
Historical Trends in Downtown

- From 2000 to 2017, the population increased by 54% and occupied housing units increased by 46%.
- Between 2011 to 2015, payroll jobs increased by 19% throughout Downtown.
- The owner-occupancy rate has increased from 24% in 2000 to 28% in 2017.
- The share of households with cars has remained relatively constant, from 45% in 2000 to 44% in 2017.
- The foreign-born share of the population decreased from 38% in 2000 to 33% in 2017.
- The share of adult residents with at least a Bachelor's degree grew from 42% in 2000 to 61% in 2017.


The Future for Downtown

 Downtown's growth is poised to continue, with 2,185 housing units approved for construction between 2014 and 2018.⁴


Population Growth

- In 2017, Downtown had 17,581 residents, 3% of Boston's total population.¹
- From 2000 to 2017, Downtown's population grew by 54%, compared to 14% throughout Boston over the same time period.

Age Distribution

- In 2017, 4% of Downtown's residents were school-age children, compared to 11% of Boston's residents.
- Downtown has a higher share of young adults than Boston as a whole.


Downtown & Boston Residents by Age 2017



Diversity

- In 2017, 33% of Downtown's residents were foreign-born, compared to 28% of Boston's residents.
- 32% of Downtown's residents identified as Asian, compared to 9% of Boston's residents.

Economy

Jobs

- In 2015, Downtown had 184,847 payroll jobs, 23% of which were in Finance and Insurance.²
- Downtown had 17.9 payroll jobs for every resident worker, 28% of the payroll jobs in Boston.


Labor Force

- In 2017, Downtown's resident labor force had 10,308 workers, 3% of Boston's resident labor force.
- 63% of Downtown residents participated in the labor force, compared to 69% of Boston's residents.
- The top occupations among residents in 2017: Management, Business and Finance, and Sales.

Education

- In 2017, 27% of Downtown's residents were enrolled in college or university, higher than 16% of Boston's residents.
- 61% of Downtown's residents had at least a Bachelor's degree, higher than 47% of Boston's adult residents.

Income

• In 2017, the median household income in Downtown was \$67,367, higher than \$62,021 throughout Boston.

Place

Households

- In 2017, 77% of Downtown residents lived in households, 38% of which were families.
- The remaining population lived in college dormitories or other institutions.

Household Type



Renters and Owners

- In 2017, Downtown had 7,552 housing units, 72% of which were renter-occupied.
- In 2017, Downtown had 4,365 condominiums, 41% of which were owner-occupied.³
- In 2017, Downtown's median rent was \$1,866, higher than \$1,445 throughout Boston.

Vehicles

- In 2017, 44% of Downtown's households had at least one vehicle, lower than 66% of Boston's households.
- The ratio of vehicles to households in Downtown was 0.25, significantly lower than Boston's ratio of 0.95.
