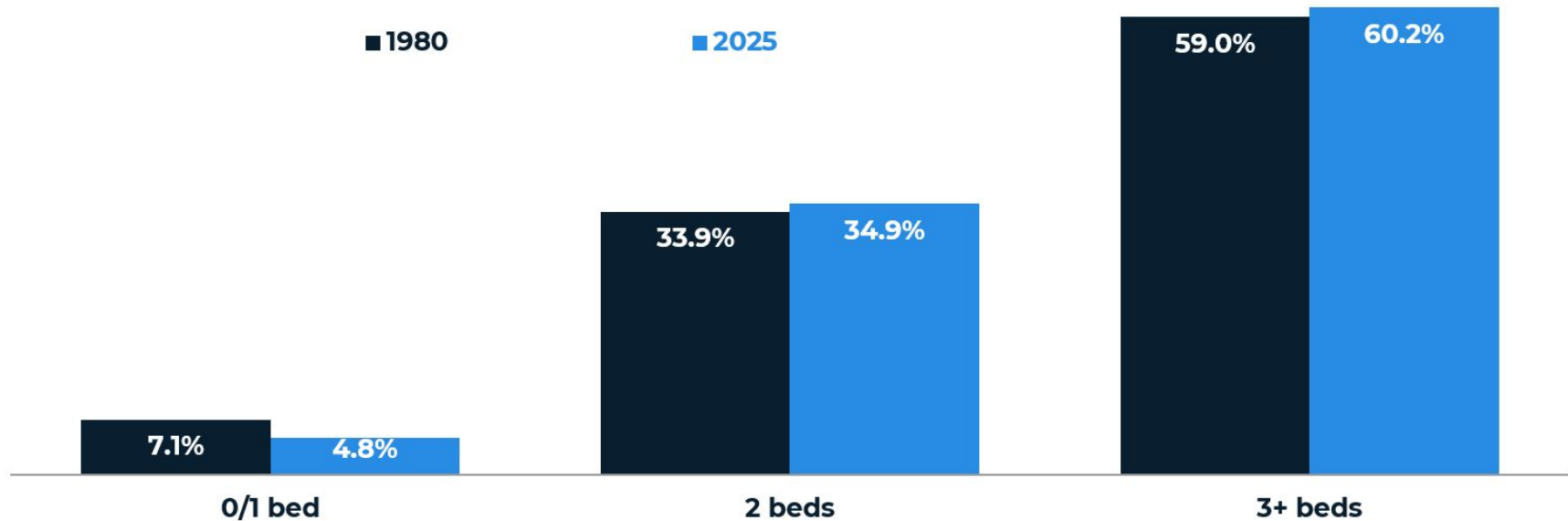

Despite shrinking household size, the share of households with children living in 3+ bedroom units has remained stable at ~60% since 1980

Boston Households with Children by Unit Size, 1980 & 2025

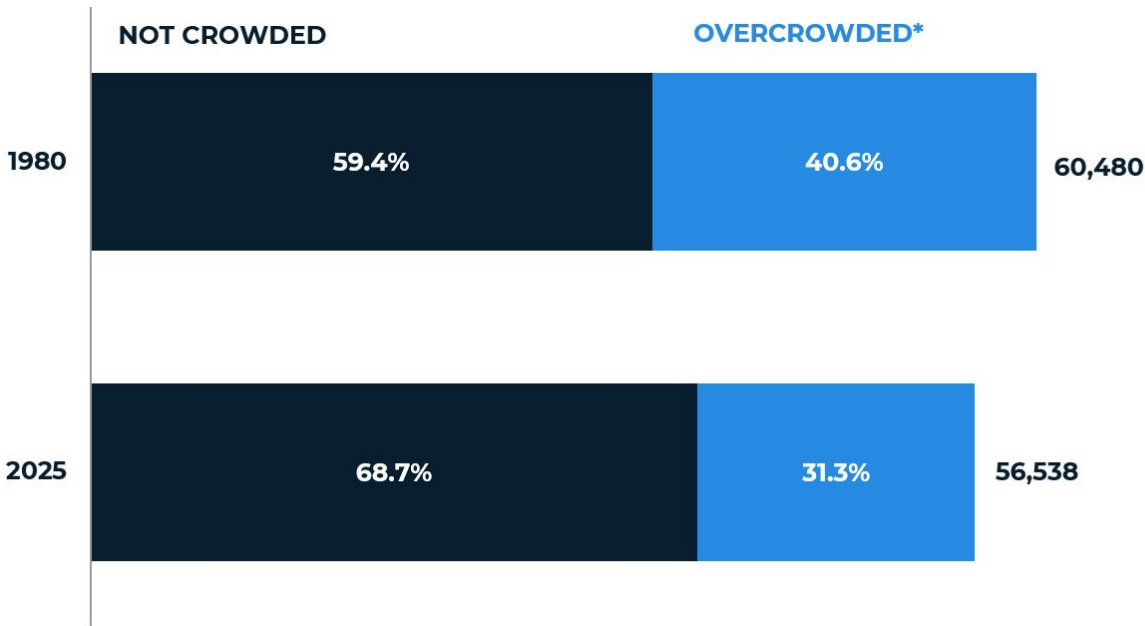

In 1980, 41% of households with children lived in overcrowded* conditions; by 2025, that share fell to 31% due to smaller household sizes

Boston Households with Children by Overcrowding*, 1980 & 2025

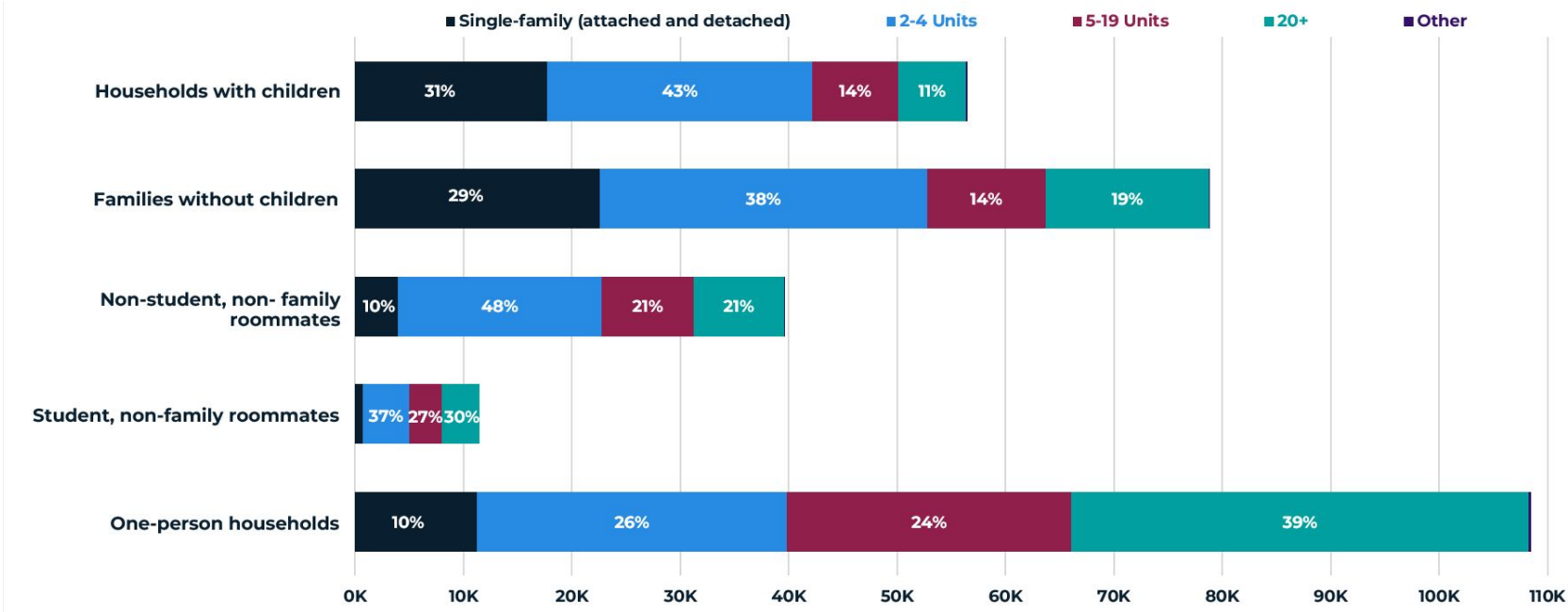

Boston's households with children are most likely to live in **2-4 unit (43%)** or **single-family buildings (31%)**

Boston Households by Household Type by Units-in-Building, 2025

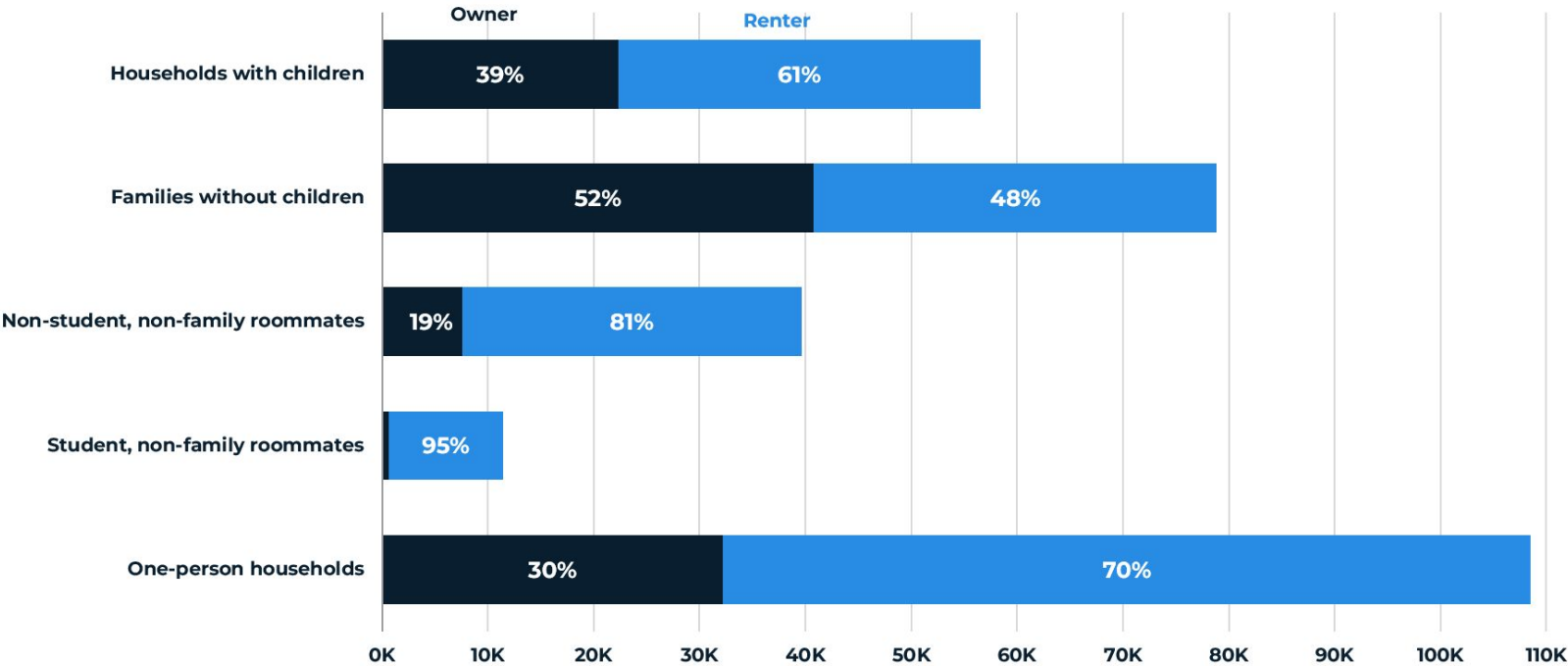

Boston Households by Type & Tenure, 2025

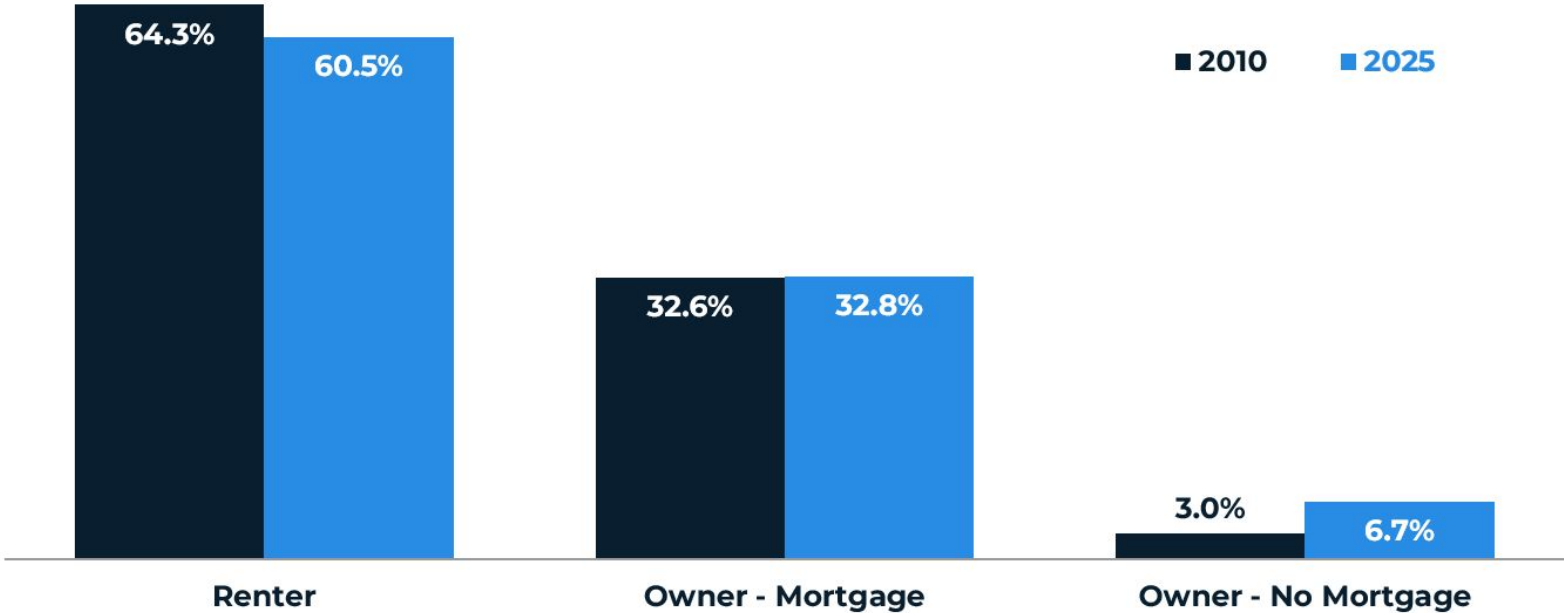

Households with Children by Tenure of Householder, 2010 & 2025

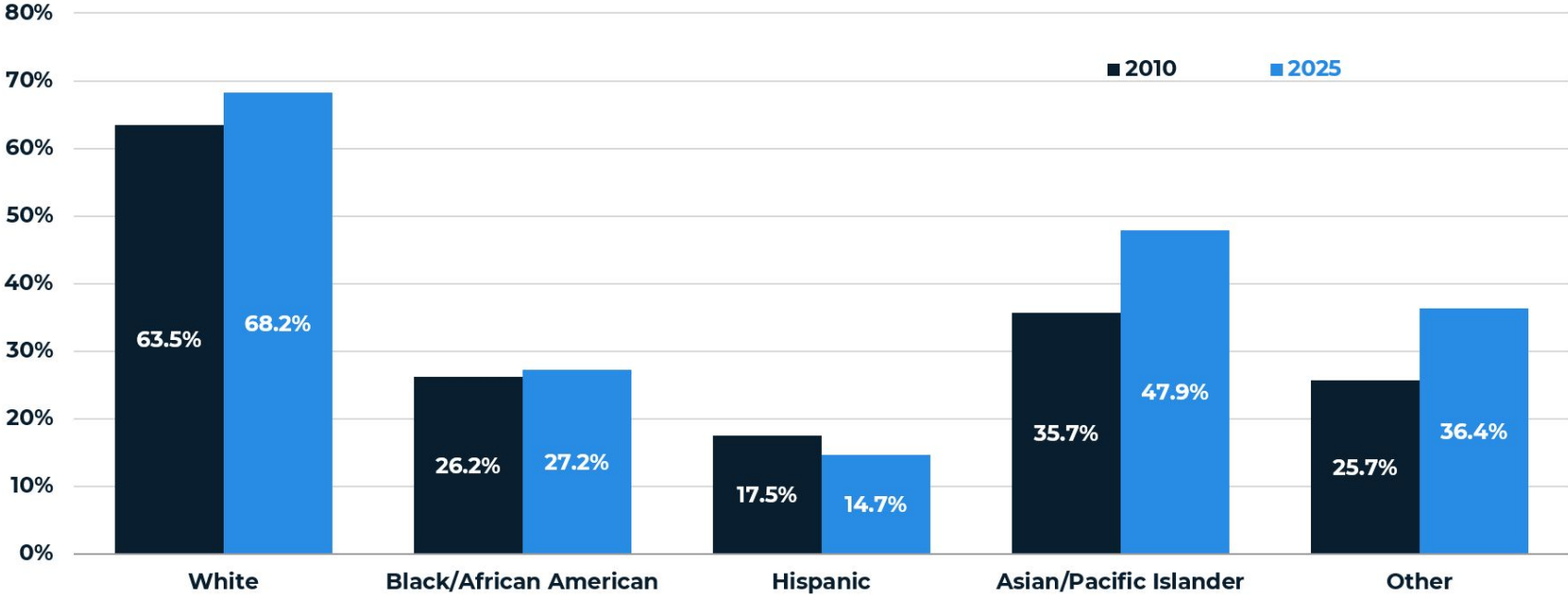

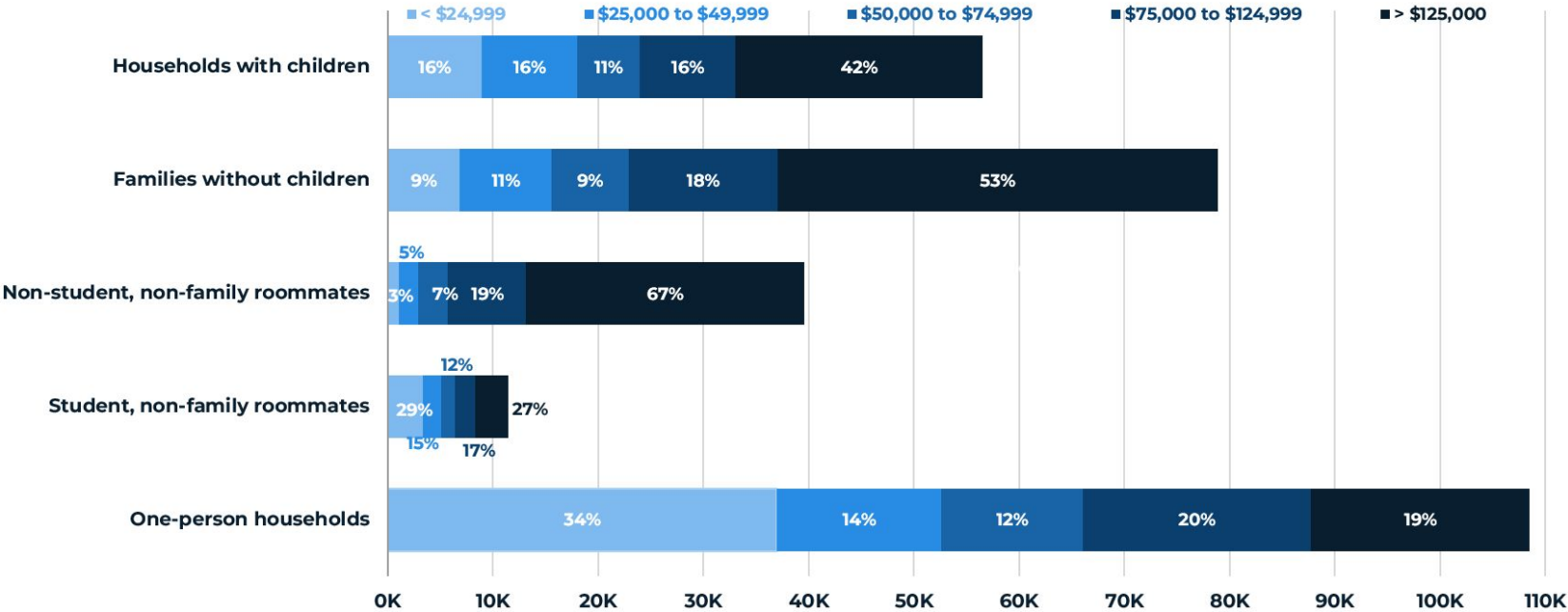
FINANCES OF HOUSEHOLDS WITH CHILDREN

What financial and housing cost challenges do households with children face?



42% of households with children make more than \$125k annually, with a median household income of \$98,183

Boston Households by Type and Household Income, 2025

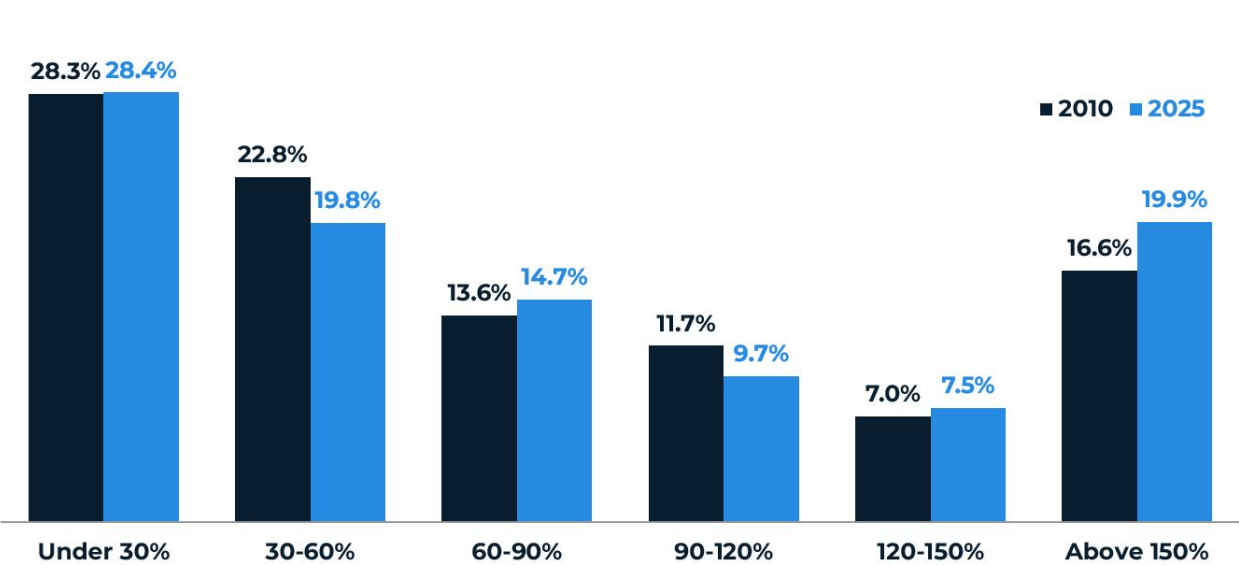

28% of households with children live below 30% of Area Median Income (AMI), a consistent share since 2010

Households with Children by AMI, 2010 & 2025



Households in **lower-to-middle** of the income distribution (30%-120%), fell from **48%** in 2010 to **44%** in 2025.

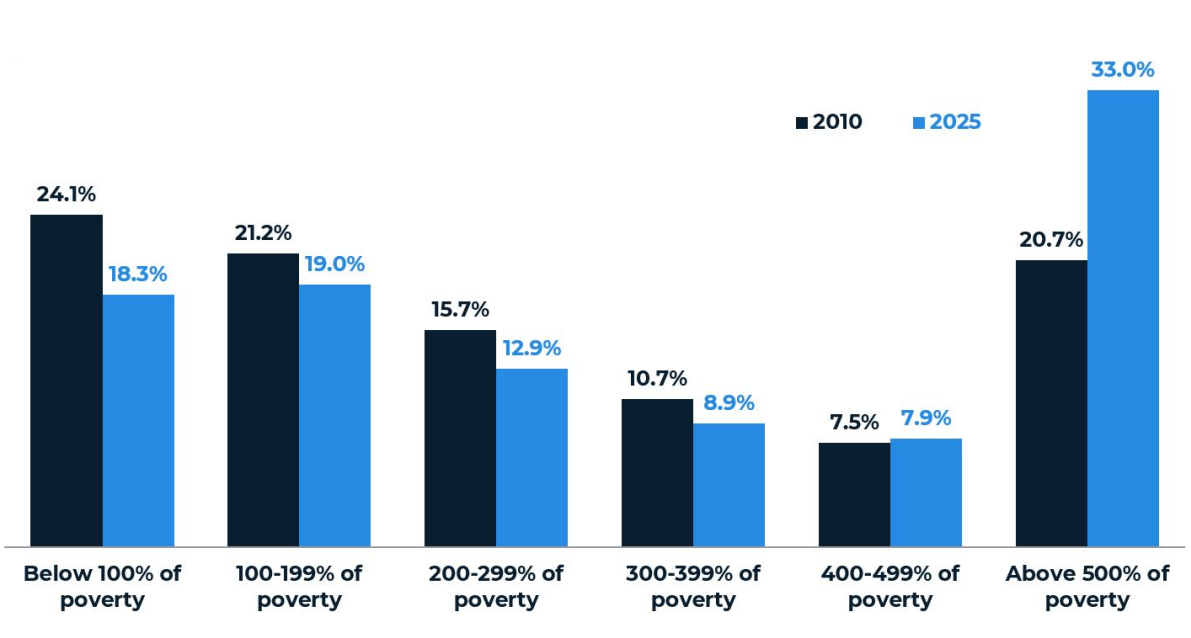
At the same time, the share of households earning **over 120% of AMI** rose from **23.6%** to **27.4%** suggesting Boston has become relatively more attractive to high income households with children compared to the suburbs

18% of households with children lived in poverty in 2025, down from 24% in 2010

Households with Children by Poverty Levels, 2010 & 2025



Households in **lower income** distribution, below 400% of poverty, fell from **72%** in 2010 to **59%** in 2025.

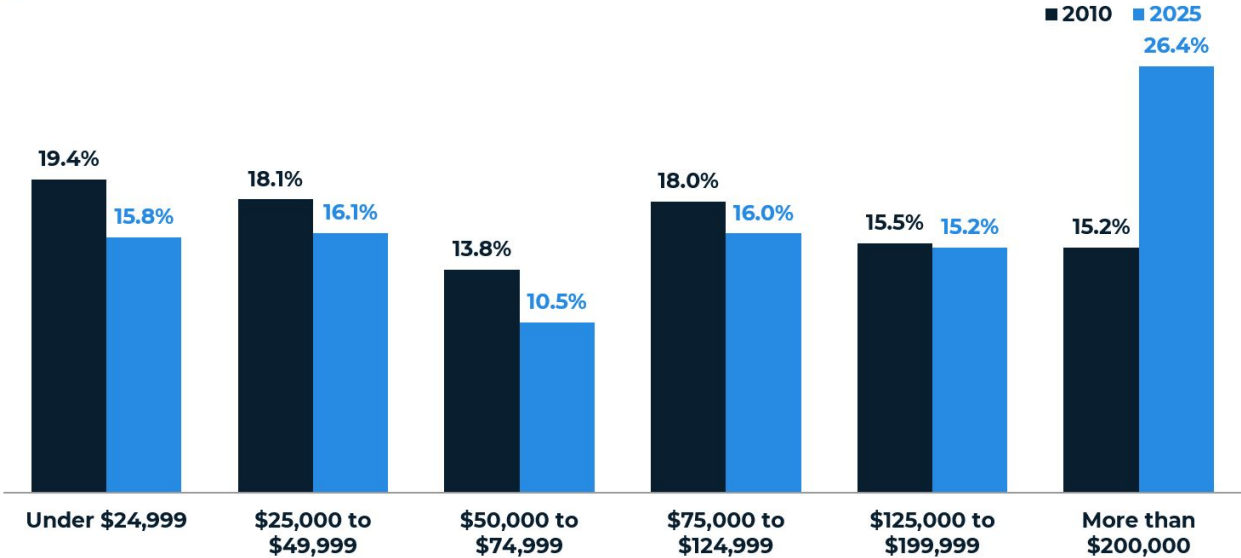
At the same time, the share of households with income above 400% of poverty rose from **28%** to **41%**.

26% of households with children have an income above \$200,000 in 2025, up from 15% in 2010 (inflation adjusted)

Households with Children by Household Income (2025 dollars), 2010 & 2025



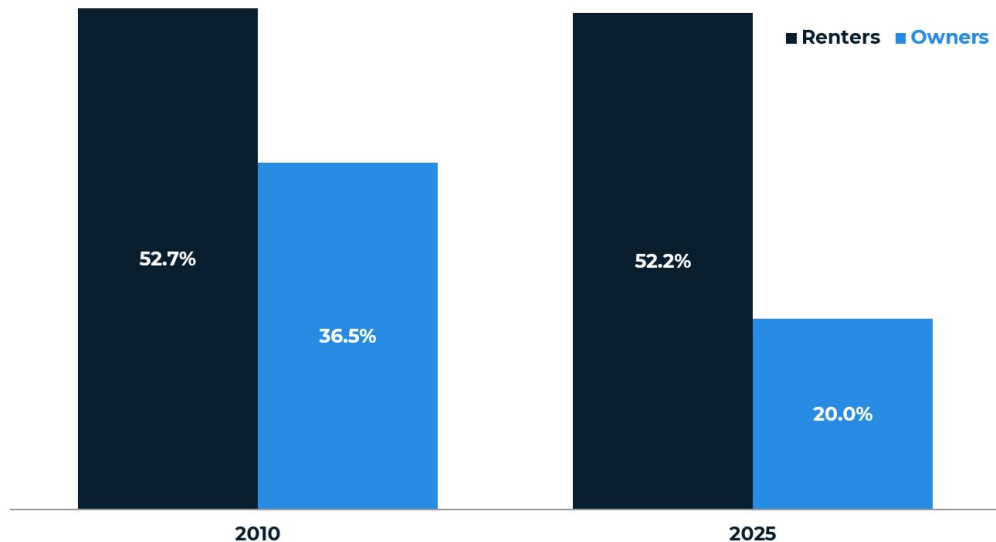
Households in **lower income** distribution, below \$200,000 declined from **85%** in 2010 to **74%** in 2025.

In 2025, **52%** of renter households with children were cost-burdened, while only **20%** of owner-occupied households were housing cost-burdened*

The share of cost-burdened owner households was significantly higher at **36.5%** in 2010, perhaps due to employment loss during the Great Recession

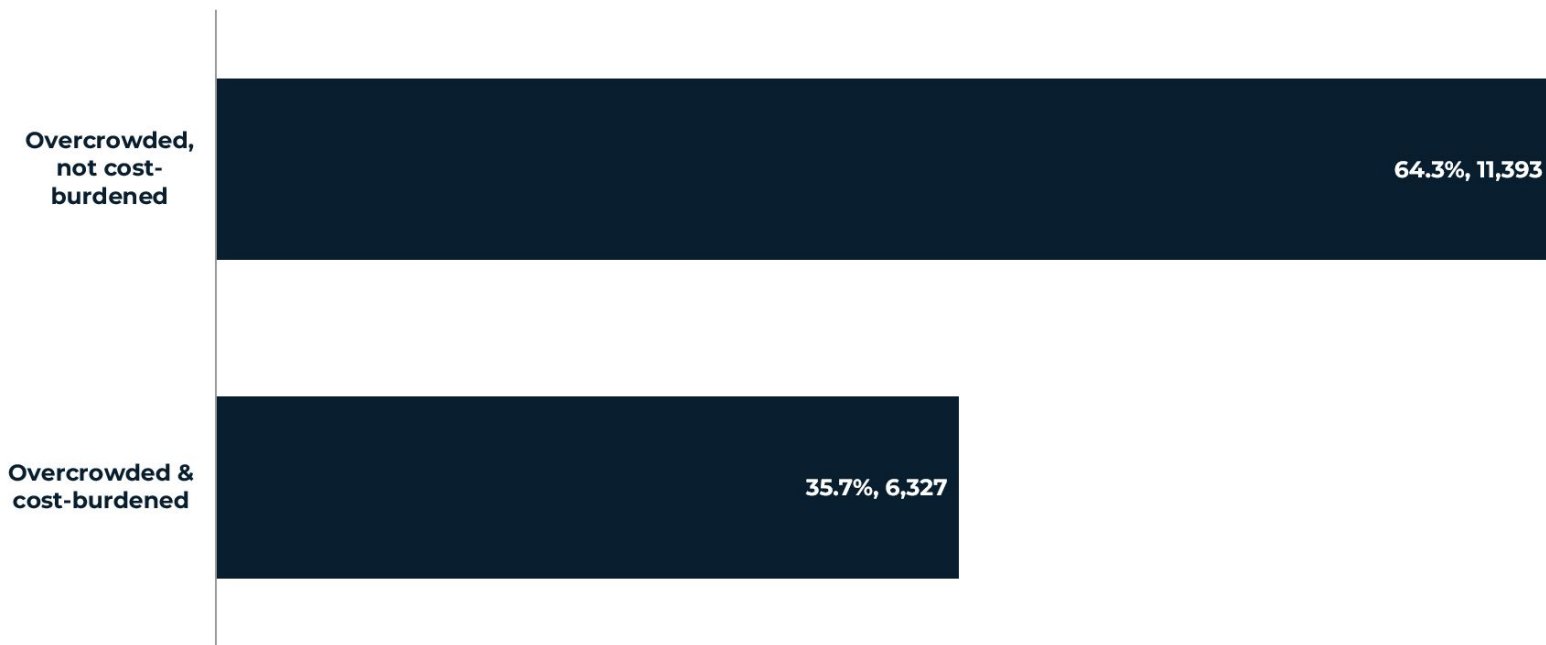

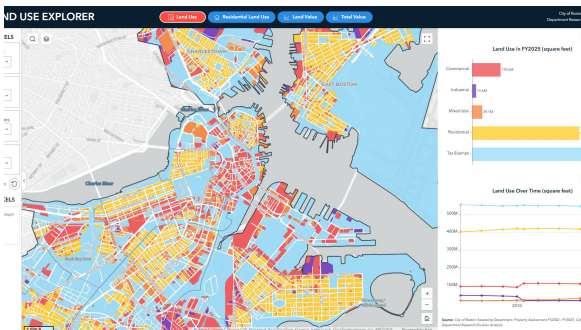

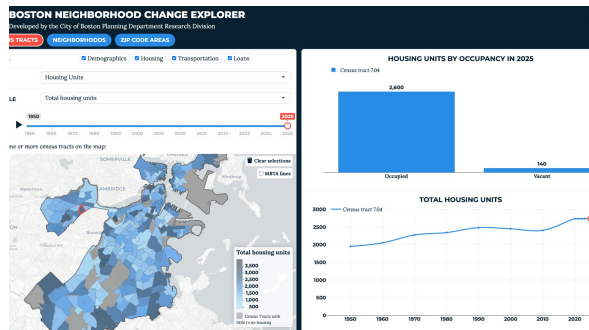
LAND USE & LAND VALUE EXPLORER

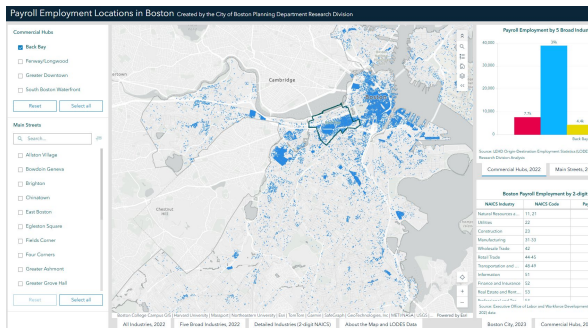

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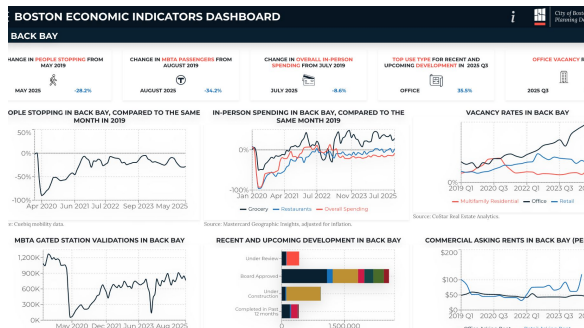
