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

Multilingual population

- Refers to residents who speak a language other than English at home.
- one language if that language is not English.

Language Access population


 Refers to the subset of the Multilingual population who report speaking English "Well," "Not well," or "Not at all" in the American Community Survey.

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
- Almost 72 million residents of the U.S. speak a language other than English at home.
- 22 of the 30 counties with the highest share of multilingual population are in Texas.
- States with the largest multilingual population shares:
 - California (44.1%)
 - o Texas (34.9%)
 - New Jersey (32.7%)
 - New Mexico (31.6%)
 - New York (30.6%)



City of Boston

More than a third of Boston's population aged 5+ speaks a language other than English at home.

Multilingual populations of the 25 largest cities in the U.S. by English speaking ability, as of 2023




65% of El Paso's population speaks a language other than English at home

In contrast, just over 15% of Jacksonville's population is multilingual

 - Lynn (51.3%)




MULTILINGUAL POPULATIONS IN BOSTON




In addition to Spanish, Boston also has significant shares of Chinese, Haitian, Kabuverdianu, and Vietnamese speakers.

Boston's population growth since 1980 has come from the multilingual population.


Multilingual populations as shares of Boston's total population aged 5+, 1980 - 2024





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
- Approximately 245,000 Boston residents are multilingual
- Dorchester has the largest number of multilingual residents
- Neighborhoods with the largest multilingual population shares:
 - Chinatown (69.0%)
 - East Boston (60.3%)
 - Mission Hill (41.8%)
 - Roxbury (40.9%)
 - Dorchester (39.8%)




- Boston residents speak more than 100 languages
- Spanish is the most prevalent language with 104,259 speakers, concentrated in East Boston
- Chinese 32,223 speakers concentrated in Chinatown
- Haitian 21,796 speakers concentrated in Mattapan and Hyde Park
- Kabuverdianu 9,541 speakers concentrated in Dorchester
- Vietnamese 9,488 speakers concentrated in Dorchester



LANGUAGE ACCESS POPULATIONS IN BOSTON




- Approximately 108,000 Boston residents are Language Access
- Dorchester has the largest number of Language Access residents, but only 18% of its population is Language Access
- Neighborhoods with the largest Language Access population shares:
 - Chinatown (41.4%)
 - East Boston (36.3%)
 - Mission Hill (21.7%)
 - South End (20.7%)
 - Roxbury (20.6%)



Almost 49,000 Boston residents speak Spanish at home and speak English "well," "not well," or "not at all."

Language Access population by top languages spoken at home, 2024




 Boston's top five languages make up 84% of its Language Access population

~47% of the Language Access population in Boston speaks English "well," and ~53% speaks English "not well" or "not at all."

English ability of the Boston Language Access population by language spoken at home, 2024




- 41.1% of Chinese speakers in the Language Access population speak English "well;" but 27.6% don't speak English at all
- 54.9% of Haitian speakers in the Language Access population speak English "well," and only 12.5% don't speak English at all

~73% of the Language Access population in Boston are aged 18-64.

Age of Boston Language Access population by language spoken at home, 2024




- Chinese speakers have the lowest share aged 5 to 17 (4.2%)
- 29.5% of those who speak Haitian at home are aged 65+

~44% of the Language Access population in Boston is Hispanic and ~25% is Asian.

Race/Ethnicity distribution of all Boston and the Language Access population aged 5+, 2024




More than half of Kabuverdianu speakers fall in the "others" category of the Census' definition of race

Citizenship of the Language Access population by language spoken at home, 2024




- 23% of the Spanish speaking language access population are native born, perhaps due to the large Puerto Rican population
- Chinese speakers have the highest share (52%) of non citizens

Educational attainment of the Language Access population aged 25+ by language spoken at home, 2024




- 26.9% of Chinese speakers have a Bachelor's degree or higher
- Only 6.1% of Kabuverdianu speakers have a Bachelor's degree or higher

College/University enrolled Language Access population by language spoken at home, 2024




 22.7% of the Chinese speaking language access population is enrolled in college/university

Employed Language Access population aged 16+ by language spoken at home, 2024




- Vietnamese speakers have the highest share of employment out of the top languages (59%)
- Chinese speakers have the lowest employment share (43%)

~9% of the employed Language Access population aged 16+ is self-employed, representing ~6,300 businesses.

Self-employed Language Access population aged 16+ by language spoken at home, 2024



- Spanish speakers make up just over 50% of the entire selfemployed Language Access population
- Vietnamese speakers only have 700 selfemployed workers, but they have the highest selfemployment share (16.5%)

Boston's employed Language Access population has median personal earnings of \$34,796, lower than the city median of \$60,454.

Median personal earnings in 2022\$ of the employed Language Access population by language spoken at home, 2024




- Haitian speakers have the second highest median personal earnings, consistent with their higher rates of employment
- Chinese speakers have the second lowest median personal earnings, likely due to the higher share of college enrollment

More than 30,000 Language Access households in Boston are linguistically isolated.*

*Note: The U.S. Census Bureau defines a linguistically isolated household as one where no member of the household 14+


speaks English only or "very well."

- Spanish speakers make up almost 50% of all Language Access linguistically isolated households
- 73% of Chinese speaking households are linguistically isolated
- Only 55% of Kabuverdianu speaking households are linguistically isolated

~19% of Boston's Language Access population has a disability, ~20,200 residents.

- Haitian speakers have the highest share (26%) of individuals living with a disability
- Chinese speakers have the lowest share (12%), of individuals living with a disability

LCA Specialist

- A member of the LCA Office who has been assigned to work with your department and often interacts with LCA Liaisons as well as with POs and anyone who runs meeting/events for your office.

LCA POLICY AND ORDINANCE

Language and Communications Access

The <u>Language and Communication Access Policy</u> (LCAP) and <u>Language and</u>
<u>Communications Access Ordinance</u> which outline the requirements the City will comply with provide access to LOTE individuals and persons with a disability.

- All COB departments' programs, services and activities <u>must</u> be accessible to LOTE individuals and persons with disabilities at <u>no cost to the residents</u>.
- Provide translation, interpreting, and assistive technology to City created events, programs, information and documents.

^{*} Please note LCA training sessions are for City of Boston departments; quasi-City departments should follow their language access plan and process. For example, Boston Public Schools staff should follow the BPS language access process, and contact languageaccess@bostonpublicschools.org with any questions.

THRESHOLD LANGUAGES



WHAT ARE THRESHOLD LANGUAGES?

Refers to any language spoken by individuals of the Language Other Than English population totalling 5% of the population or 1000 individuals, whichever is less, within the City of Boston.
