37.2 million immigrants live in the U.S. (2007)

- 913,382 immigrants live in Massachusetts (MA) 14.2% of the state's population (2007);
- Between 2000 and 2007, 253,531 new immigrants came to MA. If not for this influx, the population would have decreased;
- Between 2000 and 2007, 44.4% of MA immigrants were from Latin America and the Caribbean and 28.4% were from Asia;
- Brazil has become the largest source of immigrants in MA. From 2000 to 2007, nearly 1 out of 5 immigrants entering the state was Brazilian;
- In 2007, Boston's immigrant population was 168,514 or 28% of the city's population;
























Boston's African, European, and Asian leading countries of origin (2007)

Boston's ancestry, 1990 and 2007

- Irish and Italian are the first and second leading ancestries. Their recorded numbers decreased between 1990 and 2007 by 33.4% and 30.7% respectively;
- Puerto Ricans are the third leading ancestry. Their reported numbers increased by 12.7%, between 1990 and 2007;
- People claiming Salvadoran ancestry grew over 3 ½ times between 1990 and 2007.






Demographic characteristics of Boston's foreign born





















New Bostonians speak more than 140 languages

- There are 6 leading languages, other than English, spoken in Boston;
- 65% of Boston residents speak only English and 35% speak a language other than English;
- Over 14% of Boston residents speak Spanish at home up from 9.5% in 1990;
- Almost 1/3 of all Spanish speakers are Limited English Proficient (LEP).



•Note: The Limited English Proficient includes immigrant adults who do not speak English at all or who do not speak it well. The English Proficient includes immigrant adults who speak only English, speak it very well or speak it well.

•** Asian Languages include Hindi, Bengali, Panjabi, Marathi, Gujarathi, Urdu, Nepali, Chinese, Cantonese, Mandarin, Thai, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Cambodian, Vietnamese, Indonesian and others.






Slightly more than 1/2 of Boston's Public School students speak "English Only". Spanish is the most common foreign language spoken in the Boston Public schools








New Bostonian youth speak many languages...

Economic contributions are furthered because the cost of raising (and retiring) the foreign born labor force is borne by the countries of origin

Considering the average cost of public education in Massachusetts, immigrants "bring" with them \$31 billion in subsidies.

218,418 recent immigrants over age 25 living in Massachusetts.*




